

West Coast Lumber Nation's Favorite

PORTLAND, April 1 (Special)

—Biggest industrial story to come out of the Pacific Northwest in 1950 is the remarkable gains being chalked up by the West Coast lumber industry. In 1949, West Coast mills of western Washington and Oregon, shipped 733,000,000 more board feet of lumber than in 1948. Each year since the war, sales and shipments of Douglas fir, West Coast hemlock, Sitka spruce and Western Red cedar have climbed higher.

Considerable credit for this outstanding increase in use of lumber from this reason, by American homebuilders and industrial users, is given to the four-year-old national advertising and promotion campaign of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association. Millions of Americans now know about West Coast lumber who had never heard of it before the war.

Lumber experts point out that national lumber consumption dropped off 4.1 billion feet for other producing regions of the nation in 1949 from 1948 highs, while West Coast mills were experiencing their fourth straight year of increased production, sales and shipments.

The 733 million feet gain for 1949 was worth \$23,822,500 more in wages to loggers and mill employees. It took an additional 24,433 freight cars to haul this increased shipment of West Coast lumber to eastern markets.

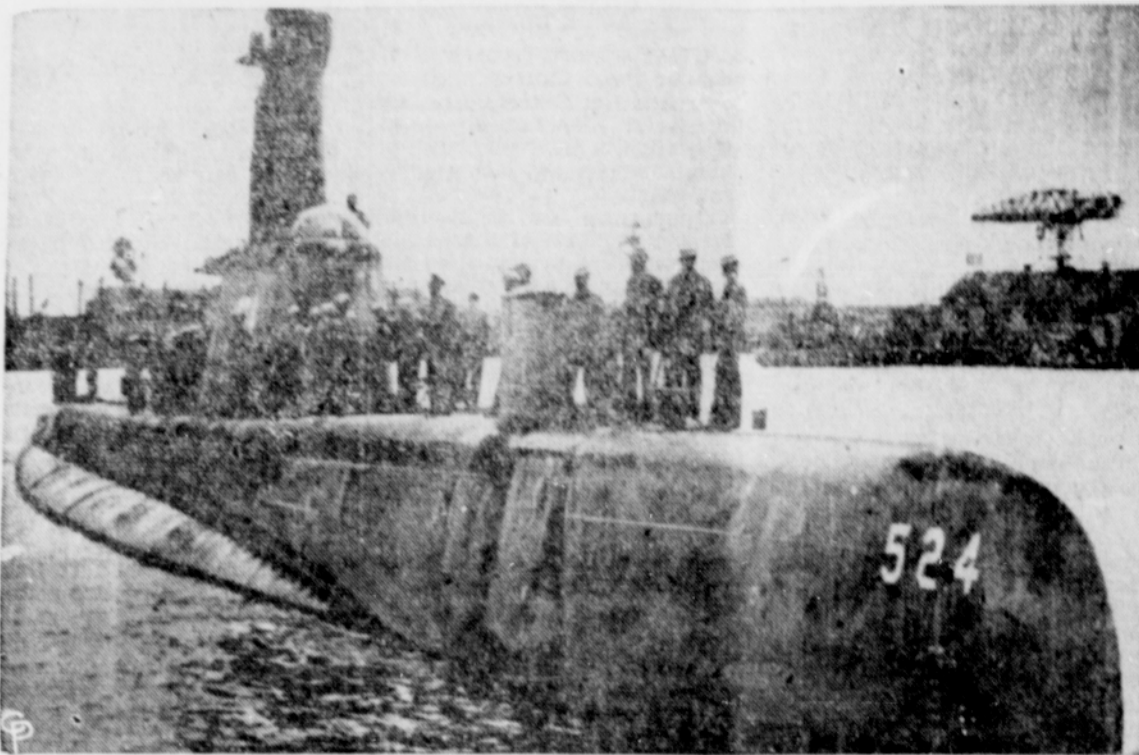
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RECORD-BREAKING SUBMARINE REACHES HAWAII

Increasing the rate for local calls from coin boxes in Portland, Salem and Eugene to 10 cents, a change favored by regulatory bodies in several of the states, also is included in the company's proposal. This would require changing the present "pay phones" so that a user could deposit either a dime or two nickels to make a local call.

