1300 to Graduate From U. of O. 11th

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 3 (Special)—More than 1300 senior and graduate students will participate in the University of Oregon seventy-third annual Commencement on June 11.

Establishing a new tradition, the baccalaureate and commencement services will be combined for the first time in 1950. The single service will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, June 11, in McArthur Court.

The Commencement Weekend will open on Friday afternoon, June 9, with the annual Pauline Potter Homer Memorial Tea. This event, sponsored by the State Association of University of Oregon Women, the American Association of University Women, and the Library association, will be held in the Adelaide Church Memorial Browsing Room of the University Library from 3 to 5 o'clock.

Falling Beckman orations, contest for senior orators, will be held on Friday evening in the music auditorium.

Alumni Day, Saturday, June 10, will open with the annual breakfast of the State Association of University of Oregon Women. Mrs. J. A. Gamber, the only living woman of the class of 1900, will be the honored guest at this breakfast, which will be held in Carson Hall, women's new dormitory. Members of the class of 1950 will also be honored guests.

At noon the University will honor alumni at the annual luncheon, to be held this year in Carson hall. Also scheduled as a part of this activity-packed day is the semi-annual meeting of the Oregon Alumni Association.

The president's reception for Alumni will be held in Gerlinger hall Saturday afternoon. In the evening will be the reunion dinners for the honored classes. Participating in the day's events will be the reunion classes of 1900, 1910, 1915, 1920, and 1925.

"The Certainties of the Moment" will be the address given by the graduating class at the Commencement service Sunday afternoon. Speaker will be Dr. Charles Malik, envoy of Lebanon and distinguished representative of that republic in the United Nations. President H. K. Newburn will confer the degrees.

The traditional flower and fern Procession, beautiful ceremony for senior and alumnae women, will be held in the Women's quadrangle on the campus following the commencement service. The ceremony will conclude the week end activities.

4-H Clubbers to Meet This Year In Big Coliseum

Youngsters between the ages of 12 and 21 will predominate on the O.S.C. campus for a 10-day period beginning Tuesday, June 13, as the thirty-fifth annual 4-H club summer school gets underway for 1,800 enrollees.

L. J. Allen, state 4-H club leader, states that arrangements are now complete, and housing assignments have been made for all club members. They will be delivered by roster to the "front steps" of their respective living organizations where counselors will take them in tow for their stay on the state college campus.

The following day, Wednesday, June 14, has been designated "Get Acquainted Day," and Dan Poling, O.S.C. dean of men, will officially welcome the 4-H club members to the campus at the evening assembly. All assembly programs this year will be held in the new Coliseum rather than in the venerable men's gym as they have in years past.

The afternoon assembly on June 15 will honor the P.E.O. which will be concluding its state convention in Corvallis. Dr. John Anderson, head, department of religion at Lewis and Clark college, Portland, will be featured speaker.

The Lake county 4-H drum and bugle corps, 40 pieces strong, is scheduled to make a two-day appearance during the 10-day session.

A Sunday church service, June 18, will be broadcast over KOAC starting at 11:15 and continuing for 45 minutes. Dr. E. W. Warrington, head of the O.S.C. department of religion, will speak during the service.

June 20 has been designated "Bankers Day" and again this year the Oregon Bankers association president will be on hand to meet the youngsters. The Oregon Bankers will sponsor their traditional vaudeville show featuring professional talent. The show this year is scheduled for the evening of June 20.

Club member participation will be stressed in other assembly programs, Allen states.

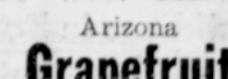
