Bank Deposits Reach New High

As of June 30, deposits of \$6,953,647 and loans of \$861,097 were reported for the First National Bank of Cottage Grove by E. Eakin, vice president and cashier. This bank is an affiliate of "The First National Bank of Portland."

On June 30, 1949, deposits were \$6,219,878 and loans \$918,557.

"The excellent earnings of our bank have made it possible for us to place in effect on July 1 increased interest rates for our savings depositors," Eakin said.

Depositors will receive 1 1/2 per cent interest on all savings accounts up to and including \$10,000, and 1 per cent interest on any amount in excess of \$10,000. The rates of interest previously paid by the bank were 1 per cent on the first \$5,000 and 1/2 per cent on any amount in excess of \$5,000, Eakin pointed out.

GITHENS CENTER TO GET FACE LIFTING

The Githens Center building on Main between 8th and 9th streets is getting a face lifting. The portion of the building from the service entrance to the Greyhound bus depot will have a new stucco front, modernized display windows and a new canopy. The remodeled windows will be set in the building the same height. J. S. Crepeau, local contractor, is doing the remodeling work. Repairs will be completed about the middle of next week.

Boehnke Will Lead County Republicans

Lane county Republicans last week elected Ed G. Boehnke of Eugene as chairman of the county central committee. He has been active in Lane county Republican circles for 25 years.

After the election, Boehnke left for Portland to attend a meeting of the state central committee. Other officers elected were Mrs. Rose Bonson, vice chairman; and Chester Hicks, secretary. All officers were elected by unanimous vote of precinct committeemen and committeewomen.

Mrs. Clara Curry and John Durr were selected as congressional committeemen, and A. C. Forney and Lillian Durr were elected alternate chairman and vice chairman to serve in the absence of the regular officers.

Site Where Jap Bomb Fell To Become National Shrine

BLY, Oregon (July 12)—Special—High in the vast expanse of southeastern Oregon's whispering pine forests, a dramatic chapter of World War II will be revived this summer.

On August 20 a bronze plaque set in a native stone monument will be unveiled to commemorate civilian victims of an airborne enemy assault. The lonely site, to be known as Mitchell Recreation Area, is on tree farm land owned by Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, which is sponsoring the ceremony, according to R. R. McCartney, general manager of the company's Klamath Falls, Oregon branch operation.

It was on May 5, 1945 that death visited near Bly, a lumber town of about 600 people, 45 miles east of Klamath Falls. News of the casualties, which struck local residents, was kept from the outside world because of wartime censorship. But history was to record the grim event as "the only place on the American continent where death resulted from enemy action during World War II."

Four boys and a girl, ages 11 to 17, and a young married woman met instant death on a picnic out-

Top cowboys will be competing for the valuable Hamley saddle in the Cottage Grove Rodeo July 15 and 16.

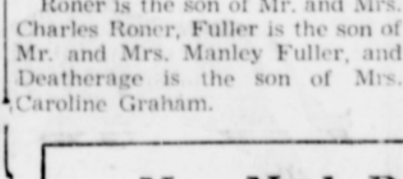

Many Places of Business to Close for Annual Rodeo Saturday at 1:30 P. M.

A large number of business houses will be closed for the annual rodeo, Saturday afternoon, July 15th, a partial survey of the business district revealed Monday. Places of business which agreed to close for the rodeo Saturday afternoon will also close for the parade Saturday morning from 11:00 to 11:30 a.m. Signers to the petition also indicated they would cooperate by wearing western dress during the remainder of the week or through Saturday.

Commenting on a petition which was circulated last week in which the merchants were asked to indicate whether or not they would close for the parade and rodeo Saturday, members of the Cottage Grove Riding club said Monday the club planned to sponsor an advertisement listing the stores which had agreed to close as a public service to the out of town shoppers, so that the shopping might be done before or after Saturday's rodeo. The club also expressed its appreciation for the cooperation extended to the event, which will enable a number to attend the rodeo Saturday. For quite a few, who can't or won't attend the rodeo Sunday, the opportunity to see the show Saturday will be greatly appreciated.

Merchants and business men who signed the petition last week agreed to close their places of business for the parade from 11:00 to 11:30 a.m. and for the rodeo performance from 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., reopening their stores at 5:00 p.m. and remaining open until 7:00 p.m. So far as is known the reopening after the rodeo is still planned by the majority of the signers.

U. S. Marines Seek New Enlistments

U. S. Marines cast off quota restrictions on voluntary enlistments July 7 and announced that they are "wide open" for recruits.

Oregon district headquarters in Portland has received instructions from Col. W. F. Parks, chief of Western Recruiting in San Francisco, ordering abandonment of quotas and acceptance of all men who meet physical, mental and age requirements.

Oregon's quota last month was 20 recruits.

Volunteers must be single and between 17 and 29 years of age. Recently discharged marines with seven years or more service who can qualify in the rank of sergeant or above need not be single to enlist.

Col. Parks said the marines will attempt to reach their full authorized strength of 100,000 men. Late reports set the strength of the marine corps at about 75,000.

As a result of the intensified recruiting drive, recruiting offices in the Oregon district will be open Mondays through Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Offices are located in Portland, Pendleton, Salem, Eugene, and Medford. The Eugene office is in room No. 6 Post Office Bldg.
