Loose Limbs Are Hazards in Woods

Winter damage to trees in logging areas has resulted in four deaths among Oregon loggers in the last two months, claims filed with the Industrial Accident Commission revealed today.

A warning against this condition was generally published by all newspapers in March. It named the extent and nature of the damage wrought by ice, frost, and snow to forest trees. It stated that limbs had been broken from both evergreen and broad-leaf trees, and said some had fallen to the ground but many still lay loose in living foliage, and others still

clung by living fibers. Caution on the part of workmen was asked as essential to the preservation of life.
