

### So. County Road Around Dorena Lake Threatened

What is known as the south county road around the Dorena lake is threatening to slide at the "viewpoint," a 150 yards or so east of the south part of the dam. John Trunnell, south Lane road supervisor said the county crew was watching the road, but so far no serious danger appeared or at least had not appeared Monday. The road is still open to travel. Cracks are visible among the trees

at the viewpoint and extend to the road. Also some of the fill a short distance away has sluffed into the lake, but the road is still wide enough to afford travel in safety.

### The Upper Willamette Trout Liberations Are in Full Swing

Charles Lockwood, Oregon State game director stated today that liberation tankers transferred 118,000 legal-sized rainbow trout from holding ponds of the Willamette Fish Hatchery near Oakridge to streams of the Upper Willamette River system in March. The Middle Fork of the Willamette River received 56,000 trout, Hill's Creek 14,000, Salt Creek 9,900, and Salmon Creek 10,000 fish. Other heavy plantings were made in the North Fork of the Willamette River, Big Fall Creek, Little Fall Creek, Winberry Creek, Mosby Creek, and Sharps Creek. The trout were all yearling fish which had been held through the winter at the Willamette Hatchery so that a good growth could be obtained.

### Fish Hatchery Facilities Expanded

Carrying on with the enlargement and improvement of Oregon's trout hatcheries, the Oregon State Game Commission recently approved a series of new hatchery improvements.

Bid invitations have been issued for construction work at six game-fish hatcheries. This construction work is in line with the new Game Commission's program to develop and expand Oregon's fish hatchery facilities.

A large holding pond will be constructed at the Butte Falls Hatchery near Medford. This pond will be used to hold fish through the winter months, so that they may be released at legal-size the following year.

The Bandon Fish Hatchery on the southern Oregon coast will receive five new fish ponds, three to serve as nursery ponds for young fish, and two to serve as holding ponds for brood fish. An additional water system will also be installed. A large earth dam which was washed out during the recent winter floods will be replaced.

Fall River Fish Hatchery near Bend will receive five, and possibly ten, new nursery fish ponds. These ponds will be used for rearing fingerling trout which will be flown into the back country lakes of the Cascade Mountains.

Wizard Falls Hatchery on the Metolius River, Oregon's newest trout hatchery, will acquire three more ponds for rearing legal-sized trout. An additional water system will also be provided for these ponds.

A new hatchery building will be built at the Willamette Hatchery near Oakridge to replace the present hatchery building. This building will house the troughs and trays in which the fish eggs are developed. A home for an assistant hatcheryman will also be built.

A new bridge will replace the present one providing access to the Hood River Hatchery over Deadpoint Creek.

Sealed bids for these projects will be opened April 21, 1950.

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Construction of a new hatchery building for the Willamette Hatchery to replace the old one was recently approved by the Game Commission. This building will house the trays of developing trout eggs. A home for an assistant will also be built.

### Grovers Take a Back Seat in First Track Meeting

The Cottage Grove Lions had to take a back seat in the first track meet of the season at Hayward field in Eugene Saturday, placing third in a triangular meet between Springfield, Albany and Cottage Grove. The poor showing of the Lions was due to the fact that the team was dogged by injuries and by the absence of seven lettermen.

Springfield took the meet with a total of 80 points to 40½ for Albany and 31½ for Cottage Grove. Springfield copped seven first places, Albany four firsts to three firsts for Cottage Grove. Ron Hite of Cottage Grove won first in high hurdles and tied for first place in the low hurdles with Smiley of Springfield. Bob Cook won the high jump with a height of 5 feet 10 inches. Derald Jenkins of Springfield was the best performer of the meet with first place in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.2. He also won the 220 yard dash with a time of 24.3 and second place in the broad jump with a distance of 19.3.

The new method of contacting every person in a community will keep the disease down.

In October the mobile unit will be in Springfield for approximately 23 days. At this time the unit may visit Cottage Grove for 1 day but no day has yet been set for a complete coverage of this district.

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### 4-H Scholarships To Be Given on Basis of Merit

All 4-H scholarships to summer school or 4-H club camp should be awarded to the club members on the basis of merit—was one of the recommendations in the report of the scholarship sub-committee of the 4-H Home Economics Advisory Council, given at the council meeting March 27 in Eugene.

The report given by Mrs. J. M. Seaver, Mt. View, chairman of the committee, and which was unanimously accepted by the council included the following recommendations:

1. Group or individuals wishing to award scholarships should notify the 4-H office by May 15 so reservations can be made to accommodate the club members at camp or summer school.

2. The donor in cooperation with the local 4-H leader, appoint a scholarship committee of three to five unbiased people to make the selection of club members to receive scholarships.

3. That scholarships be awarded to clubs and all members of club be allowed to apply for them.

4. As club members receiving scholarships receive first preference to attend camp or summer school, that the minimum amount to be called a scholarship should be \$7.00. Scholarships may be any amount above that, up to the total cash value of the tuition. (Tuition for camp will be approximately \$14.00, summer school, approximately \$23.00.)

5. That club members be selected on the basis of merit which would take into consideration project work, record book, club activities and character.

A full report and recommendation concerning scholarships with all details, are available to 4-H leaders and friends from the 4-H club office, Old Postoffice Building, Eugene.
