Women in Oregon Active in Home Improvement Work

Attention last week, April 30 to May 6, was focused on what homemakers are doing toward improving their homes and keeping their families well, says Mrs. Azalea Sager, state home demonstration leader, in referring to annual National Home Demonstration Week.

Hub of Oregon's home economics work carried out through the extension service is made up of community home economics extension units. During the past year there were 516 of these clubs with a membership of 13,000 homemakers.

These are located in 28 of Oregon's 36 counties where county home economics extension agents are regular members of the county extension staffs.

In all Oregon counties this week as well as in 2,500 other counties of the United States where home demonstration agents are employed, "NHD" week is being recognized. In 21 of Oregon's counties, spring homemaker's festivals will be held. Because of scheduling difficulties, festivals in other counties will not be held this year during National Home Demonstration week, Mrs. Sager explains, but they will be held later.

One of the outstanding pieces of work being done in counties is the training and development of leaders in adult work. Last year, for example, there were 7,207 of these project leaders. After learning skills acquired in county-wide training meetings, these project leaders, in turn, conducted workshops in their respective communities.

In clothing, for example, 534 workshops were held in 15 Oregon counties last year. Women enrolled in these workshops made dresses, suits, and coats. More than two thousand modeled during homemaker's festivals similar to those being held this year, showing apparel they had made.

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Workshops were also conducted in home furnishings, where those participating re-upholstered day-ports, overstuffed chairs, made slip covers, and constructed footstools to learn furniture technique.

Other interests include foods and nutrition, home management, housing and recreation, among others. The agents also take an active part in the 4-H club program.

Juvenile Home Tax Vote Friday

Voters will be asked to approve a small tax, which if voted will enable the committee to supply accommodations for both boys and girls. On a \$2,000 valuation, the tax would be 90 cents for the first two years and for the next four years 70 cents on the same valuation of \$2,000.

Officials tell us that the proposed tax measure for the juvenile home, which will be voted on May 19, actually represents less taxes or less cost to the taxpayer than the method now used to handle the juvenile offenders.

Construction is now underway on the girls' unit of the home, which is located on the Marcola road, about two miles from Springfield. The new construction includes the girls' unit and living quarters for the superintendent. It is hoped that this part of the building program may be completed by June 1, at which time it will be dedicated. So far all materials and labor for the home have been donated. The present building 100 by 30 feet, used to house the boys will also be modernized and remodeled.

The board has employed D. Baker, formerly with the Multnomah county juvenile department of Portland as superintendent.

Pasture Tour of Valley Counties Dated May 23-25

Plans are underway for a three-day Willamette valley grassland pasture tour with scheduled stops at outstanding farms in five counties, announces Roger W. Morse, O. S. C. extension dairy specialist. The tour dates are May 23, 24, 25.

Morse is heading a committee of O. S. C. extension specialists and county extension agents who are making the tour arrangements. Members of the agricultural committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce are invited to participate.

The tour will start in Washington county and move south thru Yamhill, Marion and Linn counties and return through Marion and Clackamas counties.

Starting point will be the Albert Greener farm located near Hillsboro at 9:30 o'clock. Tuesday morning, May 23. His farm is located two and one-half miles south of the Portland-Hillsboro highway on the Road Bridge road. Turn-off and meeting point will be the Witch Hazel schoolhouse located adjoining the highway three miles east of Hillsboro.

In addition to the Greener farm, the Washington county itinerary calls for a stop at the Fred Knox dairy farm, Gaston. In Yamhill county, tour visitors will see an irrigation development utilizing a dammed creek at the A. L. Tangen dairy farm, Newberg. To view new Kentish white and ladino clover pastures, stops have been scheduled at the L. R. Alderman farm, Dayton, and at the Lane Brothers farm in Marion county.

On May 24, plans call for a showing of irrigation equipment and development in Linn county. O. E. Mikessell, Linn county extension agent, and Arthur S. King, O. S. C. extension soil conservation specialist, are handling this phase of the program.

On May 25, stops in Marion county will include the C. J. Berning farm located on the northern outskirts of Mt. Angel. There visitors will see a rotation dairy pasture program and the Holstein cow which recently broke the

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world's 365 day butterfat production mark for twice-a-day milking. The Ahrens livestock farm, Turner, is also included in the Marion county itinerary.

Stops in Clackamas county will be announced later, Morse states.

Women Accepted In Line and Supply Corps of U. S. Navy

Applications are being accepted for appointment of women in the line and supply corps of the United States Navy. The program was explained in detail to those interested by Lieutenant Dorothy N. Field, USNR at the University of Oregon, Eugene on May 10, 1950 and at the Oregon State college, Corvallis, Oregon on May 9, 1950. To be eligible to apply for either program women must be college graduates or be in their senior year and expect to be graduated in June or December 1950. A partial grade transcript and statement from the University regarding graduation will be accepted by the Navy. Age limits are 21 to 25.

Women who are appointed receive commissions as Ensigns in the Line and begin their careers at the Navy's General Line school at Newport, Rhode Island. The indoctrination course is five months in length and upon graduation from this course the junior officers are sent to duty at various shore activities. Duty assignments include personnel work, public relations, training, intelligence, communications and operations. Ensigns receive \$213.75 per month with quarters and subsistence provided.

Women who are accepted for commission as Ensigns in the Supply Corps will be ordered in July 1950 to the Navy Supply Corps school, Naval Supply Depot, Bayonne, New Jersey, for indoctrination and Supply training for approximately nine months. Training covers disbursing, accounting, personnel, logistics, Navy Regulations.

Overseas billets are now included among duty assignments. Waves were recently assigned duty in

England, Hawaii, and Kodiak, Alaska.

October 15, 1950 is the deadline for acceptance of applications for appointment in the Bureau of Naval Personnel. For the January 1951 class, Lieutenant Field said that women who are interested in applying should contact the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 226 Federal Building, in Seattle, at least one month prior to this date in order to allow adequate time for processing of applications.

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
