St. Paul Rodeo Adds New Event

The announcement of a cutting horse contest, carrying a \$1000 purse, brings the St. Paul rodeo's prize money to \$10,400 for its four day celebration July 1-2-3-4.

So announces Association Secretary Pete Kirk who explains that this cutting horse contest is to be the only approved contest of its kind held in the Northwest during the July 4th week. The entry fee is \$50.

The addition of this event brings the major events featured at St. Paul to eight, and points toward the most complete wild west show ever offered there. Entries in this and all other rodeo events should be made by letter or wire to Secretary Kirk, in care of the St. Paul rodeo association, before 10 p.m. June 30.

Professional cowboys from all parts of the United States will compete for around \$3000 more than they did last year at St. Paul, and with each dollar in prize money goes a point toward national rodeo championship honors. The main events of bronc riding, bull dogging, calf roping, bareback riding, Brahma bull riding, wild horse racing and wild cow milking each carry \$1200 purses.

Beaver Boys State Plans Week Session

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—The 14th annual American Legion sponsored Beaver Boys State will bring some 250 boys to the campus here for a week-long session June 25 to July 1.

The affair provides practical training for selected boys, 15 to 17 years of age, from all parts of the state. They receive instruction in the operation of government.

The 1950 session will be directed by the Rev. James L. Wilson, Toledo, with L. E. Darlington, assistant dean of men here, acting as liaison officer for the advisory committee.

The boys will form political parties and conduct elections.

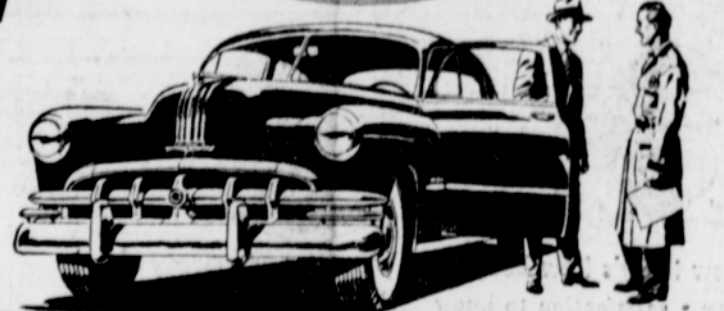
