STORAGE WATER RELEASED FROM GRAND COULEE

Release of 375,000 acre-feet of water from Grand Coulee reservoir will start today in a move to reserve added storage space to meet increased flood control demands and cut the coming flood crest in downstream areas as much as possible, according to an agreement reached Wednesday between the Bureau of Reclamation and the Corps of Engineers.

The new agreement, announced jointly by Colonel O. E. Walsh, North Pacific division engineer of the Corps of Engineers, and Harold T. Nelson, regional director of the Bureau of Reclamation, supersedes an earlier plan based on the April 1 Weather Bureau forecast of river stages.

Horn Fly Control

FARM UNITS NEAR PASCO OFFERED TO VETERANS

Priority will go to World War II veterans in the purchase of from 6 to 13 farm units in block 2 of the Columbia basin irrigation project five miles southeast of Pasco, Washington, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs learned this week.

The federally reclaimed lands in this project are sold to winners in a public drawing rather than offered as free homesteads because the government had to acquire the land by purchase. Veterans must apply to the Bureau of Reclamation at Ephrata, Washington, by June 17.

Household Hint

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Serve Different Spring Salads

SALAD time can mean the same old, tired, dispirited concoctions that call themselves salads, or it can mean a delightful method of enjoying healthful foods that are pleasing to eye and palate. So here goes for some salad tips.

Use cooked broccoli stalks (thrifty thought!) in your salads. Cut them in julienne strips, marinate in French dressing, if you like, and serve with green or vegetable salads. Tender inside leaves of young, raw spinach make good salad greens. Chances are that even the spinach hater won't catch on to this one, and will eat the salad with pleasure.

Cauliflower, raw and crunchy, is excellent inside salads. Cauliflower and broccoli make a good team, too. Try them with a little sliced orange, some green pepper and chopped celery, with a tart dressing.

Jellied Orange

Jellied canned tomato or jellied orange cut in cubes or slices, is a refreshing salad accompaniment to chicken salad. Candied fruit peels are festive for fruit

salads; nice long strips of them add something special to a dessert salad. Use the juices of fruits from fruit cups, to thin mayonnaise and to mix with French dressings.

Give a new twist to slaw, instead of just the same old cabbage with perhaps a silver of carrot. Try, for instance, a mixture of cabbage, peppers and banana. To serve 6, you mix 2 c. shredded cabbage, 2 diced or sliced, ripe bananas, 2 green or red peppers or canned pimientos, cut into strips. Stir in 1/2 c. salad dressing. Raw shredded carrots may be added, if desired.

For a delicious luncheon salad place 3 slices of red, ripe, peeled tomato on romaine leaves. Place slice of hard-cooked egg on each tomato slice. Just before serving add blanched almonds, shayed, and diced, and a ripe banana to French dressing.

For a good vitamin special combine 1/2 c. raw caulifloweret, 1/2 c. finely diced orange, 2 tbsp. finely chopped green pepper, 1/2 c. diced celery, few drops onion juice, salt to taste. Chill and serve with French dressing.
