National Forest Timber For Sale

Oral auction bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Roseburg, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p.m., Pacific Standard time, April 10, 1950, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 23 acres within sections 13, 14 and 23, T21S, R1E, W.M., Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 394,000 feet B.M., more or less of Douglas-fir, 25,000 feet B.M., more or less of Western redcedar, and 52,000 feet B.M., more or less of Western hemlock and other species of sawtimber. Sealed bids accompanied by required payment and received by the Forest Supervisor prior to 2:00 p.m., Pacific Standard time, April 10,

1950, will be considered the equivalent of an oral bid and posted for information of all bidders. No bid of less than \$11.85 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$3.80 per M feet for Western redcedar, and \$2.00 per M feet for Western hemlock and other species will be considered. \$500.00 must accompany each sealed bid and must be shown to be in the possession of oral bidders as a qualification for auction bidding. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately make the required payment and confirm the bid by submitting it in writing on a Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, or the District Ranger, Linton, Oregon. 3-9-24-3-20

Sixty-Five Farm Units Are Open To WW2 Veterans

Sixty-five farm units totaling 7,723 acres will be opened to homestead entry in the Northwest in 1950, with World War II veterans offered priority, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs was informed this week.

Eleven of the farms covering 723 acres are located in the Roza division of the Yakima project in Washington and 54 units amounting to 7,000 acres are in the River-ton, Wyoming, project, according to a brochure received here from the federal Bureau of Reclamation, which administers public openings on irrigated lands.

An additional 974 acres comprising 50 farm units also will be sold by the reclamation bureau this year in the Burbank unit of the Columbia basin irrigation project. These are lands purchased from private owners and irrigated by the government. Here again, veterans of World War II will have first chance to acquire the land.

WHEREAS in Chapter XXVI Oregon Code 1930 and amendments thereto, it is declared to be the duty of every person, firm, partnership, company and corporation owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge of or dominion over any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier or dock which is infested with ground squirrels and other noxious rodents or predatory animals, or as soon as the presence of the same shall come to his, their or its knowledge, at once to proceed and to continue in good faith to exterminate and destroy such rodents by poisoning, trapping or other appropriate and effective means; and

WHEREAS gray and white ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) are noxious rodents in Lane County, Oregon.

Now, therefore, if of such persons, firms, partnerships, corporations and companies owning or having dominion over land in said Lane County, Oregon, are hereby required to take steps to exterminate said gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) within thirty days from the date of the first publication of this notice, if such steps are not taken, a person or persons appointed by the County Court of said Lane County will enter upon said lands and proceed to exterminate said gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) and the cost of said extermination will be levied against said lands.

The County Agricultural Agent hereby designates Monday, April 3, as a day to be known as "squirrel poisoning day" throughout the said Lane County, and it is hereby recommended that poisoned barley prepared according to formula recommended by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service be used for the purpose of such extermination. Such poisoned barley may be secured from the undersigned at his office in Eugene, Lane County, Oregon.
