## 750 Enroll in OCE Summer Session

OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Monmouth—Nearly six hundred former students returned to summer session at OCE this year, figures released by the registrar revealed. More than 750 are attending the session.

The large number of former students emphasizes the interest of Oregon teachers in completing work on the four-year curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education.

## Tractor Care to Get Attention of Oregon 4-H Clubs

A good many Oregon farm tractors are receiving more than customary attention this year.

Oregon's newest 4-H club project, tractor maintenance, has attracted more than 200 youngsters who are enrolled in 25 clubs located in 18 counties, reports L. J. Allen, state 4-H club leader. The project, new this year in five western states including Oregon, is under the sponsorship of the General Petroleum corporation of Los Angeles.

Union county leads the state with four clubs having a total enrollment of 29 club members.

The project includes tractor maintenance rather than repair and has the intention of acquainting 4-H members with practices in maintaining and operating tractors skillfully and safely. Before the close of the club year this fall, several counties plan contests in maintenance and handling.

To the state's most outstanding 1950 tractor maintenance club member, the General Petroleum corporation will award an all-expense trip to 4-H Congress in Chicago. Announcement of the award will be made in October when winners of all state contests are named, Allen states.

On a county basis, tractor maintenance project club members will also be rated at the close of the club year. Those club members rating in the blue or top group will each receive a sterling silver medal.

At 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, eight state tractor maintenance winners will receive college scholarships valued at \$300 each. The project is nationwide.

In five western states, the General Petroleum corporation provides funds for leader training awards, and instructional kits which are issued through the state 4-H club offices.

## NEW OPPORTUNITIES IN WAC RESERVES

Women without prior military service may now enlist in the Women's Army Corps Reserve Section of the Department of the Army has announced. More than 4,000 women veterans in the Organized Reserve Corps are now receiving training within ORC units. No ORC units are composed solely of Wacs.

In opening up the Reserve ranks to women without previous military experience, it is specified that the applicants must be specifically enlisted for vacancies in units undergoing training and that they must agree to such assignment and training in writing.

Age limits for enlistment are 18 to 34, inclusive. Applicants must be physically fit and must be citizens of the United States. Applicants having dependents are eligible. When authorized by proper authority, age waivers up to the age of 45 may be granted to women possessing technical skills needed in the ORC.

WAC Reservists attend unit meetings and participate in the prescribed training including weekend and summer camp training, with the men and women of their units, and may also take Army Extension Courses. Their service in the Active Reserve counts towards qualification for retirement benefits at age 60, for reserve duty training pay if authorized for the assigned unit, and for short tours of active duty or attendance at Army Service Schools with full pay, plus travel pay to and from place of duty.

## Record High Price Established at O & C Timber Sale

Eight parcels of timber were offered and sold by the Bureau of Land Management at an oral auction on Thursday, June 22, according to Otto C. F. Krueger, District Forester, who conducted the sale.

Very keen competition developed on 7 parcels and only one parcel was sold at the appraised price. Twenty-two bidders participated in the sale.

A total volume of 11,592 M bd. ft. of timber appraised at \$147,402.50 was sold for \$256,322.25.

A record high price was established for O & C timber when Hills Creek Lumber Company paid \$27.00 per M bd ft. for Douglas-fir.

Volumes sold by species include 10,987 M bd. ft. Douglas-fir, 20 M bd. ft. white fir, 260 M bd. ft. western red cedar, 280 M bd. ft. hemlock, and 45 M bd. ft. incense cedar.

The Bureau of Land Management timber sale plan calls for a total of 88 Million board feet to be offered for sale during 1950. This volume is approximately the allowable cut from the Eugene Forest District.

According to the program, an equal volume can be sold each year in perpetuity thus maintaining stability of communities and industries. This is further provided by the marketing areas which limit primary manufacture to local processing plants. This program also provides for a fairly

stable income to the 18 land grant counties in Oregon which receive 50 per cent of the receipts from these timber sales.

The successful bidders Thursday were: Fred A. Hill, Jasper; two parcels; Globe Lumber Co., Eugene; A. P. Heup, Eugene; Peter L. Di Paolo, Eugene; Charles De Foe, Cheshire; Consumers Co-

op Assn., Swisshome; and Peerless Lumber Co., Eugene.

