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City Council Votes to Adopt Daylight Saving Time April 30

The city of Cottage Grove fell into line with other communities of western Oregon in adopting daylight saving time, starting at midnight on April 30th and running to and including 2:00 a.m. September 24, 1950. This ordinance numbered 1342 was passed after a tie vote of 3 to 3 was broken by the mayor's affirmative vote at the regular council session Monday night. Major municipalities in western Oregon had previously adopted daylight saving and the action of the council Monday evening places Cottage Grove in line with the other communities.

Acting on a letter received from Mrs. Harmon, 300 North Douglas street, the council voted to correct a hazard which exists at the corner of Villard court and North Douglas by extending a drain tile to serve this area. James Fisher asked the council to maintain a gravel street on Penneyer avenue in the Woodson addition so that he could obtain a government loan for his building. Mayor Doleman asked the street committee to investigate. W. G. Allen of 349 Quincy avenue appeared before the council and asked the city to assist him in keeping large trucks from blocking his alley and this request was referred to the police department.

E. L. Clark appeared before the council representing the church council with petitions asking that no more class B beer licenses be granted. This was in connection with the application of the M. & W. Market. The liquor committee recommended that no more licenses be granted, but the council by a vote of three to two rejected the recommendation of the committee and instructed the recorder to sign the application. Warren Edwards and Walt Smith appeared before the council and asked a lease on Kelly field for the summer to be used in playing softball. They also requested financial aid if possible so far as the city budget would allow.

Carl Leabo asked the city to place tile along his property at 12th and Jefferson so that he might build. The matter was referred to the street committee for further action.

The bid of the Floyd Githens Motors, Inc. was opened for the purchase of a 1/4 ton pickup. The water, street and finance committees were given power to act in the purchase of the pickup or readvertise for bids.

L. W. Coirer, city engineer spoke for Geo. McReynolds regarding a small amount of timber on the west water shed. The city engineer was asked to gather the needed information and present it at the next council meeting. The council also considered the application of Frank Crouse to use the reservoir road to haul logs during the summer. He was given permission to use the road by paying 50 cents per thousand feet. The council approved a motion to erect a hose tower at the rear of the city hall.

Cottage Grove Flour Mill to Reopen Saturday April 8 in New Buildings

The Cottage Grove Flour mill will reopen Saturday at the old location at 326 South River road. J. F. Roy, owner announced Monday. The mill buildings, a landmark in Cottage Grove, have been rebuilt. The buildings consist of a warehouse, storage room and office. The 30 feet by 52 one story feed warehouse was constructed

of concrete blocks with metal roof and the 40 by 40 main building is two stories with the lower story made on concrete blocks and the upper story of metal.

Scales Installed
The first pair of platform scales to be used in this section for several years have been installed by Mr. Roy for use by the public. The scales will weigh up to 25 tons and are the only platform scales to be found for public use between Eugene and Oakland.

In addition to buying and selling hay, grain and feeds, Mr. Roy will also stock a line of poultry supplies along with baby chickens which will be offered for sale.

The Cottage Grove Flour mill will also continue to operate the Cottage Grove Spray service.

Lake Facilities Contract \$45,340

Tauf Charneski, Eugene, has been awarded a \$45,340 contract by the Portland District, Corps of Engineers, for constructing public use facilities at three locations at Cottage Grove dam on the Coast Fork Willamette river.

From the best information available as we go to press, the contract mentioned above will include rest room facilities, comfort stations and camping facilities at the beach, across the highway from the home of the resident engineer, at the Wilson creek point and at the Shortridge point.

Two New Paintings By Mrs. Twing Now on Display

Mrs. A. Rose Twing of Dorena has added two more oil paintings to her collection in her studio at Dorena.

She has just recently completed paintings of Bing Crosby and Rochester, radio and screen stars. Approximately forty paintings have been completed to date.

