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Roads to Bohemia Being Repaired

Roads to the Bohemia mining district are being repaired, the forest service announced this week.

The Brice Creek road is open to the Champion mill but, due to recent rains, construction and parts of the winter repair are muddy and rough. The Bohemia Lumber Company under forest service sales contract has almost completed the grading in the effort to widen and relocate the Brice Creek road from about two miles above Disston to within a mile of Land Park. As soon as the weather dries up, this road will be passable, though slightly rough.

W. B. Patten is widening the Sharps Creek road above Mineral under permit from the forest service. Due to the narrow width of the old grade, this road now is blocked with equipment. A notice is posted at the bottom of the hill indicating when the road will be blocked. Motorists are asked to refrain from using this road during working hours. The road usually will be open evenings and week ends.

VET GROUPS SHARE FUND

The American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Disabled American Veterans will share \$16,764.50 of state funds for the next fiscal year starting July 1 to help defray the cost of their rehabilitation programs, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs announced this week.

The fund will be split on the basis of 38 per cent to the Legion, 38 per cent to the VFW and 24 per cent to the DAV, a ratio agreed upon a year ago when the state first started assisting the service groups under the provisions of chapter 364, Oregon Laws 1949, according to William F. Gaarenstroom, director of the veterans' department, which administers the fund.

REPORT COMPLETED ON 1257 DAIRY COWS

The annual report of the Lane County Dairy Herd Improvement Association recently completed by Clifford E. Pierson and C. H. Van Aken, supervisors, and released by O. S. Fletcher, county extension agent, shows that 1,257 cows on which tests were completed in 40 herds produced an average of 390 pounds of butterfat and 7,979 pounds of milk. The Association year ended March 31 of this year.

The five highest producing herds in the Association and the average pounds of butterfat produced in the year by these herds are as follows: Frank A. Turner, Ada, 613.17; H. J. Merz, Ada, 603.45; Glen Scott, Ada, 530.31; Millard Martin, Ada, 472.52; and Echo Hollow Dairy, Eugene, 452.05.

Members of the dairy herd improvement association are using their tests as a basis for better feeding of their cattle and also for culling out low producing cows. During the year 257 cows were culled. All of the Association members own pure-bred sires or use pure-bred sires through the Lane County Dairy Association.

Fletcher states that both Mr. Pierson and Mr. Van Aken are continuing as supervisors for the Lane County Dairy Herd Improvement Association. In May, 1,491 cows were on test in 45 herds.

Forest Protectors Attend Fire School

District ranger Al Davies, district assistant Clair Hogate, and the Bohemia protection force spent last week at the annual Umpqua National Forest Guard Training school at Wolf Creek camp on Little river.

At the school the protection force is taught lookout work, smoke chasing, communications, fire suppression, and general duties. Advanced classes are conducted in firemanship and advanced methods of fire fighting.
