State Hourly Wage

Hourly and weekly earnings of Oregon's production workers advanced to new highs in April. The average of \$1.75 an hour and \$68.79 a week reported by 490 manufacturers to the State Unemployment Compensation Commission and U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics was the highest yet recorded.

With logging and sawmill workers averaging \$1.86 an hour and plywood employes boosting their work week to 43.6 hours. Oregon's gigantic woods industry established new wage records of \$72.68 a week. Plywood led with \$74.97 but even this was topped by the less numerous printing and publishing employes with an average of \$78.16 for a work week of 35.3 hours.

Earnings of Washington's production workers closely paralleled this state, but the average was only \$66.56, mainly because woods employes were \$3 under Oregon's. Wyoming with its oil workers averaged nearly \$70 a week last winter but now is second to Oregon.

Bill Bertram Triska, damage controlman, first class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Triska of 695 Sweet Lane, Cottage Grove is serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Badoeng Strait, which is participating in the annual six-week Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps Midshipmen Senior-Sophomore Pacific Fleet Cruise, which began June 17.

The NROTC cruise, which is held annually to give the midshipmen practical shipboard training, includes 153 midshipmen seniors and 824 midshipmen sophomores from 24 colleges this year, representing all sections of the United States. All hands are afforded the opportunity to visit Pearl Harbor, where organized tours covering the varied scenic interests in the city of Honolulu and around the Island of Oahu have been arranged.

Underway, ship and gunnery exercises are conducted with simulated attacks being made on the cruise ships by "enemy" air, submarine, and surface craft.

Triska, who entered the Naval service in July, 1945, is a graduate of Cottage Grove Union High school.

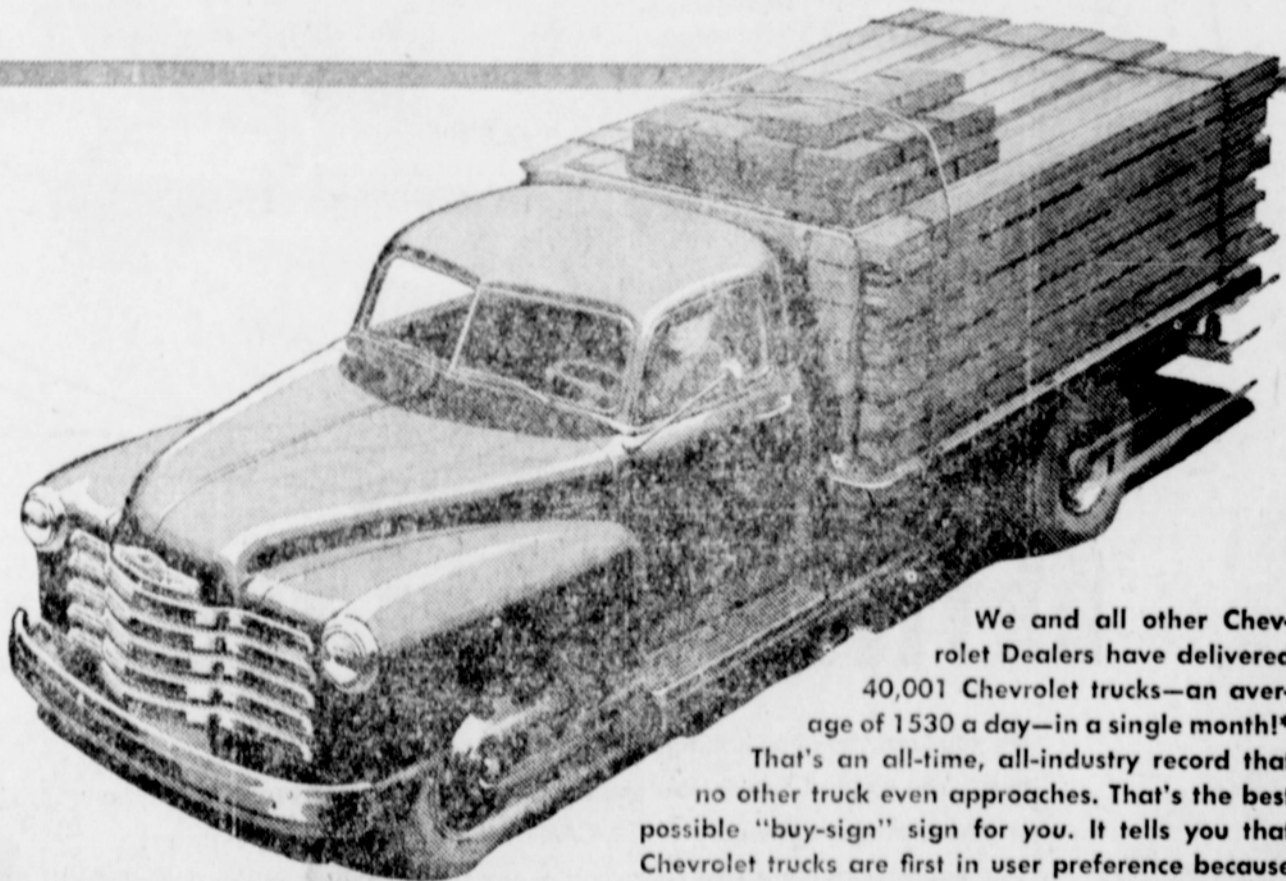

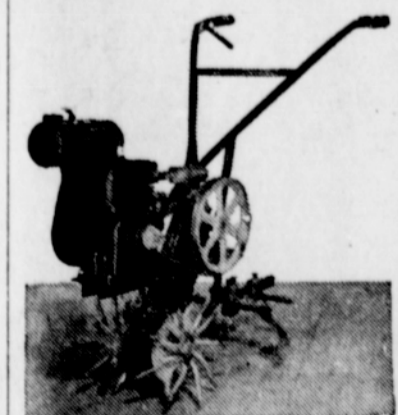