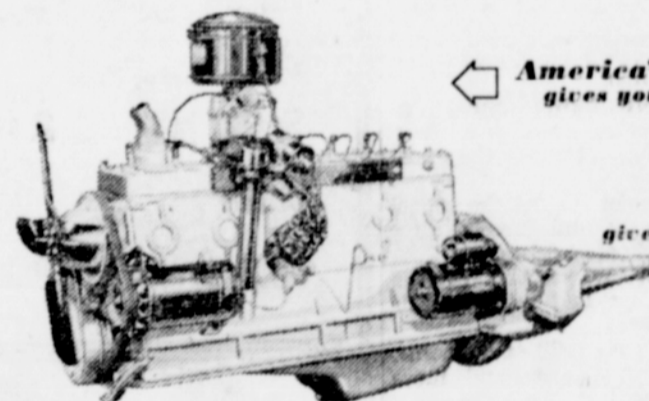

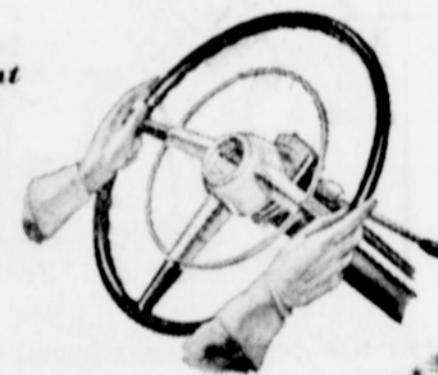

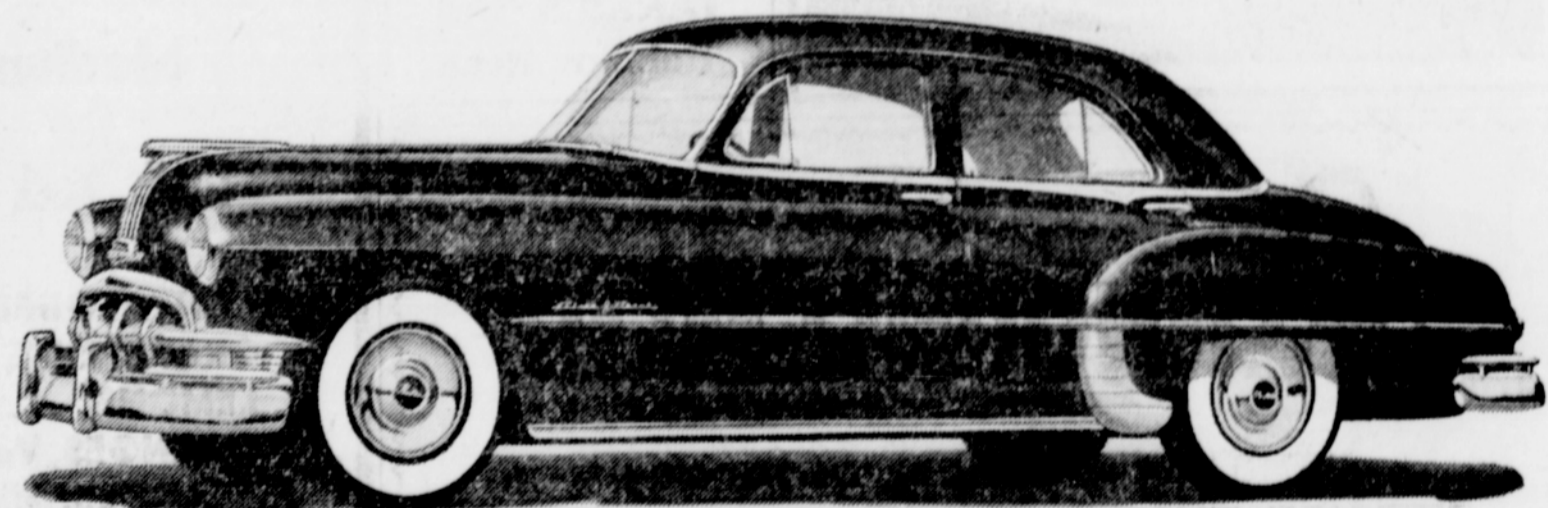
