Pheasant eggs are shipped direct from the nearest Game Farm to the 4-H member and will be shipped after April 15, 1950.

LOGGER KILLED AT POND IN SUTHERLIN

Warren Freeman, Sutherlin, formerly of Astoria, was killed about 3 p.m. Monday while working at the mill pond of the Rock Island Lumber Company, Sutherlin, Harry Stearns, coroner, reported today.

Freeman was working on a pile of logs which suddenly shifted. He was thrown 25 feet to the water, where he hit a floating log. He was under the water approximately five minutes before it was possible to pull him to the surface.

Whether death was due to the blow or to drowning has not been determined.

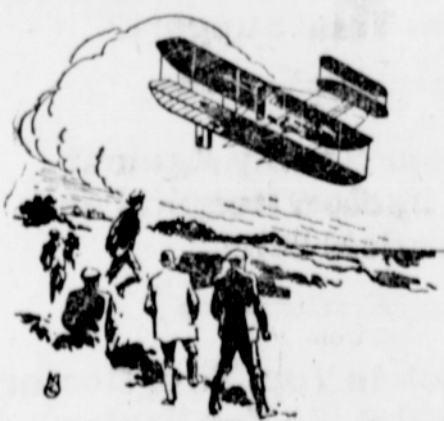
