

Linfield College A Capella Choir in Concert April 23



The First Baptist church is happy to present the Linfield college A Capella choir in a special concert Sunday afternoon at 3:00 p.m. at the church. This outstanding group, made up of 45 carefully selected voices, is directed by Professor H. Johann Eschbach, Master of Music from the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago.

During each Christmas and Spring vacation at the college, the

choir takes an extended tour, singing before large audiences throughout the northwest. They have sung in places including the Exposition Gardens in Vancouver, B.C. and the civic auditoriums of both Portland and San Francisco. Their precision and interpretation of music is thrilling.

The main work to be sung in this Sunday's concert is "The Peaceable Kingdom" by a contemporary composer, Randall Thomp-

son. It consists of a group of eight short and extremely expressive sections, all with texts from Isaiah. They will also sing a Bach motet in German, "O Sing Ye to the Lord," several spirituals, and a group of secular folk songs.

A capacity crowd is expected for this concert at the First Baptist church. The public is cordially invited to attend. There is no admission charge. The traveling expenses of the group will be cared for through a free-will offering.

DR. SABINE NEW DEAN

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 17 (Special)—Appointment of Dr. Gordon A. Sabine to head the University of Oregon journalism school is announced by President H. K. Newburn.

Dr. Sabine, a member of the journalism faculty for the past two years, was appointed dean of the school and associate professor, succeeding Dean Clifford E. Weigle, who will leave in June to become associate director of the Institute for Journalistic Studies at Stanford University. The new appointment is subject to confirmation by the state board of higher education.

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World Sugar Situation Reviewed by UN Agency

WASHINGTON—World production of sugar during the crop year of 1949-1950, exclusive of production in the USSR, is likely to amount to 31,500,000 metric tons, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) estimates here.

In the first of a series of periodic reviews of the world sugar situation, FAO points out that this would mean a slight decline from the all-time record production of 31,900,000 metric tons reached in 1948-1949. On the other hand, the report says, Soviet production is expected to show an increase of 500,000 tons over last year's estimate of 1,800,000 metric tons.

However, FAO warns that the production decline this year, as compared with the previous year, is more significant than appears at first sight. It comes at a time when high levels of national production, employment and income coupled with the progressive removal of restrictions on consumption are leading to higher sugar consumption. Furthermore, world population is increasing by approximately 25,000,000 persons a year, or at the rate of slightly more than one per cent.

Assuming that the population

of the world (exclusive of the USSR) was approximately 2,175,000,000 in the middle of 1949, and that it will reach 2,200,000,000 by the middle of this year, the amount of sugar available per person would show a decline from 14.7 kilograms to 14.3 kilograms.

INDIA STUDIES POPULATION

PARIS—India, homeland of more than one-sixth of the world's inhabitants, is establishing an institute for the study of population statistics. Dr. S. P. Chandrasekhar, until recently in charge of population research for the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (Unesco), will be director of the institute, the first of its kind in India.

KEEP IN ITALY

Asa B. Keep, seaman apprentice, USN, of Lorane is scheduled to arrive in Naples, Italy, April 22 aboard the light cruiser USS Roanoke, which has been engaged in fleet maneuvers with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

The visit to Naples was arranged to afford the ship's crews a period of relaxation ashore and an opportunity to visit the beautiful Italian countryside.

Lt. Byron Foster Wears Wings as Air Force Pilot

Scott Air Force Base, Ill.—Lieutenant Byron Foster son of Mr. and Mrs. George Foster of Thornton Corners now wears the bars and silver wings of an Air Force Officer and pilot after thirteen months of intensive pilot training. This announcement was made today by Major General Robert W. Harper, Commanding General, Air Training Command, at Scott Air Force Base, Illinois.

Lieutenant Foster began his flying training in Texas last year. During a six-month period of basic pilot training, he flew a 650 horsepower airplane, the T-6 "Texan" for approximately 130 hours. This training included night flying, instrument flying, aerobatics, navigation and cross-country.

In addition to the flying, he followed an intensive course of study in academic subjects related to aviation.

The superior pilot training of the Air Force which has been developed since the war, prepared him to fly a combat type airplane during the last six months of his training.

