

Tag Returns Show Record Elk Kill

Oregon's 1949 elk kill was the largest yet recorded. Elk tag returns received by the Oregon State Game Commission show that 26,096 big game hunters bagged 9,134 elk during the 1949 season. In the last three years, the elk kill has tripled, and the number of elk hunters has nearly doubled. These figures are based on tag returns and checking station records kept since 1933. The elk season was first opened in 1933 following a 14-year ban on elk hunting.

Robert Mace, Chief of Big Game for the Game Commission, attributes the large elk kill to the liberal elk hunting regulations of the last few seasons, especially the cow or bull elk provision for most of eastern Oregon. "As the herds increase, the regulations are relaxed to allow an adequate harvest of the surplus animals," stated Mace.

The largest kill was made in Umatilla County where 6,011 sportsmen took 2,923 elk. The Union County kill of 2,192 animals was next highest followed by Grant County with a recorded take of 1,426 wapiti.

Only 449 elk were shot in western Oregon according to tag returns. Stricter hunting regulations and a brushy terrain were chiefly responsible for the scant kill in the western portion of the state, continued Mace. The western Oregon season was October 25 to November 3 for bull elk with three points or more. For most of eastern Oregon, the season extended to November 20, and elk of either sex were legal in all but the Chennimus and Starkey areas which were open for bull elk with visible horns. In the North Baker Valley, the season extended to December 31.

According to Charles Lockwood, State Game Director, the closure was based upon information supplied by the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation. On May 10, the reservoir contained 41,000 acre-feet of water. The total weight of fall, including inflow and outflow and losses from evaporation and leakage, is now averaging 600 acre-feet per day. By June the average rate of fall will be 900 acre-feet per day. From this data the Game Commission has determined that Crane Prairie Reservoir will contain only 6,500 acre-feet of water by June 25. "When the fish are restricted to such a limited area of water, a concentrated fishing pressure would be very detrimental to the trout population," stated Lockwood.

The Bureau of Reclamation has expressed a belief that by September 1, sufficient water will again be stored in Crane Prairie Reservoir to reach the desired level for angling.

Track Awards Are Made at U. of O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 1—A record number of varsity track awards were announced here today by Leo Harris, athletic director, as the majority of the powerful 1950 Duck squad completed the season.

Several of the Ducks will be in action this week end in the state AAU meet in Portland and Bill Fell will enter the open 100-yard dash at the Compton Relays. Fell, George Rasmussen, Dave Hornthorne, Walt McClure and possibly Jack Hutchins have already landed berths on the PCC team which will meet the Big Ten at Madison, Wisconsin later this month and at least four of the Ducks will be entered in the NCAA finals at Minneapolis.

The record number of awards included 20 of the northern division champions. The squad was the highest scoring team in Oregon history in both the dual meets and the northern division finals. Only two teams in Duck history have tallied more points than the 1950 squad piled up in taking fourth in the PCC finals at Berkeley.

MIDGET BASEBALL TEAM ORGANIZED HERE TO BE COACHED BY E. H. NEAL

Cottage Grove will have a midget baseball team this summer for the first time. The team is being sponsored by the Floyd Githens Motors, which has outfitted the team with suits and equipment. This classification of baseball is opened to all boys under 16 years of age or boys whose 16th birthday falls before June 1. The midgets offer training for younger boys who will be eligible for the American Legion junior team on reaching the age limit.

E. H. Neal, Jefferson school coach, will also serve as coach for the midgets and announced yesterday that league play will start June 8. The local team is a member of the Willamette valley league, which is composed of eight teams. At the end of the season the two top teams of the valley league will play the two top teams of the Salem league for the championship of western Oregon.

Southwest Oregon Game District Now Going at Roseburg

Administrative headquarters for the new Southwestern Oregon Game Supervisory District will be officially activated at Roseburg on Thursday, June 1, 1950, Charles Lockwood, state game director, announced today.

Game Commissioner Carl Hill and staff members from the Portland office will meet with district personnel for the opening of the Roseburg headquarters. Phil Schneider, assistant game director, will head the Game Commission staff.

A headquarters building located on Highway 99E at the north edge of Roseburg is being purchased by the Game Commission. Supervisor for the new game district is James Vaughn, former superintendent of the Rock Creek fish hatchery.

Geographically, the Southwest Game District is composed of the Umpqua and Rogue river drainages. This would include Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, and Josephine counties.

The Roseburg headquarters is the third of its kind to be established in Oregon. A Southeastern Oregon Game District and a Northwestern Oregon Game District are yet to be activated. Mr. Lockwood has pointed out that these new district headquarters will serve as a local point of public service and action for the Game Commission.

Spring Sport Season Nears Close at U.O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 30—The spring sports season closed last week end at the University of Oregon for all teams except the track squad, which will continue competition for at least another three weeks.

