Oakridge Police Officer Killed With His Own Gun

A drunken shooting spree was climaxed at Oakridge early Sunday morning with the fatal shooting of Clyde Dubeil 27, police chief at Oakridge and a former officer on the local police force here. James Lloyd Thompson a 27 year old sawmill hand was arrested 14 hours later and charged with shooting Dubeil with his own gun. Thompson was captured without a struggle as he walked on the Cold Springs road, a short distance from the scene of the shooting.

The shooting occurred about 3:00 a.m. Sunday when the police were called to the home of Herb Looney, an SP fireman. Thompson is alleged to have gone to his home from the Looney party and to have brought back a gun, a 22 rifle. Returning Thompson is said to have fired the rifle twice at Looney and his 17 year old wife, Mary Ann as they stepped on the porch. Looney called the police and Dubeil answered. When Dubeil arrived the two scuffled and Thompson knocked the officer down, taking his gun and shooting him twice in the stomach. Dubeil was dead on arrival at a Eugene hospital.

Dubeil was on the local police force here during the war and served for a time at Sutherlin before going to Oakridge.

"Dust or Destiny" Scientific Film To Be Here Apr. 4

The old hocus-pecus of fish that supposedly lay their eggs on dry land has been proved at last.

For years Californians have claimed that a small silvery fish in the smelt family, the grunion, chooses certain moonlight nights to come up on the beach and spawn. Non-Californians have claimed the story sounds as fantastic as a chicken laying its eggs on the bottom of the ocean. Few people have ever seen the phenomenon occur.

But in a new scientific film, "Dust or Destiny," the peculiar spawning habits of the grunion have actually been photographed. A showing of this 40-minute production is scheduled for the First Methodist Church, 334 Washington Avenue, Tuesday, April 4, at 7:45 p.m., according to the Rev. Frank Brown. This is a city-wide showing with 19 churches co-operating and sponsored by the Ministerial Association.

Produced in the west coast film studios of Chicago's Moody Bible Institute, "Dust or Destiny" is fourth in a widely acclaimed series of scientific films with a religious emphasis. More than a million people will see the production in its first year, the Institute estimates, though showing will not be scheduled in any of the nation's regular movie theaters. Churches, military bases, schools and television will constitute most of the audience.

The fantastic habits of grunion are not the only subject treated in "Dust or Destiny." A bird that flies non-stop from Labrador to Argentina, bats that use radar to guide them in night flying and even a close-up of the human heart are among the other miracles of nature shown in the film.
