There'll be no dust at the rodeo this year.

That was the announcement from rodeo headquarters this week as plans for the big event to be held July 15 and 16 took final shape. Sawdust has been spread over the arena and water will be handy to make it a dustless rodeo.

tions for this special performance include a horse show, walking, trotting and running races, and a stock show. Ribbons will be awarded to the place winners.

Early risers on the rodeo days will have the opportunity to partake of a hearty Buckaroo breakfast served by members of the Cottage Grove Riding club. The meal will begin at 6 p.m. in order to allow time for everyone to be served. A complete menu of the breakfast will be announced next week.

Some of the rodeo events already planned are the relay races, 1/4 mile race, 1/2 mile race, and the flag race. Rivalry between clubs has reached its peak and the best riders from each group will participate. Practice for the events has been going on for several months.

Concessions Signed

Three contracts for concessions at the Cottage Grove Rodeo were awarded this week, according to Brighton Leonard, chairman of the concessions committee.

One stand will be operated by women of the riding club who will serve hot dogs, candy, cigarettes, and cold drinks.

Mr. and Mrs. Al Baker have signed to run a concession which will offer ham and turkey sandwiches, coffee, ice cream, and pie.

Cotton candy, candied apples, and ice cream will be sold at the stand managed by Lyle Cook of Boring.

All concessions have been let under contracts which will give the riding club 20 per cent of the gross profits, Leonard stated. Contract for a hamburger stand has not yet been awarded.

Work Will Begin Soon on Stadium At High School

The opening of bids for the construction of a new grandstand will be Tuesday, July 11, at the Cottage Grove Union High school.

It is expected that work will start soon afterwards as the specifications call for completion by September 12. This is a few days before the first game, which undoubtedly will be the dedication date of George Curran field.

The grandstand will be constructed of wood, seating approximately 1500 people and covered. It will have a pressbox, and will be built on the north side of the new field. It will extend over the track and will afford approximately 180 feet of indoor track to be used in wet weather.

The field is ready for use now with exception of the installation of lights which will take place this summer. It now has a fine turf and is reportedly one of the best in the Northwest.

Firecrackers Are Illegal in City

It's illegal to shoot off any fireworks in the city of Cottage Grove. If you don't believe it, take a look at section 2 of city ordinance 1226:

"It shall be unlawful from and after the passage of this Ordinance at any time for any person or persons to use, discharge or cause to be discharged, ignited, fired or otherwise set in action within the city limits of the City of Cottage Grove any fireworks, fire crackers, rockets, sparklers, torpedoes, roman candles, fire balloons, or other fireworks, or substances of any combination whatsoever designed or intended for pyrotechnic display."

Violators of this ordinance are liable to a fine not to exceed \$50 for each offense. Those who sell fireworks within the city limits may have to pay up to \$100 in fines.

The ordinance was passed and approved June 1, 1942. To quote the concluding section: "... provisions of this Ordinance are necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City of Cottage Grove."

Rev. Clark S. Enz Takes Over Duties at Methodist Church



Rev. Clark S. Enz, the new minister of the Methodist church in Cottage Grove, arrived Monday with his wife and three children from Dallas, and they are now living in the parsonage at 320 Washington avenue. The Rev. and Mrs. Enz have three children, Lina, age 6, Jonathan, age 4, and Karen, one year old.

Rev. Enz was transferred to Cottage Grove from Dallas at the annual Oregon Methodist conference held at the Sunnyside Methodist church, and will preach his first sermon here Sunday, July 2.

He is a graduate of Boston University school of theology, and Mrs. Enz is a graduate of Willamette University. He took his un-

dergraduate work at Oregon State college and the University of Oregon, graduating from the latter in 1941. He served the Dallas Methodist church as pastor for six years and was a member of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce and on the city budget committee.

He is regimental chaplain in the National Guard, chairman of commission on town and country work of the Oregon conference, and will be dean of the high school institute to be held at Camp Magruder from August 27 to September 2.

Rev. Enz took graduate work at Willamette University, the University of Southern California and Hiff; served two years as president of the Dallas Ministerial Association; organized and directed Wesley Foundation at Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, and was one of two selected from the Oregon conference to attend the E. V. Moorman school of evangelistic preaching at Moine, Ill.

July 3rd Closing Depends on Stores

A majority of Chamber of Commerce members favored closing stores the day before the Fourth of July in an opinion vote taken at the regular meeting Tuesday.

However, it was decided to leave it up to the individual businessmen whether or not they would close that day.

Speaker for the meeting was Frank Smith, special agent of the FBI from Portland, who explained the workings of the federal bureau. He said that the FBI had grown from a total of 400 men before the war to more than 4000 personnel today.

Plan New Bridge For Row River

A new \$30,000 bridge will span Row River one mile east of town, it was disclosed this week by P. M. Morse, county surveyor.

Work will begin soon on the 180 foot structure to be constructed entirely of wood. It will replace the old steel span which was built in 1912 and now shows signs of crystallizing.

Governor McKay Will Dedicate Gift Of W. A. Woodard

A crowd of 3000 persons is expected Saturday for the dedication of Cottage Grove's new W. A. Woodard library at which Gov. Douglas McKay will give the principal address.

The ceremony, which will begin promptly at 2:30 p.m., will be held in front of the colonial-type building next to the city hall. Sixth

street will be closed to traffic and will be roped off to accommodate the crowd.

For the past week, crews under the direction of Mrs. Nellie Hamant, librarian, have been transferring books from the old library to the new building. A wooden chute from the second floor of the city hall has been used for this work.

H. E. Eakin, member of the library board, will act as master of ceremonies for the event, which will get under way with an introduction of the board members. They are Mrs. Sam Mackin, chairman, Mrs. W. A. Woodard, Mrs. Charles Hall, Mrs. Orlo Bagley, and Eakin.

W. A. Woodard, donor of the library, then will present to the city the key to the building. Joseph E. Bricher, member of the city council, will give a brief acceptance speech on behalf of the city.

The dedication address will be delivered by Governor McKay, who will drive here from Salem for the occasion.

After the ceremony, the library will be open for public inspection. Everyone is invited to attend the reception and speak to Governor McKay and Mr. and Mrs. Woodard, who will head the receiving line.

Inasmuch as the entire crowd will not be able to fit into the library at one time, it has been requested that the line keep moving so that all may have an opportunity to inspect the building. It is hoped that children will attend but that they be accompanied by their parents.
