Mexican Cole Slaw
3 tablespoons vinegar
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon chili powder
few grains pepper
1 teaspoon grated onion
1/2 cup Pet Milk
2 1/2 cups finely shredded cabbage
2 1/2 cups diced celery
1/4 cup finely cut green pepper
1/2 cup drained kidney beans, cooked or canned
Put into a jar the vinegar, salt, sugar, chili powder, pepper, onion and milk. Cover jar and shake well. Keep chilled. At serving time, shake salad dressing well and mix with remaining ingredients. Makes 4 servings.
