

Bend Celebration Begins Saturday

BEND—The 1950 Mirror Pond pageant, a water fete considered outstanding in the Pacific Northwest, will be presented in Bend on two nights this year, July 3 and 4.

Another feature of the four-day celebration is the stampede which will be held on the Deschutes county fairground arena, in nearby Redmond.

This year an arch has been erected over the part of the Deschutes river within the city limits of Bend, known as Mirror Pond. Under the arch of changing colors will glide the fleet of fairyland floats, headed by a make-believe swan and cygnets. Riding the swan will be Queen Marcia, Miss Marcia Skjersaa of Bend followed by her royal court composed of six Bend high school girls.

The river pageant and stampede will be the highlights of a four-day show that will begin Saturday, July 1. Motorcycle races, a pet parade, a fireworks display, dances, and river contests will be other features.

In this way they acquire a number of skills such as fire building and various methods of outdoor cooking. They are discovering a number of delicious dishes which can be prepared over an open fire. They are doing hiking, nature lore and craft work such as blue printing and lashing, as well as games and knot tying.

The Three Rivers Council also maintains a nursery for younger children of the leaders thru the courtesy of the Blue Mountain school who will furnish the grounds, play shed and equipment. There is also a boys' unit which although completely separate is under the supervision of the camp, for the older boys of the leaders.

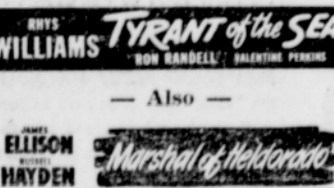