The Company also is applying for increased rates in Washington, Nevada and California, it was said.

The principal telephone rate changes proposed for Cottage Grove, according to L. S. Eade, manager here, are as follows:

Local Service	Monthly Charges*
Business Individual	\$6.75 \$7.75
Business Two-Party	5.25 5.75
Residence Individual	4.25 4.50
Residence Two-Party	3.50 3.75
Residence Four-Party	2.75 3.05
Suburban Business	4.00 4.75
Suburban Residence	3.00 3.30

* Rates do not include Federal excise tax.

There will be no change in present charges for farmer line telephones or for business or residence extension telephones.
Day station intrastate long distance rates will not be changed, except that on present 10 cent routes the initial period will be 3 minutes instead of 5 minutes. Minor increases at certain mileage steps ranging from 5 cents to 25 cents are proposed for night and Sunday station, as well as person long distance rates.

Three demonstrations on control of Tansy Ragwort will be observed on Tuesday, April 25, according to W. B. Parker, county extension agent.

Tuesday, April 25, 10:00 a.m. John Samuels' farm, 12 miles West of Eugene in the Central Community.

1:00 p.m. S. W. Bayless' farm on Camp Creek, two and one-half miles East of Hayden Bridge.

4:00 p.m. Noble Elliott's farm, five miles South of Cottage Grove on Mosby Creek.

Methods of control of this noxious weed will be discussed by Rex Warren, farm crops specialist, Oregon State College. This demonstration has been arranged in co-operation with the crops committee of the Lane County Agricultural Council. All people interested are invited to attend.

Apples, bananas, and other fruits which are cut up for salads may be dipped in canned or fresh citrus or pineapple juice to keep the fruit from turning dark.



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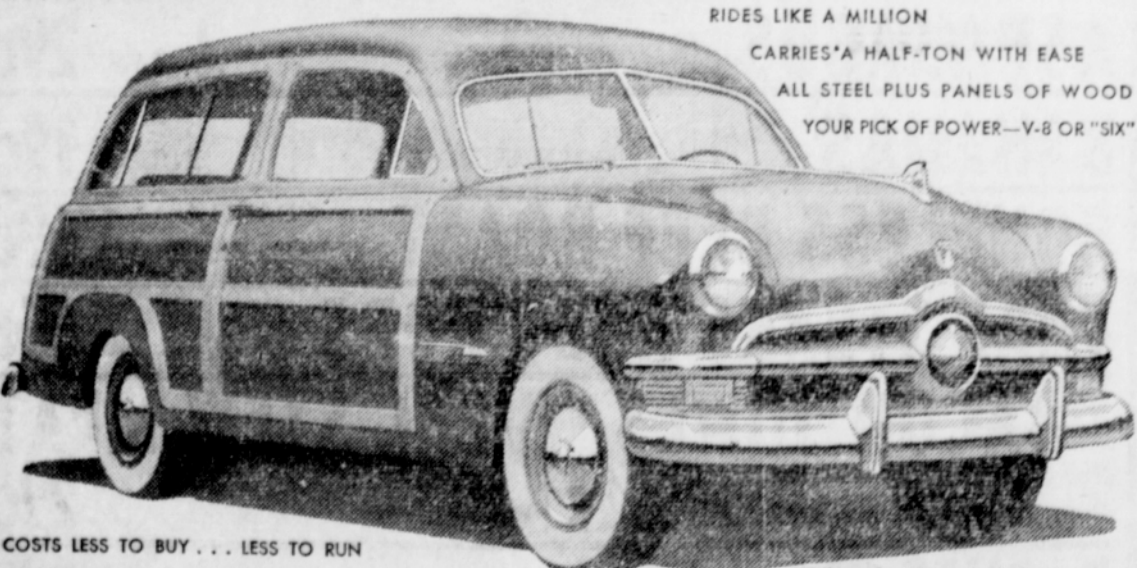
