CG's Play Host To Music Contest

The District Musical Contest for choruses will be held at Cottage Grove on April 29 with Springfield, Albany, Salem, Corvallis, Eugene and other district schools participating.

Melvin H. Geist, Dean of Music School, Willamette University; L. Stanley Glarum, Director of Lewis and Clark College choir; Dr. Edmund Cykler, Professor of Musicology, University of Oregon; and Miss Vandervick, Instructor in Voice, University of Oregon will be judges.

The contest will start at 9:00 a.m. and continue until late afternoon. Recommended choruses, outstanding soloists and small ensembles who were in the Lebanon contest will present a concert in the evening. Concert series tickets may be used to gain admittance, and the performance is open to the public.

Cottage Grove entrant groups will be the choir, boys' chorus and girls' chorus.

Name Announced at Assembly Today Honors CG Custodian George Currin

At the first football game next fall Cottage Grove High's new field will be officially named and dedicated in honor of George. The name George Currin Field was revealed at an award assembly after a final vote of the student body was taken. Approved wholeheartedly by the school board, the faculty, student council and the entire Student Body, the name suggested by Mrs. Kingsley, is most appropriate.

Mr. Currin, better known to the students as "George", has been a custodian at Cottage Grove High since its Jefferson days. The atmosphere here at school would be much different if it weren't for George's bright smile and willingness to help everyone.

The lot behind the school will be used for parking, and walks will be built to the stadium. Covered bleachers to seat 1500 people will be ready for use next year.

The field, to be used for both football and track, has a cinder track a quarter mile long. The turf on the field is permanent, and practice games can be held on the field in dry weather.

Buskirk, a local construction company, has done the constructing and grading.

Lady Orchid Cake Makes Its Debut

The newest innovation in the old art of cake making was announced today by B. A. Angel of Cottage Bakery.

Introduced in Cottage Grove by Cottage Bakery, a real, live orchid flown direct from Hawaii is included with every purchase of a Lady Orchid cake.

The Lady Orchid cake is a faintly golden, two layer cake. Designed for serving on special and gala occasions, the side of the Lady Orchid cake is frosted with colorful orchid-tinted divinity while the top is blanketed with snowy white frosting. As a crowning touch, a live orchid is centered on top.

Mr. Angel says 8 out of 10 Cottage Grove women have yet to wear their first orchid. He hopes, as a result of the success of the Lady Orchid cake, an increasingly large number of Cottage Grove women will have the thrill of wearing their first orchid.

The orchids, grown in Hawaii in lava cinders, are showered with over 400 inches of rainfall yearly. Their natural growth accounts for their being considered one of the hardest members of the orchid family.

Mr. Angel reports the orchids average in diameter between 2½ to 3 inches. Although somewhat smaller than hybrid orchids, their dainty size enhances their natural charm.

The orchid comes complete with a plastic vase lapel pin. Due to the moisture in the lapel pin, the orchid's keeping quality is considerably lengthened.

Paper Mill Waste May Yield to Research by OSC

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—The big problem of what to do with sulfite liquor from paper mills to keep it from adding to stream pollution may be on the way to a practical solution as the result of research work underway in the chemical engineering department here.

Laboratory treatment with a new method of heating the waste to high temperatures for short periods under pressure has removed from 60 to 90 per cent of the ability of the waste to cause stream pollution.

Dean George Gleeson of the school of engineering has announced that the National Council for Stream Improvement, which has supplied funds for cooperative research on the project, is so well pleased with results so far that it has authorized construction of a pilot plant here to study the process further on a larger scale.

Dean Gleeson explained that this long-range process has nothing to do with the temporary plan proposed by the school of engineering for use now along Oregon rivers. This involves ponding the liquor through the low-water months for release during high water.

Oregon State is one of nine selected institutions cooperating with the National Council for Stream Improvement in research dealing with various phases of waste disposal from paper and pulp mills.