The favorite paintings of Mrs. Twing are of Ernie Pyle, Abraham Lincoln, Will Rogers, and the late Senator McNary of Oregon.

Senator McNary's portrait was loaned to the State Senate from which Mrs. Twing received official state commendation for this particular painting.

Mrs. Twing, who was born in England, has never had a lesson in oil painting in her life. She has been busy with this creative hobby for years. She painted for approximately twenty years, but was forced to quit for a few years because of ill health. Her work was later resumed in 1941. At one time he had her own studio in San Francisco.

Mrs. Twing's mother painted Mitten China, a very expensive china made in Mitten, England, before her daughter's birth.

Her two latest paintings can be seen in a window at Nichols' Radio in the Cottage Grove Hotel building.

The Portland District, Corps of Engineers, has invited bids on six lots of used property at Dorena dam on the Row River. The property totals 115 different items, "including two kitchen sinks," according to Colonel Donald S. Burns, Portland District Engineer.

Lot one consists mostly of plumbing fittings; lot two contains electrical equipment; lot three includes building material; lot four has garbage cans and hot water tanks; lot five contains 1200 pounds of scrap iron, steel, brass and copper; and lot six includes four steel bridge sections and five approach spans.

The property will be sold to the highest bidders at 11 a.m., April 12 in room 678 Pittcock Block, Portland.

Cottage Grove Dog Wins Top Honors

Mrs. E. L. Knickerbocker's Doberman Pinscher, Carol's Cissi V Weiss, in her first major show, held at Salem April 1 and 2 proved quite a sensation among dog fanciers from British Columbia to California defeating champions and being judged best of females and returning to the ring to be awarded the much cherished purple and gold ribbon for "Best of Breed."

At the night performance when only "Best of Breeds" of all breeds compete the Knickerbocker dog again came through with a remarkable showing against champions and international champions by placing second in the Working Dog Group, beating the much favored Eugene Champion St. Bernard and the California champion Schnauzer. She was defeated in the competition by the Collie who in the final judging was awarded "Best in Show" trophy.

For a young dog, she being only 17 months old, to make such an outstanding showing, breeders, handlers as well as club officials were loud in their praise and all predicted an outstanding career in the show ring.

The Salem show was the first of the year's big shows and later in the month the dog will be shown in Spokane and from there she will go to British Columbia to compete for her Canada championship.

Carol was sired by the international champion Carol V. Weiss who retired from the show ring last year after there were no higher awards to be won.

C. G. Lumber Sold to Eugene Men on April 1st

The Cottage Grove Lumber Co. plant and holdings, located in the northeast section of Cottage Grove, owned by the Guy F. Atkinson Co. of San Francisco, has been sold to two Eugene men, Hugh Roberts and Vern Post, it was learned here Monday. The mill will still be operated under the name of the Cottage Grove Lumber Co. The sale was effective April 1. Mr. Roberts has purchased a home here and is moving his family to Cottage Grove. The immediate plans of Mr. Post were not announced.

The lumber plant here has been under the management of John Huntington for the past year and a half. Mr. Huntington has been connected with the Guy F. Atkinson Co., for the past three and a half years and will continue with the company with headquarters here. Mrs. Bonnie Schaffer, employed in the office of the Cottage Grove Lumber Co., will also continue with the Guy F. Atkinson Company.

The plant of the Cottage Grove Lumber Co., built several years ago, was operated by John Dugan and George Jacobson for sometime and was known as the electric mill. The mill has a daily capacity of 40,000 feet and employs 28 men.

17th Decennial Census Starts; 14 Enumerators in South Lane

Census takers started ringing the doorbells in south Lane county Saturday as the 17th census got under way and an estimated nearly 3,000,000 door bells rang over the nation. Three separate enumerations will be made covering the population, housing and agriculture. Mrs. P. F. Prescott, local crew leader announced Saturday that fourteen enumerators had been assigned districts and had started work. Within the city enumerators will work by voting precincts; in fact the census taking operations over the country will be worked by voting precincts.

