"The Prince of Peace," new full-length Hallmark cinecolor production coming to the Diane Theater 4 days, April 23 through the 26 is just what Jimmy Fidler has been asking for. Re-upholstering Made Easy With OSC Picture Aid

An illustrated booklet describing how to re-upholster an overstuffed chair at home is now available from O.S.C. Its 46 pages contain 112 photographs.

Written expressly for women without previous upholstering experience, the bulletin, number 698, is entitled "Re-upholstering a Chair at Home." The author is Mrs. Myrtle Carter, O.S.C. extension service home furnishing specialist.

As with other college publications, copies of the new bulletin are available free from county extension offices or direct from the college.

Without attempting to show methods used by professional upholsters, the author shows by photographs and a minimum of reading material the step-by-step process of renovating and overstuffed chair. With added experience in this type of work, most anyone can adapt the basic upholstery principles involved to other types of chairs and davenport which may require re-upholstering or repair. Mrs. Carter believes.

Equipment and materials required are described at length and many of the items are also pictured. The bulletin is considered so basic and easy to follow that if other state extension services have ordered copies for distribution in their states.

Re-upholstery steps described include replacing webbing, sewing springs to the webbing base, spring typing, placing burlap over the springs, padding and covering. Considerable descriptive material with drawings and photographs is included on how to make edge rolls.

Tools required to do re-upholstery work, according to the bulletin, include a light weight hammer, webbing stretcher, needles, upholstery pins or skewers, ripping tools, shears, pliers, screw driver, tapes, dressmakers chalk and china marking or wax pencil. A cording foot attachment for a sewing machine is required in making cord trim.

Softwood Forests Overcut in USA 50%, FAO Finds

LAKE SUCCESS, New York—The USA is now over-cutting its soft-wood forests by nearly 50 per cent and faces serious shortages unless reforestation is increased to keep pace with consumption, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) warns here in a survey prepared for the U.N. sub-Commission in Economic Development, scheduled to open its fourth session on April 17.

Canada, on the other hand, can in the long run more than double her present output of forest products, the report says. The report outlines the world's present forest resources; summarizes needs in major regions; proposes methods for reducing waste in forestry operations and increasing yields; and discusses the place of forestry in the expanded program for economic development being planned by U.N. and its Specialized Agencies, including FAO.

Discussing present and potential supplies of forests products, the report points out that "from a global point of view, the productive forests of the world are inherently capable of yielding far greater supplies of wood than they have hitherto done, provided they are managed in accordance with forestry principles and devastation is brought to a halt."

In a regional review, the report indicates that European forests (excluding the USSR) have been overcut in recent years, but that their yield could be increased through extension of forested areas, improvements in stocking, better forestry management and other steps.

The USSR contains about one-fourth of the productive forest

areas of the world, the document estimates, and "the reserves of forests in the eastern part of the Soviet Union are so great that the USSR may also be able to support substantial volumes of lumber and pulp to shortage areas in Asia and the Far East, even though domestic demands for wood progressively increase."

The report also stresses the serious shortage of lumber in the Near East and North Africa, pointing out that the extreme denudation and desiccation of the land makes further development of agriculture practically impossible until some degree of tree cover is established in strategic localities.
