Grovers Separated 1½ Points From Hayward Trophy

The Cottage Grove track squad came away from the Hayward relay at Eugene Friday lacking 1½ points of tying Ashland for first place and a half a point more of winning the meet, which would have been the third time and permanent possession of the trophy. Red Englert was beaten an inch by Bob Shofstall of Redmond, a former resident, in the javelin throw. Shofstall won fourth place. The best Cottage Grove high jumper could do was third place in this event, although they had made a better record in practice sessions.

The Grove boys managed to set a new record in the shuttle hurdle race with the three man team of Ray Webb, Ron Hite and Albert Martin. The mark was 39.7 in 1949, the new was 39.6.

Ashland took the Hayward relay with a total of 42½ points to 41 for Cottage Grove, a two time winner. Ashland won the necessary 1½ points in the shuttle hurdles with fifth place. Four teams in the class B meet now have two legs on the trophy: Cottage Grove, Ashland, Beaverton, and Molalla.

Another Lane county school scored 28 points to win its first leg on the class C trophy. Banks finished second with 25 points and Creswell third with 24.

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Disabled Veterans To Get Hunting Fishing Licenses at Discount

War veterans with disabilities of 25 percent or more may purchase Oregon fishing or hunting licenses for one dollar, the Department of Veterans Affairs was advised this week. They must have been Oregon residents for one year immediately prior to applying, according to the Oregon State Game commission, which administers the act.

Application is made through the game commission at 1634 S. W. Alder, Portland. Forms are available from the commission, or from county veterans' service officers, county clerks, and the state veterans' department at 305 State Library Bldg., Salem, and 415 S. W. 11th avenue, Portland.

Those who received the special licenses last year need only submit their old licenses as evidence, the game commission said. New applicants must:

1. Obtain a disability statement from the Veterans Administration regional office, Portland.

2. Submit a witness' notarized statement as to residence, along with the evidence of disability. If the veteran is applying in person at the commission, he should bring his witness with him.

Spring Football Practice Underway At Oregon State

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, April 24 — Spring football practice is well into its third week at Oregon State and Coach Kip Taylor is beginning to get a pretty good line on his new men.

"I am greatly pleased with the morale and the intensity with playing," Taylor declared. "However, our techniques in many departments are still very poor and need much more work," he added.

The end of the second week of drills was climaxed last Saturday afternoon with an intra-squad game on Bell field. A Blue Shirt team led by veteran quarterback Gene Morrow and letterman right half Ralph Carr edged out an 18-13 victory over the Whites. Morrow pitched accurate passes to Carr for two of the Blue touchdowns.

New men have been showing up well at nearly all positions and have made it plain that a number of veterans will have to battle for their positions. Bill Storey, freshman basketball forward, who did not turn out for Rook football last fall; and Don Bradley, transfer from California Poly, have been looking good at ends along with the veteran John Thomas.

Doug Hogland, a standout on the freshman eleven last fall, looks like a great varsity tackle prospect. Sophomore Chuck Oettinger, another freshman stalwart last season; and Fred Burri, varsity reserve a year ago, have been showing up very well at guards. Dale Walker, a reserve last year, has shown considerable improvement at his center post.

In the backfield Bob Redkey, transfer right half from Grays Harbor junior college; and Bud Woodward, transfer fullback from Long Beach, Calif. junior college, both have been looking very good. Woodward was one of the leading ground gainers in last Saturday's practice game. Ralph Carr, a letterman reserve last season, has been showing up well at the offensive right half post.

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Bids Accepted on Six State Game Trout Hatcheries

At the regular meeting of the Oregon State Game commission April 21, the game commission accepted low bids for construction work at six Oregon trout hatcheries.

A 50 by 100 foot concrete holding pond will be constructed at the Butte Falls hatchery near Medford by Henry Den-Herder for \$9,948. The work also includes an additional water system for the holding pond. The new pond will be used for rearing large fish.

A 28 foot steel and concrete bridge will replace the present bridge over Deadpoint creek at the Hood River hatchery. R. and M. Construction Company bid \$3,675 for this job.

The Willamette hatchery near Oakridge will receive a new hatchery building and a home for an assistant hatcheryman. Both buildings will be constructed by Robert C. Wilson, contractor, for \$15,500.

Three 20 by 100 foot holding ponds will be added at the game commission's new Wizard Falls hatchery on the Metolius river by Teller Construction Company for \$16,765.

Ten 20 by 100 foot nursery ponds will be built at the Fall River hatchery near Bend by Teller Construction Company for \$33,759. Fingerling trout reared in these ponds will supplement the present stocking of Cascade lakes.

At the Bandon hatchery on the southern Oregon coast one 15 by 30 foot, two 20 by 100 foot, and

two 20 by 120 foot concrete ponds will be installed by the Teller Construction Company for \$30,678. This work also includes replacement of a large earth dam washed out this past winter, and the installation of a new water system. Three of the new ponds will serve as nursery ponds for young fish and the other three will serve as holding ponds for brood fish.

This construction work is a part of the game commission's new development and expansion program for Oregon's game fish hatcheries.

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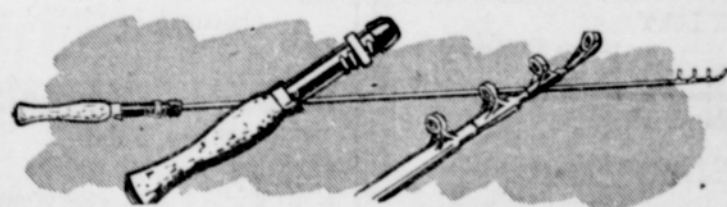
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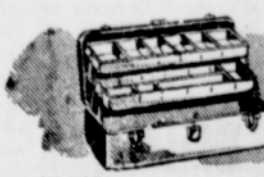
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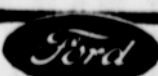
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
