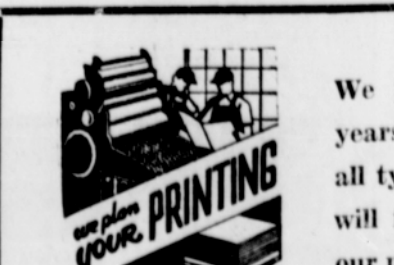

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A Singer's Favorite Recipes

WHAT wonderful young women our great American singers are! And the greater, the more successful they are, the more they seem to enjoy all phases of home-making. Not long ago we sat enthralled, watching Astrid Varnay, one of the busiest of the leading sopranos of the Metropolitan Opera Company, as she sang "Salome" on the great stage. An hour or so after the last curtain calls, there she was, entertaining colleagues and friends at a little post-midnight collation. How does she do it? Well, one of her secrets is before-hand preparation. She prepares spreads, sets out various crackers and breads and lets her guests make their own canapés and sandwiches. With beverages and a prepared dessert and fruit, she finds this sufficient at such a late hour.

Cheddar Cheese
Miss Varnay is of Swedish-Hungarian parentage and her ancestry is reflected in her recipes, some of which she has set forth for our readers. Liptauer she makes with about 1/2 lb. of soft cheddar mixed with 1/4 lb. Roquefort cheese and 3/4 lb. butter. To this she adds 1/2 onion, chopped very fine, 2 tsp. capers and 4 well-mashed anchovies, with tbsp. prepared mustard, a few caraway seeds, pepper, salt and paprika to taste. The mixture is well beaten to a fine smooth consistency. And is it good!

Another favorite Varnay spread which the soprano likes to put out with the dark, and slightly Swedish bread or Swedish crisp, is of Scandinavian origin, and easily prepared. Mix left-over mashed potatoes with finely-cut pickled herring, adding chopped chives and parsley.



Wife Preservers
Try using sour cream instead of milk in your mashed potatoes. It sharpens the flavor. Mash potatoes, add sour cream and sprinkle with chopped chives or parsley.



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Whipped Cream

Goose liver sausage or ordinary liverwurst can be interestingly treated, according to Miss Varnay. Filter she blends with whipped cream, chopped olives and chopped parsley. Or she mixes the mashed sausage with chopped nuts and chopped green peppers. Either is delicious and different.

Cream cheese plays an important part in two of the singer's original concoctions. One known as "Crabmeat Varnay", employs equal parts of Roquefort and cream cheese with a dash of lemon juice, a drop or so of tabasco and a small amount of red pepper, mixed together. To this is added chilled, shredded crabmeat, mayonnaise and catsup.

Another spread is simply sour cream added to cream cheese to make it smooth and spreadable. A whole garlic clove, a small onion, a small raw carrot, and 2 or 3 red radishes are grated in, with salt and pepper to taste.

Also made with cream cheese, but somewhat sweeter, is another delicious mixture. A package of cream cheese is moistened with tbsp. sweet cream. Then 4 tbsp. chopped ginger, 4 tbsp. chopped walnuts are added, and a tiny dash of paprika is sprinkled over all. All of these spreads are different and a real find, we think, for a hostess who likes to surprise her guest with eatable novelties — for not all novel dishes are very palatable, we have found!

Mechanized Farms
Four out of every five Americans were farmers a century ago, whereas today fewer than one out of every seven produce our food and fiber. The reason is, of course, that mechanization of farm production has increased man's productivity manifold. Yet there are times when a farmer will swear that he would trade the best of his ones for a good team of horses.

Sour Wine
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
