James William King of 163 Hanson Lane, Eugene and former resident of Lorane and Row River passed away at his home, May 17, at the age of 84 years. He was born Sept. 7, 1865 at Irving, Ky. and moved to Nebraska at the age of 24 where he was married to Sally Cole on July 12, 1894 at Litchfield. Mr. and Mrs. King moved to Oregon in 1912, first living at Row River for two years, later moving on the Suislaw river near Lorane. They lived in this section for thirty years before moving to Eugene in 1944, where Mr. King lived until his death.

Surviving are his widow, five daughters, Mrs. Lydia Stockton of Eugene, Mrs. Ollie Harrington of Renton, Washington; Mrs. Burdella Owen of Cottage Grove and Mrs. Ruby Scott of Artesia, California. Two sons, Sam of Lowell and Robert of Linslaw; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Muncie and Elsie Atherton of Atchison, Kansas and a nephew in Oregon, Russell King of Eugene, 32 grandchildren, 22 great grandchildren and other relatives in Kansas.

Funeral services were held Saturday in Eugene at the Veatch, Hollisworth, England mortuary and interment was in the Westlawn cemetery, S. T. Clark of London, officiated.

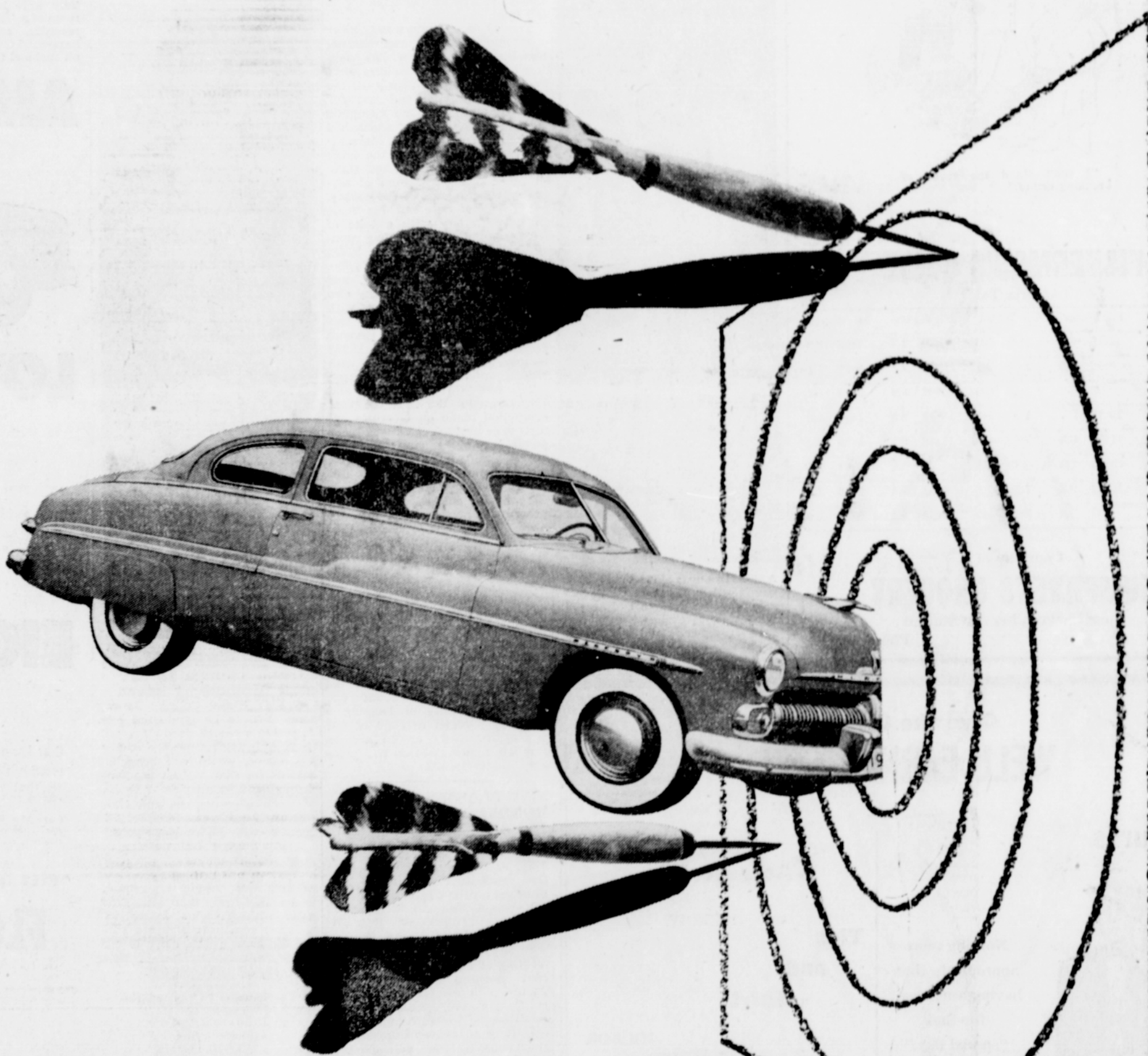
