Field Meetings to Discuss Fertilizer On Pastures to be Held May 16 and 17

Field meetings to observe and in February on permanent pastures will be held on Tuesday, May 16, and Wednesday, May 17.

according to W. B. Parker, county extension agent. The meetings have been arranged by the county extension agent's office cooperating with the soil improvement and crop improvement committee of the Lane County Agriculture Council.

The schedule for the meetings is as follows:

Tuesday, May 16 - 10:00 a.m., Farm of Leo Tennis, two miles south of Jasper on the Trent road. 2:00 p.m. - Farm of Harry Bower, five miles west of Eugene on the Cantrell hill road. (Fertilized plots are just across road from Ray Bower's house).

Wednesday, May 17 - 10:00 a.m., Farm of Ralph Witcher, one mile west of Junction City on the old highway. 2:00 p.m. - Farm of Lewis Hackett, 1½ miles southeast of Twin Oaks school and Spencer Creek Grange hall on road leading from Lorane Highway to Spencer Butte.

On all of these farms the influence of fertilizers applied in the fall on certain plots and in February on adjoining plots will be observed. Nitrogen was used at rates ranging from 20 pounds to 100 pounds actual nitrogen per acre both in the spring and in the fall. Across these plots 18 per cent superphosphate was applied at rates of 200 to 600 pounds per acre in the fall. Spring applications of potash and landplaster were also tried on the Tennis farm.

The effect of fertilizers and other problems in connection with growing good pastures will be discussed by Leroy Warner, soil conservation specialist, Oregon State college and County Extension agents O. S. Fletcher and Parker at the Tuesday meetings. The same subjects will be discussed by Fletcher and Parker at the Wednesday meetings.

Interested people are invited to attend any or all of these meetings.
