Salmon-Steelhead Tag Card Upheld

The Attorney General's Office has handed down an opinion to the effect that the salmon-steelhead tag card regulation is enforceable. Copies of this regulation, issued by the Oregon State Game Commission at its January meeting, are on file with the Secretary of State.

Recently, a number of fishermen have been disregarding the regulation because of rumors that it was unenforceable. The Game Commission requested this opinion so that the legality of the salmon-steelhead tag card would be firmly established and anglers could comply with the regulation. The State Police have received copies of the Attorney General's opinion, and the regulation will be enforced.

The tag card for tallying salmon and steelhead catches when the fish are over 20 inches in length is issued free at any Oregon State Game Commission license agency. A bag limit of 20 salmon and steelhead has been in effect since 1948, but it has been difficult to enforce. The tag card regulation is designed to provide a more even distribution of the fish; to prevent excessive catches; and to furnish a measure of the catch.

FOUR GET OCE AWARDS

Four local high school graduates were among the 150 winners of scholarships at the Oregon College of Education at Monmouth according to a press release from that college on May 21st. The state board of education announced that full tuition fees and awards went to: Pauline Dyksterhuis, Donna Guggisberg, Eunice Hand and Joanne Summers, all of Cottage Grove.

Al Martin Sets New Modern Record in 880 Run at Corvallis

While Medford again took the class A state high school track meet at Corvallis Saturday and Union repeated on its performance and again won the B state track meet, the Cottage Grove Lions represented by three men came away with 13 points, probably as good a record per man as any school in the state. Medford garnered 54½ points to cop the A title while Union amassed 63 points for the B title. Pleasant Hill, another Lane county school took fourth in the B meet with 37 points.

Albert Martin, last year's winner of the 880 yard run repeated at Corvallis Saturday to bring home the Windnagle cup again and set a new modern record, surpassed only once in a thirty eight year period and this was in 1912. Martin's time was 1:59.9, more than two tenths of a second under his run of last year. This is the best time made since the names of the winners have been engraved on the cup starting with 1928. Ron Hite of the Cottage Grove Lions won fifth in the low hurdles and Jim Webb won 6th in the high hurdles to add more points for the Grove lads. Webb's chances of coming out on a top spot in this event were lost when he accidentally knocked over a hurdle at the start of the race.

Bill Tullock, a junior from Lorane, running the mile for his third time led the field in the B mile event to win with a time of 4:52.6. Creswell finished third in the B, 880 yard relay.



57,260 Bucks Taken During 1949 Season

According to deer tag returns tabulated by the Oregon State Game Commission, 163,628 hunters bagged 57,260 bucks during Oregon's 1949 deer season.

"Compared to the '48 deer season this last one was much more successful from the hunter's standpoint," stated Robert Mace, Chief of Big Game for the Game Commission. The hunter success ratio for '49 was 35%. In '48 only 23.9% of the hunters were successful. The '48 kill was 38,785 bucks, with 166,618 sportsmen participating in the hunt.

The '49 deer season was October 1 to October 20 for bucks with not less than forked horns. All counties except Sherman County were open to hunting. In nearly all the counties the '49 deer kill rose well over the '48 kill. One exception was Tillamook County which had a decline in its deer kill. Mace attributed this decline to the large surplus of bucks harvested there in '48 following a closure of several years for most of the county.

The largest deer kill was made in Lake County with a take of 6,990 animals. Other leading county deer kills were: Grant 5,558, Klamath 5,443, Deschutes, 4,756, Harney 4,011, Baker, 2,521, and Tillamook 2,349. Lake County also led in number of hunters, with 13,659 Nimrods indicating this was their chosen hunting ground. Deschutes County with 13,183 hunters and Klamath County with 11,932 hunters were next highest.

The deer-kill data for '48 and '49 represents the first complete evaluation made on Oregon's annual deer harvest. This was made possible by the use of a separate deer tag card and the cooperation of sportsmen in completing and returning their cards to the Game Commission, continued Mace. The percentage of deer tags returned proved satisfactory for statistical purposes. Mace stressed that this type of information is essential to the management of Oregon's game herds.

The bow and arrow enthusiasts were also very successful in the '49 deer hunt, 657 archers participating and 59 deer and one elk being taken. In '48, 186 bow hunters took ten deer. Considering that the average bow hunter in the United States has about one chance in twenty of bagging a deer, the Oregon average of one animal for every eleven archers this last hunting season was probably a new record.

FIVE CLASSES WILL BE HONORED AT UO JUNE 5TH ALUMNI DAY

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 22 (Special)—Alumni from five graduation classes will hold reunions on the University of Oregon campus June 10. Members of the classes of 1900, 1910, 1920, and 1925 will meet on Alumni Day.

