This building was designed and constructed by C. E. Leabo and Son, local contractors, who are holding open house Saturday afternoon and Sunday from 11 a.m. until 5 p.m., so that all may inspect this modern home.

This home is one of the most modern built in Cottage Grove in recent years, and although the best in materials and workmanship were employed, it was so planned that costs were kept at a minimum.

Hardwood floors were used throughout, and plenty of built-in closets and drawers are used in the well planned kitchen, bathroom and bedrooms.

An interesting feature is the vestibule at the front door in which is a built-in phone booth.

West Point, Annapolis Exams Announced

Examinations for appointments to the U. S. Naval and U. S. Military academies will be held on July 17, it was announced this week by Rep. Harris Ellsworth.

The competitive tests will be given in the post office buildings at Albany, Coos Bay, Eugene, Grants Pass, Medford, Roseburg, and Reedsport. Candidates for the academies must be single bonafide residents of the Fourth Congressional district. Appointees must be at least 17 years old as of July 1, 1951, the date of entrance into the academies.

The maximum age limit for entrance into West Point is 22, while Annapolis appointees must not be older than 21. Candidates now in the armed services are eligible to compete.

Men wishing to compete for appointments should write Congressman Ellsworth, House Office Bldg., Washington, D. C., not later than June 28. Letters should indicate choice of place for examination, legal residence, and date of birth.

Nominations to the academies will be on the basis of grades earned in the competitive examination.

FINAL ENROLLMENT AT OSC HIGHER THAN FIRST ANTICIPATED

Oregon State college—Final enrollment of regular students here for spring term was 6023, bringing the total of different students for the year to 7366, not counting 118 enrolled in short courses. This is a reduction for the year of only 8 per cent, somewhat smaller than had been predicted.

Total women for the year at 1768 showed only a 5 per cent drop, indicating that the reduction of about 25 per cent in veteran enrollment was chiefly responsible for the expected dip in registration.

New Car Demand Will Remain High, Speaker Predicts

Heavy demand for automobiles is likely to continue through this year and into 1951, Harry J. Klingler, general manager of Pontiac Motor division, said in a recent speech.

Speaking before a civic group in Pontiac, Michigan, Mr. Klingler said that record-breaking new car sales probably were due to the following factors:

1. The continued existence of a substantial volume of unsatisfied demand resulting from war shortages.

2. Large replacements of the earliest post-war cars.

3. Nearly a third of the 34 million cars now in operation are ten years old or older and have "the aches and pains of old age."

4. Our population has grown 20 per cent since 1936 and the number of people able to buy new cars has increased 35 per cent compared with pre-war statistics.

5. A great population shift from urban areas to the suburbs, expanding the need for cars and raising the percentage of two-car families.

The market beyond the middle of 1951 will depend on the "economic climate" this country is experiencing at that time, Mr. Klingler said.

Rehabilitation

The Salvation Army, in a year-round program, seeks both the rehabilitation of the man behind the walls and his family outside. When he has served his sentence the Salvation Army offers ready help with a job, clothes, tools and the opportunity to take a productive and responsible place in society again. Nearly 6,000 men and women were paroled in the care of Salvation army prison workers last year.

Frozen Pies May Give New Outlet For Oregon Fruit

Tasty frozen pies that can be quickly defrosted and readied for serving may provide a new market for Oregon-grown fruits, according to research results obtained at the O.S.C. experiment station by Miss Ruth Millet, research assistant in food technology.

Fresh apples and frozen boysenberries have been used in freezing trials to date with promising results. Taste test panel members enthusiastically endorse pies made with either fruit. Other fruits will be used in future tests.

Miss Millet finds the apple pies easier to perfect. Boysenberries used for pies present two problems—excessive juiciness and loss of shape of the fruit. The flavor of the boysenberry pies is excellent, however, and Miss Millet is hopeful of finding ways of solving the juice and shape problems.

The pies may be frozen before or after baking, Miss Millet points out. No special handling of the pies is needed in either case. Pies that have already been baked may be slipped out of the pie tin, placed in a pliable freezing container and frozen.

Unbaked pies are frozen in metal pie tins and then taken out and placed on paper plates for storage. The unbaked pies may be held in storage for up to two months.

The frozen pies are easily prepared for table use. Frozen baked pies need to be heated for about 30 minutes at normal baking temperatures before serving to insure heating throughout. Unbaked pies can be put directly into the oven and are baked on the regular heat and time schedule.

MEN OVER 65 DON'T HAVE TO RETIRE TO RECEIVE S. S. BENEFITS

A worker over 65 doesn't have to retire permanently to receive benefits. He may enter or leave employment as often as he likes. However, no benefit is payable for months in which he earns more than \$14.99 on a job covered by the Social Security Act. Social security benefits may be paid if an aged worker changes to a job that is not covered by the law.

Before benefits can be paid to a worker or survivor, an application must be filed. Payments are not made automatically.

To prevent possible loss of benefits, Paul F. Johnson, Manager of the Eugene Field Office urges that workers over 65 or survivors of workers who die, contact the local

social security office at 1247 Wil-lamette, Eugene, Oregon to obtain information, or contact a representative from the Eugene office who will be in Cottage Grove on Monday, June 19, at the City Hall between 10:30 a.m. and noon to answer questions and take claims for old-age and survivors insurance benefits.
