Sunlight Quality To Be Measured In Dental Study

Oregon's sunshine will come under the scrutiny of specialists of the O.S.C. agricultural experiment station during the next two years to determine whether there is any relationship between the quality of the sunshine—from the standpoint of ultra-violet ray components—and dental health.

The unique sunlight study is the fourth phase in the important project on dental health of Oregon children, requested by the Oregon Home Economics extension council. In the earlier studies it was found that Oregon school children suffer up to twice the average amount of tooth decay as children in many other parts of the country, and that children in Oregon coastal counties have considerably poorer dental health than children in central Oregon counties.

To get an explanation for the big difference in tooth decay in the two regions, a comparison was made of water supplies, and of diets and "sweets" consumption of children in the two areas. Analyses of water supplies failed to reveal significant differences either in fluoride content or "hardness" and no appreciable difference was noted in the amount of candy and pop consumed. Availability of dental services in the two regions does not seem to have influenced the dental health either.

The only factor which showed great variation from one region to the other was the amount of sunshine, with the two coastal test counties—Clatsop and Coos—having fewer hours of sunshine than the central counties—Klamath and Deschutes. Because it has been found that mere quality of sunshine cannot be taken as an indication of the value of ultra-violet ray components—an essential factor for the proper calcification of the teeth—the experiment station scientists are turning to the sunlight "quality" study.

Photoelectric equipment that will measure the ultra-violet components is under construction at the present time. It will be installed at the John Jacob Astor branch experiment station in Astoria and the Klamath experimental areas at Klamath Falls.

Dr. Clara A. Storvick, home economist, is leader of the dental health project. Dr. D. M. Hadjilarkos, research associate, professor of foods and nutrition, made the dental examinations and June Sullivan, research assistant, analyzed the water samples. Dr. Willibald Weniger, professor emeritus of physics, is directing the construction of the photoelectric equipment.

Booklet on Douglas Fir Tells How To Grow and Market Woodlot Trees

A new forestry booklet, "Your Trees, A Crop," will become a forest "bible" for farmers throughout Oregon's Douglas fir belt, believes an O. S. C. farm woodlot marketing specialist, Paul N. Goodmonson.

Copies of the 62 page booklet, which explains how to grow and harvest Douglas fir, may be obtained by writing to Goodmonson at O.S.C. Western Oregon county extension agents also have a supply of the publication which has been issued by the Douglas fir second growth management committee.

The publication's foreword is written by Col. William B. Greeley, vice-president of the West Coast Lumbermen's association. He states that the increasing industrial use of wood promises to be the next great phase in the forest-west progress of the Pacific northwest. It brings to every woodlot owner, whether he has 10 or 10,000 acres, an opportunity to grow and market trees on a far more intensive scale than has ever been dreamed of before, says Col. Greeley.

Goodmonson says the booklet will be especially useful to farmers and small woodlot landowners because it gives detailed instructions

on how to grow and market second-growth stands in the Douglas fir region.

How timber grows, how and what a young forest can produce for sale, how to log, how to measure and market logs, how to protect timberlands from fire, disease, insects, what taxes must be paid, and what regulations must be complied with are all thoroughly discussed. The value of the booklet to timber owners, Goodmonson declares, is increased by the addition of the specifications required by industry for various forest products.

A brief but complete method of cruising timber stands as well as a sample timber sale agreement for any forest owner contemplating selling stumpage is also included.

The booklet also includes cord wood volume tables as well as board-foot volume tables for second-growth Douglas fir trees.
