Farm Timber Is In Large Demand

Salem, Oregon (Special) Farm timber throughout the Willamette Valley and the western part of the state is in large demand, according to Charles H. Ladd, senior farm forester of the state forestry department.

Ladd states that a recent survey of this area shows a much improved market condition, with sawlogs, pulpwood, plywood, and numerous other products bringing good prices.

The forester points out that farm woodland owners enjoy the definite advantages of easy logging and nearby markets which provide greater stumpage returns. Under present market conditions, a woodland owner can realize a good income from his tract and yet keep the land productive by practicing good forestry.

All owners of small tracts of timber in Oregon are eligible to receive forestry advice, according to Ladd. The state forestry department is prepared to give on the ground assistance on all forestry matters.

Any woodland owner wishing help on his woodland is urged to contact his local representative of this department or the extension service. If local help is not available, write to the State Forester in Salem.

4-H Leaders Talk Over Future of Blue Mt. Project

(Delayed)

Lane County 4-H club leaders met at the Lane County Extension Office Monday evening to discuss the future of the Blue Mountain 4-H club property located about 5 miles east of Cottage Grove in the Blue Mountain area. The property was built through the on Mosby creek. About 20 years ago, approximately 250 acres of land in the Blue Mountain community was acquired thru efforts

of the Chamber of Commerce and the late Clint Stewart. At the time the land was acquired it was the plan of the 4-H organization to establish a Lane County 4-H recreation area here and considerable improvement was made on the property with WPA labor.

Some of the improvements made on the property have since deteriorated, but there was a good job done of clearing the property for later use. When the O.P. & E. Railroad was built through the property it was constructed through about the center of the 250 acres, which stopped plans for making it into a county wide project. Money secured through the sale of the railroad right of way

together with monies from the sale of timber from the tract of land will be held in abeyance until it can be determined what type of improvements are best suited to the area.

The only project contemplated for the immediate future is the eradication of the tanny rail which is quite prevalent in that area according to Mrs. Gordon, who stated there is quite a bit of interest being revived in the property for recreational purposes now that some funds are available for improvements.

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Your Early Garden

The home gardener who has been sitting back in his easy chair keeping warm by the fire may have had dreams about his 1950 garden. Many very pleasant hours can be had doing this sort of planning and if a little thought is given to it they can be hours well spent, according to W. B. Parker, county extension agent.

What did you accomplish in 1949 with your gardening efforts, what mistakes were made and what did not get done which was in the plan for the past year? It has been said that anticipation is more enjoyable than realization, so let's enjoy ourselves a little more by making some good plans. What do you want in your garden, how much of each item, what variety, how much seed's where it is to be planted and approximately when should it be planted—these are some of the things to decide if your ground is still too wet to plant. The soil is ready when a handful freshly dug will fall apart readily, after being firmed in the palm of the hand.

Radishes, lettuce, spinach, beets, and carrots can be seeded for early use as soon as the garden soil is ready. Follow in May with main plantings of these crops. Be sure you have some small stakes ready to write on at planting time. If something fails to appear, much time can be saved if you know what it was and when you planted it. Remember this garden is for you and your family so plant only enough for your use.

One source of helpful garden information is the county agricultural agent's office. The number of available garden bulletins runs well beyond fifty. Just about everything has been covered. There are bulletins for inexperienced gardeners on such subjects as planting plans, and what to do each month of the garden year. Any publication issued by the Extension Service of Oregon State college is free.

Household Hint

When laundering durable finish glazed chintz, do not soak fabric. Use lukewarm water and mild soap suds. Three to four minutes is enough for the washing action. Rinse quickly in three lukewarm rinses. Never twist or rub chintz, but use a spinner or a wringer set at "medium" or "alk."