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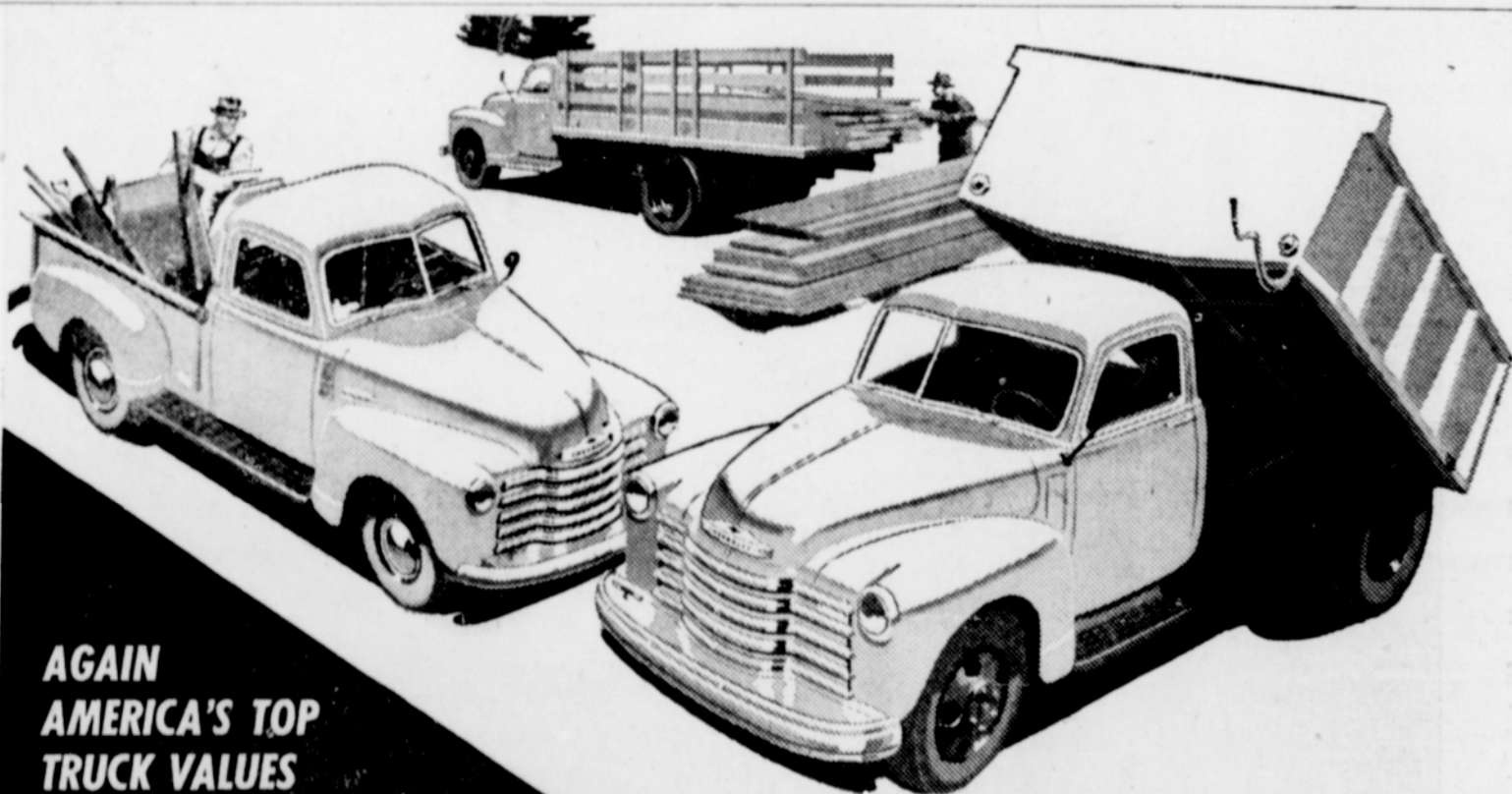
