Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas. Private First Class David P. Larsen, 18, of Dorena has entered the Airplane and Engine Mechanics School at Sheppard Air Force Base, the home of the largest technical school of this type in the world.

During his 28-week course as a student at Sheppard he will receive intensive training designed to provide him with the thorough knowledge and basic skills required in servicing, inspecting and maintaining every type of aircraft currently used by the USAF.

MILK PRICE LOWERED

Grade A milk prices were lowered over Lane county a half cent effective April 1, which means the new price will be 19½ cents per quart. Other prices are \$1.90 per hundred weight and 90 cents a pound butterfat.

The decrease was made in accordance with an agreement made in January between producers and distributors, where distributors were permitted to charge one-half cent more per quart due to the adverse weather conditions over a three-month period ending the 31st of March.

Night Driving Is Most Exhausting

There's a reason why driving at night or on week ends may make you nervous, the state traffic safety division avers. Heavy traffic or darkness means danger with a capital "D".

Saturday and Sunday claim almost as many traffic victims as the rest of the week. Night accidents account for half of all deaths, although only a quarter of all accidents occur at night.

The division said Sunday was the most dangerous traffic day in 1949 with 67 fatal mishaps, closely followed by Saturday with 60. Tuesday was safest with 25.

Overdriving headlights is the usual fatal error in night driving, the division warned. Overdriving headlights means being unable to stop in the distance clearly illuminated ahead, leaving the driver at the mercy of unexpected obstacles or events.

Wet or slippery pavements come in for only a small share of the blame. Nearly four-fifths of Oregon's fatal accidents occur on dry road surfaces.

U. N. HUMAN RIGHTS DAY MARKED IN 44 COUNTRIES

LAKE SUCCESS, New York—The first anniversary of the adoption and proclamation of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights was celebrated in at least 44 countries throughout the world, according to reports received at United Nations headquarters here.

Governments of many countries, including Afghanistan, Austria, Belgium, Bolivia, Cuba, Ecuador, Egypt, France, Greece, Haiti, Israel, Turkey, the United Kingdom and the United States, either issued decrees or proclamations, setting aside 10 December as Human Rights Day or sponsored special observances in school programs and radio broadcasts.

Celebrations were also held in Argentina, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, the Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Honduras, India, Iran, Iraq, Italy, Japan, Lebanon, Mexico, Monaco, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Norway, Pakistan, the Philippines, Poland, Sweden, Switzerland, Syria, Thailand, the Union of South Africa and Uruguay.

Nitrogen Cures Pasture Lag in Wet Cold Spring

Give your pastures a boost with an application of nitrogen.

That's the suggestion of Arthur S. King, O.S.C. extension soil conservation specialist, who adds that peak feed production for either grazing or silage will be available a month earlier on fertilized pastures.

He states that good pasture seedlings will profit from an application which contains 30 to 40 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre.

This quantity of nitrogen would be supplied in 150 to 200 pounds of ammonium sulphate or its equivalent in other nitrogen fertilizers.

On good seedlings of mixed grasses and legumes, King asserts the use of 200 pounds of ammonium sulphate or its equivalent will produce enough extra feed equal to more than a ton of good hay. Nitrogen applications made at any time during the year will increase pasture growth, but early spring applications are especially effective.

Use of nitrogen as a top dressing on fall seeded grains to be cut for either hay or grain offers another possibility for increasing feed production. Twenty to 30 pounds of available nitrogen applied at this season of the year as a top dressing will result in profit, the specialist believes, adding that heavier applications may be in order on poorer soils.

Growers of perennial grass who cut their crop for seed generally recognize the need for spring nitrogen applications of between 30 and 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

The late, wet spring this year has delayed application of nitrogen bearing fertilizers on many farms in the state. Some growers, King states, are making use of airplane applications to good advantage. Wet soil could easily delay ground applications until they will be too late to promote early spring growth.

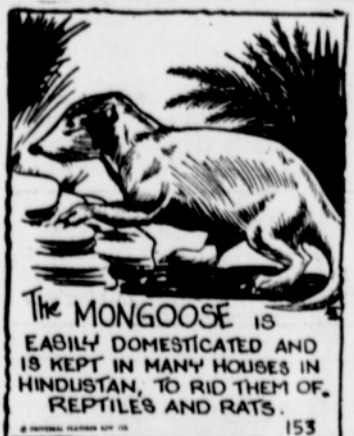

BEALS CLARIFIES DEAL ON GAS STATION FEES

Many service station operators in Oregon who have failed to remit for their 1949-50 motor fuel licenses apparently believe they are being subjected to a double tax. But this is not the case, explains O. K. Beals, chief of the division of food and dairies and weights and measures of the state department of agriculture.

Beals says this confusion is due to repeal of one law and enactment of another, both of which assessed fees against service stations, but for different purposes.

The last legislature took the old gasoline standardization act of 1933 off the books. This law, enacted primarily to regulate the quality of gasoline sold in Oregon, had nothing whatever to do with the accuracy of dispensing pumps. The fee paid under the law covered a calendar year.
