More Light Best For Homemakers Summer Sewing

More hours spent in the garden mean that mending and other summer hand sewing must be accomplished after dark. Thus, Oregon homemakers may well consider good lighting for their work, suggests Miss Lucy Lane, O.S.C. extension specialist in clothing.

Sewing is recognized as a difficult eye task because the homemaker must concentrate on small details with little or no contrast between color of thread and fabric. Sewing requires the best and most carefully applied lighting of any work done at home.

Light with some directional quality seems preferable for most kinds of sewing. This is because in the absence of color contrast between thread and fabric, the chief factors enabling the eye to distinguish a stitch against its background are minute shadows cast by threads, slight ridges caused by tension of stitches, and highlights on the thread or fabric.

On the basis of test results and observations the following foot-candle levels are recommended: For occasional sewing on light-colored fabrics—40 footcandles; prolonged sewing on light to medium fabrics—80 footcandles; sewing on dark fabrics with fine detail—150 or more footcandles.

A senior floor lamp with 100-200-300 watt incandescent lamp or a 32-watt circular fluorescent lamp provides the highest illumination level of portable lamps with an average of 100 footcandles.

To provide illumination levels beyond the 100 footcandle range, reflector and projector spot and flood lamps of 150 watts recessed in the ceiling may be used. A 75-watt lamp approximately 15 inches from the sewing task will supply at least 100 footcandles on the sewing task.

FOUR BROODER PLANS IN NEW BULLETIN FROM OSC

Construction plans for three types of home-built electric brooders designed to handle 50, 200 and 300 chicks are presented in a new bulletin of the Oregon State college agricultural experiment station.

All of the brooders use flat-top wood hovers. The small brooder for 50 chicks or fewer, and the brooder for 200 chicks use electric lamps for heat. A thermostat is needed with the 200-chick unit but is optional with the smaller type. The 300-chick brooder calls for a

ready-made kit consisting of a forced ventilation and electric heating unit with thermostat to be installed in a home-built hover.

The bulletin, No. 478, is titled "Home-Built Electric Brooders," by Dale E. Kirk, assistant agricultural engineer. Copies are available free from county agents or from the college.

3 Events Joined To Make Poultry Conference OSC

A statewide poultry industry conference will be held on the O.S.C. campus June 28, 29, 30 and July 1. Sessions will start each day at 10 o'clock.

The announcement was made this week by Noel Bennion, O.S.C. extension poultry specialist, who added that two major Oregon poultry industry groups will hold their annual meetings, and that the Pullorum testing and flock selecting school will be held the last two days to afford those interested to attend any or all of the conference sessions.

Organizations concerned are the Oregon Baby Chick association and the Oregon Poultry Improvement association.

Joseph I. Taggart, nationally recognized incubation authority from Cleveland, Ohio, heads the list of out-of-state guests who will participate. He will speak Wednesday afternoon, June 28, during the annual meeting of the Oregon Baby Chick association according to Barry Brownell, Milwaukee, president.

The president of the International Baby Chick association, Andrew Christie, Kingston, New Hampshire, will also be present and is scheduled to be banquet speaker at the baby chick association's annual banquet. It will be held at the Corvallis country club, Wednesday evening, June 28, and will be jointly with the Oregon Poultry Improvement association.

G. A. Boyington, Hood River, president of the Oregon Poultry Improvement association, has announced that his organization will hold its annual meeting June 29. Wayne Miller, head of research, Washington Farmers Cooperative association, Seattle, will be featured speaker during the poultry improvement association meeting. He will discuss new developments in poultry nutrition.

The Pullorum testing and flock selecting school will be held June 30 and July 1. It was scheduled in connection with the statewide meetings in order that the testing and flock selecting agents would be able to hear and meet industry leaders, Bennion states.

Champ Baby Sitter

Nisqually, Washington, June 9. (Special) —Farmer Earl McDermitt is the Northwest's champion baby sitter. From now until next winter he will nursemaid eight million babies at the region's most unique nursery.

McDermitt, superintendent at the unusual Forest Industries Tree Nursery here, last week completed his sowing operations for the first time using certified seed; next fall and winter hopes to have a record crop of 8,000,000 baby conifers for planting on private forest lands in Washington and Oregon.

No baby sitter has any more painstaking and attention-demanding job than this Scotsman who has been farming every kind of crop for the past 35 years. Since 1942 he has grown 32 million baby trees at this timberman's industrial tree nursery. Enough trees have been planted from this nursery in that period to represent eight trees for every man, woman and child in Washington and Oregon.
