Serve Good, Hearty Desserts

HEARTY desserts; that's the ticket to round out meals for young folks, not to mention those adult members who like to tuck away a good meal, too.

Bread pudding isn't exactly a glamor dessert, especially as served at many a table, but there are wonderful recipes that when served always invoke quick demands for "seconds." Good, nourishing and hearty is this deluxe bread pudding job, as prepared for 6. Combine 2 c. scalded milk, 2 tbs. melted butter, and one c. stale bread cut in 1/2-inch cubes in greased baking dish. Add 1/2 c. sugar 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. vanilla, 1/2 tsp. almond extract to 2 eggs; beat slightly. Add to milk mixture; stir in one c. coconut, shredded, toasted.

To toast shredded coconut, spread in thin layer in pan or baking sheet. Place under broiler or in 400 F. Toaster until coconut is golden brown, stirring frequently. Take care it does not burn.

Another Bread Pudding
 Chocolate lends its flavor to another bread pudding recipe. To

serve 6, cut in pieces 1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate; add to 3 c. milk in double boiler; heat. When chocolate is melted, beat with rotary egg beater until blended. Combine one c. sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt and 3 slightly beaten eggs. Add chocolate mixture gradually, stirring vigorously. Add 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Place 1 1/2 c. stale bread, cut in 1/2-inch cubes, in greased baking dish. Pour mixture over it. Place dish in pan of hot water; bake in 350 F. 50 min. or until pudding is firm. Serve hot with butterscotch sauce, or cold with cream. Delicious either way.

A good, delicately-spiced baked custard is an excellent choice when one has to cater to an invalid, an old person or youngsters. And now that eggs have come down, a custard isn't such an extravagance as it was but a short while back. Scald quart milk; add 2 heaping tsp. instant coffee, and stir well. Cool slightly. Add 1/2 c. sugar, 1/2 tsp. vanilla and 1/4 tsp. each salt and nutmeg to 4 eggs (or 3 yolks) slightly beaten. Add hot milk gradually, stirring constantly. Turn into well-buttered baking dish. Set in pan of hot water; bake at 300 F. about 30 min., or until set.

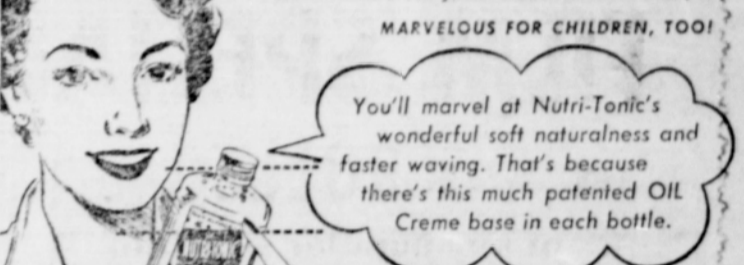