Mrs. Grace E. Hansen, the first of the city enumerators was assigned to ward No. 2. The district assigned under the direction of Mrs. Prescott extends north to the Eugene area and follows: Blanton, Chester A. Crambill; Brumbaugh, Mildred A. Roby; Wolf Creek, Edna M. Stoll; Dorena, Frances McCormack; Goshen, Alice N. Burton; Latham, Helena Overgaard; Creswell, Wilma M. Dickerson; Row River, Alameda C. Downes; Silk Creek, Caroline B. Schultz; South Creswell, Maude M. Peavey; Spencer, Jefferson Hodges; College Crest, Melvin J. Cyr; Lorane, Evelyn L. Littlepage.

Results of the census will not be known until about six weeks and then the count will be announced as unofficial. Mrs. Prescott said she hoped the count in the district would be completed by April 21st and not later than April 30th.

Final tabulation of the census is expected to show that:

1. Women outnumber men for the first time in American history.
2. The center of population has moved from Indiana to Illinois.
3. The density of population has risen above 50 persons per square mile, compared with 44.2 in the last census in 1940.
4. The average American in 1950 is better schooled than he was 10 years ago.

Monty Lynch Car Fund Grows \$693

In the story of the Monty Lynch car fund, published in our last issue, not all of the story was told; nor was it revealed how the fund had grown and how the money had been spent. In checking the details, we find that Floyd Githens of the Floyd Githens Motors Inc., not only supplied the car at cost for the transportation of the 13 year old polio victim, but that he had the car repaired and conditioned at his own expense and then made a cash donation of \$200 to the Monty Lynch fund.

Other donors include: employees of the Twin Harbors Lumber Co., \$132.50; employees of W. A. Woodard Lumber Co., \$129.00; anonymous, \$2.00; S. F. Lumber Co., and employees, \$66.00; Cottage Grove Moose lodge, \$100.00; employees of Lane county, \$14.00; Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union No. 2917, \$50.00. The fund now totals \$693.40.

The expenses listed include the cost of the car which was \$350.00 and ambulance trips to the hospital before the car was purchased \$40.00. Total expenses \$590.00.

When the car has served its purpose, it will be sold and the funds returned to the donors to be used as they see fit. Mr. Githens of the Githens Motors has offered to dispose of the car without any commission or profit to himself or to his company.

Co. Manager Plan Short Two Names, Misses Ballot

The proposed county manager plan failed to make the May primary ballot. A final count of the valid names by the county election department Sunday showed that the petitions to place the county manager plan on the May ballot were two short of the necessary 3308 names required to place the issue on the ballot. The election department worked thru Sunday and could count only 3306 valid names.

Mel Wadman, county register of elections filed an order with the county court Monday, stating the number of certified signatures found. The court then signed an order denying the measure a place on the ballot.

Marvin Warlick, manager of the proposed charter committee, said following the count that the committee had no alibis. He said the committee started late and were too optimistic as to how much might be accomplished in the length of time allotted. He said the committee had several hundred extra names which came in after 5:00 p.m. on the final date and might have demanded that the petitions be received until midnight, but did not choose to press the point.

Warlick promised that the committee would be back two years from now with a fine, strong charter proposal.

High Winds, Warm Rains Cut Depth of Snow in Bohemia Area

Charlie Nordstrom came down from the Musick mine last week with word of a foot of new snow for each of the last four days of the recent storm and a total of six to seven feet on top. A high east wind along with sunny days and warm nights cut the depth of the snow down to a little over a foot by Friday when John Todd and Ted Richardson made the measurements. With all the recent melting the average depth of the measurement course at the Champion mine was 105 inches or a good deal above the average for the recent semi monthly measurements.

Reports also continue to come into the district ranger office at Rujada about the amount of timber across the roads and trails. This condition points to a major job ahead for the forest service crews in opening up some of the forest trails this spring.
