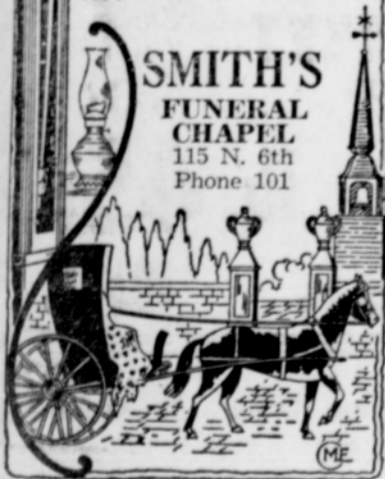
First Methodist Church, 334 Washington avenue, Frank E. Brown, minister.

Oregon State college—"Conservation of Souls and Soils" has been selected as the theme for the 1950 Leadership Institute for Town and Country Churches at Oregon State college July 11 to 14, according to W. L. Teutsch, assistant director of the O.S.C. extension service and institute chairman.

The institute is sponsored by Oregon State college in cooperation with the Oregon Council of Churches, the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon and the Home Missions Council of North America, and other denominations. It is interdenominational.

Both pastors and laymen from town and country churches will spend the week on the campus reviewing rural problems, especially as they concern conservation, and becoming acquainted with methods that have been effective in town and country work. Members of the O.S.C. regular and summer session faculties and religious and lay leaders will be on the institute staff.