First event of the day will be a meeting of the Alumni association that morning in Johnson hall. Alumni will meet again at noon in Carson hall, women's dormitory, for the annual Alumni luncheon. Representatives from each of the honored classes will speak at this time.

A special ceremony planned for the luncheon will be the initiation into the Half-Century club of all alumni who graduated in the 19th century.

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Big Car Auto Racing Returns to County Fair Grounds at Eugene Tuesday

Big-car auto racing returns to the half-mile track at the Lane county fairgrounds at Eugene next Tuesday afternoon when the Northwest Racing association presents a seven-event race program in addition to time trials.

As an added feature, parts of the big Indianapolis "500" will be brought to local fans through the facilities of KUGN, which will also broadcast part of the local race program. The Indianapolis broadcast will be between 2:30 and 2:55 p.m.—just after the heat races get under way.

The Tuesday program will start with time trials at 1 p.m., an hour after the gates open. The first of five six-lap heat races will get under way at 2:30 p.m., with the first and second place winners qualifying for the 40-lap class "A" main event. There will also be a 20-lap class "B" main.

The association announced that through a special formula, a solution will pack the dirt track without causing dust.

A special feature will be the appearance of Hershel McGriff and Ray Elliott, Portland stock car racers who recently won a \$20,000 purse in a race covering more than 2000 miles near Mexico City. They will show their car, the big trophy and will compete here in a later stock car race meet.

Among the drivers of the "Indianapolis type" cars here next Tuesday will be Floyd Tremble of Portland, Howard Osborn of Portland, Art Sovell of Portland, Dor-

mond Moore of Spokane, Flip Snyder of Seattle, Bob Britton of Seattle, Ralph Sales of Long Beach, Calif., Louie Tolstead of Vancouver, Wash., Dick Boubel of Portland, and Mike Moore of South Gate, Calif. The field is expected to number between 18 and 20 entries.

The meet will be the first of a series of eight to be held here, including stock and midget races.

SEED CERTIFICATION DUE BY JUNE 5TH

Lane county farmers who expect to have fields of Alta fescue, chewings fescue, creeping red fescue, fall seeded grain, bentgrass, Tualatin oatgrass, or perennial ryegrass inspected for seed certification should file their applications not later than June 5, according to County Extension Agent W. B. Parker. Following this date someone is expected to come to Lane county from the seed certification department at the state college to make the necessary field inspections.

Parker states that applications for certification of Cumberland red clover, Ladino clover, sweet clover, spring grain crops, potatoes, lotus, sudan, and alfalfa should be filed not later than July 1.

Certification standards for the various crops and application blanks are available at the county agent's office in Eugene. Eligibility for certification is needed when signing applications.

RECORD NUMBER TO GET HIGH DEGREES AT STATE

Oregon State College—Among some 2000 to be graduated here June 5 in a record sized class, will be 20 who will receive the doctorate degree, which will break all records for that highest academic degree here. This year's 17 Doctor of Philosophy degrees and three Doctor of Education degrees will compare with 14 total last year.

Approximately 136 masters degrees will be conferred, the exact number still depending upon those meeting all academic requirements. The more than 1800 graduates with bachelor degree will probably constitute a record number for some years, since it contains the peak number of those receiving GI financial aid.

The Legion team will be selected as soon as possible so all boys should plan to attend the early practice sessions.

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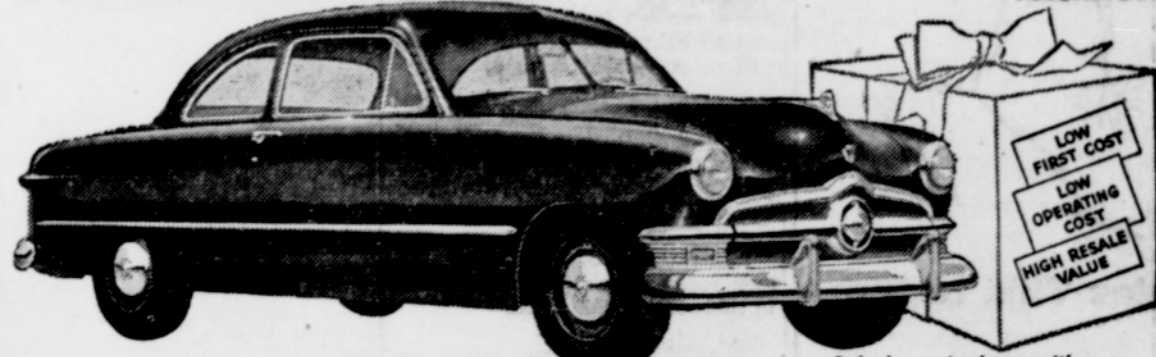