Coach Don Kirsch's baseball squad jumped from last to third place in northern division standings with a double win over Oregon State. Paced by the league's leading hitter and top second baseman, Daryl Nelson, the Ducks picked up a 10 to 6 win Friday and a 7 to 4 decision Saturday to gain a split in the series with the Beavers.

The third place finish was the lowest for the Ducks since 1940, but kept their record of having never finished below third since 1934 intact. The Ducks of 1938 and 1940 were the other third place teams. All other Webfoot clubs since 1934 have been either first or second in the final standings.

Coach Sid Milligan's golfers suffered their second straight upset at the hands of the Oregon State in the northern division finals. One week earlier the Beavers had snapped the Ducks' dual meet winning streak and last Saturday edged the Ducks by a single stroke for the league team title.

Coach Milligan's Duckling golfers completed an undefeated season with a victory over University high of Eugene. Earlier the yearling golfers had won three straight from Oregon State.

Coach Jim Aiken's spring practice session ended in the annual game between the Whites and the Greens and the 6,200 fans who were at Hayward field saw the Greens dominate the play in a game which ended in a 21 to 21 deadlock. The running of Carl Ervin and the passing of Hal Dunham paced the sophomore-dominated Greens. Ervin collected 86 yards on 13 tries and Dunham hit with nine of his 20 passes.

Runs of 65 yards by Earl Stelle and 67 yards by Tom Lyon accounted for two of the White touchdowns and the third came with less than 50 seconds of play remaining on a 50-yard pass from Stelle to Jake Williams.

Coach Aiken said he was pleased with the work of a number of the newcomers, but felt the squad was still a long way from being ready for the 1950 season.

LEBANON - GOSHEN POWER LINE AWARDED

The Bonneville Power Administration on May 26 awarded a contract for the construction of the Lebanon-Goshen 230 kv steel tower transmission line to the Montgomery Electric Company, Portland, Oregon, on a low bid of \$333,999.

This transmission line is approximately 40 miles in length and begins at a point approximately 2 miles southeast of Lebanon and extends southward to the point of termination at the Goshen substation.

4 Local Students Among Largest OSC Senior Class

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 29—Harry Milton Robinson, Marvon Howard Harpole, Gordon Earl Asbury and Charles Raymond Johnson of Cottage Grove are among the 1982 seniors and graduate students to receive degrees at the eighty-first annual commencement here June 5. Saturday, June 3, is alumni day while the baccalaureate will be held Sunday, June 4, with Dr. D. V. Poling, famous eastern minister and author.

Robinson completed work in the school of agriculture, Harpole in business and technology, while Asbury and Johnson majored in engineering. They will receive bachelor of science degrees.

This is the largest single class in higher education ever to be graduated in this state, and it may hold the record for some years, officials say. Despite the size, the entire graduation ceremony will be held in the new college coliseum, where relatives of all those receiving degrees will have reserved sections.

Among the 1982 degrees to be conferred by President A. L. Strand, 1813 are either bachelor of science or bachelor of arts, representing four full years of study; 169 are graduate degrees—also a new record—including 149 masters degrees, 3 doctors of education awarded here for the first time, and 17 doctor of philosophy degrees, the highest earned degree in any institution.

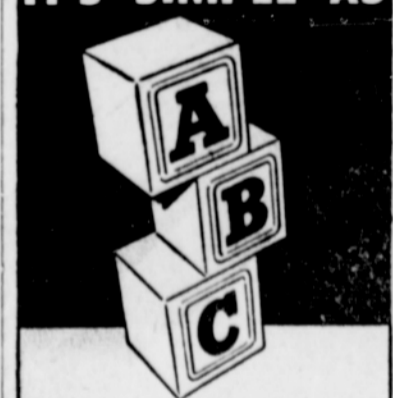

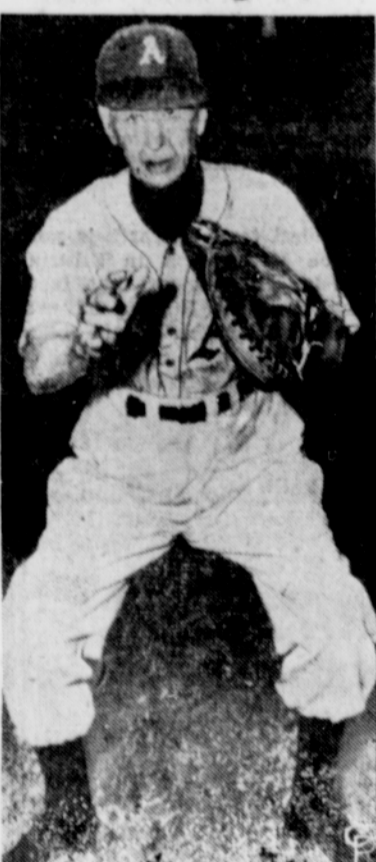
