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Hamburger-Vegetable Soup

STATES round-up to-day, consisting of recipes contributed by readers from various sections of the country.

From one friend, come two inexpensive beef recipes with a mid-Western tang.

Hamburger-Vegetable Soup

Stir one lb. ground beef in a little water to prevent lumping, and simmer. Cook 2 medium-sized potatoes, 2 or 3 small onions, one carrot, one turnip, one c. chopped cabbage, one or 2 stalks celery, one c. tomato pulp or its equivalent in fresh tomatoes, one c. stringbeans, one c. peas, one c. lima beans, salt and pepper to taste. Add at once the vegetables which take a long time to cook; put in others later. Any other left-over vegetables may be added if desired. Add enough hot water to make soup for six, although this should be thick like a gumbo when served.

Dried vegetables may be substituted for beans, peas and limas, using 1/2 c. of each and cooking separately before adding to hamburger-vegetable soup.

Spaghetti Dish From Indiana

For Indiana Spaghetti, simmer one lb. diced round steak until tender. Pan-broil 3 slices bacon and brown 5 onions, sliced, in the fat. Then combine meat and onions with 1/2 lb. mushrooms and 2 c. tomato pulp; simmer 20 min. Combine with one package spaghetti (boiled no more than 15 min. and drained). Put all in casserole. Cover with a one-inch layer of grated Parmesan type cheese. Bake slowly 250 F. until cheese is golden brown.

Illinois Canned Salmon

From Illinois comes a welcome recipe for canned salmon.

Pick one can salmon to pieces. Roll one shredded-wheat biscuit fine, mix with salmon, then mix all with 2 tsp. white sauce.

Shape mixture in pear-shaped balls, then roll in beaten egg, then in shredded wheat biscuit crumbs. Place a piece of macaroni in small end, so that the whole thing looks like a chop, and, using frying basket, fry in deep, hot fat, or saute in shallow fat.

From California comes a grand way of preparing carrots, nice for a substantial and different vegetable dish. Choose the tenderest young sweet carrots, scrape, boil until tender. Cut in lengthwise halves, dip in thick honey; place in baking dish, the bottom thinly covered with fine olive oil. Sprinkle thickly with grated cheese, salt as desired. Place in hot oven and brown for about 15 min.
