

Chevrolet Has a Record April Output

Detroit—A new daily output record of 8,431 passenger cars and trucks was established by the Chevrolet Motor Division in April, T. H. Keating, general manager, reported today, as the company continued its blistering production rate.

Nine times during the month daily volume topped 8,000 units, Keating said, a level reached only once previously in Chevrolet history.

Total production for April hit 166,844 passenger cars and trucks, exceeded only by March of this year on company records.

"Considering that there were three less working days in April than March, the volume proves we were operating at a faster pace than ever before," Keating commented.

April's output included 125,051 passenger cars and 41,793 trucks.

The story behind deepwater oil

A few years ago, a test well proved there is oil under the great Continental Shelf that extends out into the Gulf of Mexico, and although the well did not produce much, it started one of the most unusual—and expensive—drilling programs in history.

So far, in the search for underwater oil, seven drilling platforms have been built, similar to the one above, as far as 10 miles offshore and in water as much as 65 feet deep. They are set on tubular steel pilings driven 250 feet through the ocean's bottom, for they must be strong enough to withstand Gulf hurricanes.
