Midgets Win League Opener; Play Here Sunday

With two victories in the past week to its credit, the American Legion Midget baseball team is looking forward to the second league game Sunday with the Albany Midgets on the CGUHS diamond.

Beginning at 12:45 p.m., the game will be the first half of a double-header in which local fans will get their full share of baseball. The second game, which will start at 2:30 p.m., will pit the Cottage Grove Junior Legion team against Springfield.

Monday the Midgets who are sponsored by Floyd Githens, opened their league schedule by trouncing Harrisburg, 19-9. Center fielder Clarence Smith was the leading hitter of the day with a home run and single in four times at bat. Pitchers for the local squad were Lloyd Russell, who twirled for 3½ innings, and Lester Goff, who finished out the remaining 2½ frames. Victor Fox performed the catching chores.

Batteries for Harrisburg were Sittser, McEldowney, and Montgomery, pitchers; and Brown and Montgomery, catchers. The game was called at the end of the sixth inning because of darkness.

Summaries for the game were: For Cottage Grove, 19 runs, 10 hits, 4 errors; for Harrisburg, 9 runs, 7 hits, 14 errors.

In a practice game last Friday, the Midgets defeated Drain, 4-3. On Thursday the Midgets will travel to Brownsville for a night game beginning at 8 p.m.

Just Fishin' (Beginning with this issue, this column will be a regular feature in the Sentinel until the end of the fishing season. But we depend on our friends. Let us know how you make out on your fishing trips, and where the good and poor spots are. A card to The Sentinel will do it.)

The best reports of last week-end come from East and Paulina lakes, where fishing is good with egg fishing getting the best results. Diamond lake is only fair.

Water in the McKenzie and Willamette still is too high for any decent catches, although Myron Perry caught a 24 inch rainbow with spinning tackle in the McKenzie last weekend. He reports that it was the only strike he had all day.

The North Umpqua also is still fairly high, although it will probably be pretty good in about two weeks. Word from Coos Bay tells us that the striped bass catches are fair. A few salmon have been caught in Winchester Bay.

In the Willamette Pass area, conditions at Lake Odell are fair. The road to Irish and Taylor lakes should be open in about a week, and it probably will be another week before we can get in to Waldo.

Crane Prairie has been closed to fishermen, but chances are that it will be re-opened later in the summer.

If, during the fishing season, we don't happen to mention a spot in which you are interested, drop us a card or letter and we'll find out for you and it will be in our next column.

Here's how they are biting in other parts of the state:

Willamette Valley
Warm water game fishing has been good in the lakes and sloughs of the valley. The lower Pudding river has been a very fine bass producer.

Water is high in the north and south Santiam rivers and fishing has been poor. The road to Clear lake on the south Santiam highway now is open and fishing is fair. Lost lake on the Santiam pass has produced a few limit catches.

McKenzie river water conditions have improved slightly and fishing is fair. Prospects for the weekend are good if the water continues to recede and the weather is favorable. Be sure to mail in your McKenzie catch cards.

Fishing is poor in the middle fork of the Willamette and its tributaries due to heavy rains and snow run-off. All streams in eastern Lane county except the coast fork of the Willamette and the Long Tom river continue to be high and roily. The Marilyn lakes on the Willamette pass have produced nice catches of Eastern brook. The Gold lake road still is closed and fishing has been poor due to weather conditions.

Coastal Section
Trout fishing is slow throughout the coastal area. A few limit catches have been made in Tillamook county. Smith river and Sweet creek offer the best possibilities for trout angling along the central coast. Bass and pan fish angling is good in most of the lakes. Surf and bay fishing for sea perch, flounder, and kelp fish is good, while salmon fishing on the lower Rogue continues poor.

Portland and Vicinity
On the Clackamas river, the best trout catches have been made on the North Fork. The main river continues high and fishing has been fair in the vicin-

CG Legion Baseball Team Defeated by Eugene Nine, 5-2

A three-run rally in the ninth inning by the Eugene Junior Legion baseball squad Sunday proved too much for the Cottage Grove team as they bowed to their neighbors from the north, 5-2.

Pitcher Lowry Hoyer turned in a stellar mound performance as he struck out 13 Eugene batters and issued only four walks. Two costly errors and a couple of hits for extra bases were the main cause of the downfall of the local lads.

Springfield Junior Legion team will be the next opponent this Sunday when the two squads clash in the second game of a double header bill at the high school field. The Midgets will begin play at 12:30 p.m., while the Junior game will get under way at 2:30 p.m. Floyd Githens Motor Co. sponsors both local teams.

In last Sunday's game, the first four innings were scoreless as both clubs played alert defensive ball. Eugene scored first in the fifth inning after Cuthbert's single, a walk, and a single by Hank Hudspeth. The Grovemen came back in the sixth to take the lead when they made two runs.

Bill McBee led off with a single, followed by Wes Malcolm's walk. The runners advanced on an infield out and came in later on Bob Sedergren's hit.

Eugene tied the count, 2-2, in the seventh as Cuthbert got to first after he was hit by a pitched ball, then stole second, and came home on Hudspeth's triple.

In the ninth inning an infield error permitted Hudspeth to get on first base and later scored run number three for Eugene on an overthrow to first. Sorenson's homer brought in two more runs to make the final score, 5-2.

In the Mt. Hood area, the lower stretches of the Zig Zag river have produced nice catches, especially near One Mile bridge. The Salmon river and the Upper Sandy also have been good. Several nice catches of cutthroat have been taken on Camp creek and Still creek with bait fishing, spinner, and worms producing the best results.

The roads to Lost lake Wahtum lake, Badger lake, Clear lake, and the Oallie lake group still are blocked by snow. Some of these roads may not be opened until the Fourth of July. Parties hiking into Clear lake have had medium success.

Southern Oregon
On the upper Umpqua, water conditions are fair. Streams generally are high but dropping and clearing rapidly. Trout fishing is good. Bait is most productive but some good catches are being made on wet flies. Fish lake has produced some nice catches of Eastern brook trout.