Lieutenant Foster was selected for fighter training in the F-51 "Mustang" at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, when he completed basic pilot training. He flew this famous World War II fighter plane in simulated fighter formations before graduating there recently. He is now prepared to take his place in the officer-ranks of the United States Force alongside graduates of the service academies at West Point and Annapolis.

Lieutenant Foster graduated from the Cottage Grove high school in 1945, attended the Montana school of Mines at Butte, Montana for one term, the Colorado College at Colorado Springs for two terms and the University of Oregon for one term.

His military history includes: V12 two years, 1 July 1945 - 6 Sept. 1946; Montana school of Mines - Colorado College, University of Oregon, Naval Aviation Cadet, Sept. 1946 - 20 April 1947; Flying Midshipman 1947-March 1948. Entered Aviation Cadets again in March 1949.

JUDGE WIMBERLY SENTENCES HUFF

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly sentenced one man to the Oregon State penitentiary and revoked the probation of a second Friday.

Marshall Huff, 36, charged with obtaining money by false pretenses, was sentenced to serve one year in the penitentiary. He pleaded guilty to the district attorney's information that he had cashed a worthless check for \$16.20 on the Rainbow cafe.

Judge Wimberly revoked the probation of Phil Halstead, who on Oct. 7, 1949, pleaded guilty to a charge of drawing a bank check with insufficient funds. He was sentenced to serve a year in the penitentiary, provided he make restitution for the worthless check and abide by the rules of parole and probation.

The two were taken to Salem by Deputy Sheriff Ira Byrd.

LANE RECEIVES \$1884 LIQUOR TAX SHARE

Lane County received \$1884.38 Wednesday, its share of state liquor privilege taxes distributed by the secretary of state's office for the first three months of 1950.

A total of \$190,000 was distributed with \$142,000 going to the counties. The rest went to the state general fund.

Lane County's share will go into the public assistance fund according to the treasurer's office.

AAA URGES TAX REPEAL

Repeal of the federal automotive excise taxes was urged today by the board of directors of the Oregon State Motor Association, AAA motor club in Oregon, according to Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president.

Dr. McDaniel said the Oregon AAA club was joining other AAA clubs throughout the nation in urging the congress to "lift the unwarranted excise tax burden off the shoulders of American motorists."

New Circulars Cover Spray List For Stone Fruit

Controls for diseases and insect pests of peaches, plums and cherries in western Oregon are outlined in a series of new circulars of information issued by the Oregon State college agricultural experiment station.

Spray programs listing the recommended spray materials and their time of application for control of the various diseases and insect pests of the fruits are included in the circulars.

The spray program for peaches covers brown rot, blight, leaf-curl, mildew and 11-spotted cucumber beetle, mites, peach-twig borer, bud moth and aphids.

Controls for trips and brown rot are discussed in detail in the prune control publication. Recommendations are also outlined for control of the San Jose scale, twig miner, Lecanium scale, bud moth, Syneta beetle and aphids.

Recommendations for control of brown rot, leaf spot, the cherry fruit fly, Syneta leaf beetle, bud moth, aphids, Lecanium, San Jose scale and cherry slug are found in the circular on control of cherry diseases and insect pests.

The circular on peaches—number 476—and plums, 477—were prepared by S. C. Jones, associate entomologist for the experiment station, and A. P. Steenland, extension plant pathologist. Circular of information 478 on control of cherry diseases and insects was written by Jones, Steenland, R. W. Every, extension entomology specialist, and R. H. Robinson, experiment station chemist.

Copies of the publications are available free at the office of county agents or from the college.

LAMB SHOW JUNE 13TH

Portland, April 17—More than 1000 lambs are expected to be entered in the show and sale of 1950 market lambs to be held at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition arena in North Portland June 13.

The new project, expected to become an annual event, was conceived by the Oregon Purebred Sheep Breeders' Association. Other active interests include the Portland Union Stockyards, the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, livestock commission firms and packer interests.

Judging will occur at 9:30 a.m. on June 13, to be followed by an auction sale in the afternoon.

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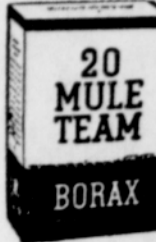


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
