There are some clean and decent carnivals, but unfortunately the only clean one we know of, Browning Brothers Amusement Company, seems to have dropped this community from its itinerary. Most of those we see on the road and many that have been here are out to bleed the public for every penny possible and while gypping the public, many of the followers and employees are nothing less than a plain bunch of thieves. One seems to manage to hit the community just at the right time and in addition to victimizing the public, has several employes with sticky fingers. At least this is the opinion of the merchants following the appearance of the carnival here last week. One jeweler lost a \$200.00 ring and a hardware merchant lost merchandise valued at \$9.00 or \$10.00 not to mention possibly a lot of sundry items, which may have not yet been missed or which we did not hear about.

It may be said to the credit of the Cottage Grove Riding club that this organization had nothing to do with the carnival thrust on the community last week. The outfit was evidently too "chinchy" to pay the city the usual license fee or maybe the city did not want to license the outfit. At any rate the carnival lit just outside the city limit just like a bunch of buzzards and proceeded to annoy the residents living nearby with a lot of rancorous noise while shaking down the suckers.

The community is a great deal poorer by last week's experience. The only money left was to Lane county for licenses and we'd wager a pretty penny that the fee paid the county would not pay for even a fourth of the merchandise stolen by the carnival employes.

If the public is going to be victimized by a group of transients under the guise of entertainment, we suggest that in addition to the usual license fee, the carnivals be put under bond to help pay for what the carnival camp followers steal and to help the hapless victim back on his feet who is foolish enough to gamble away his last penny and let his family go hungry.—W.C.M.

Hattie VanSchoiack Dies in Portland

Hattie VanSchoiack, 80, former resident of Dorena, died Thursday, July 13, 1950, at the home of a daughter in Portland.

She was born Hattie Hamblin on Jan. 11, 1870, at Canyonville, and was married Sept. 19, 1887 to Eugene to Wm. P. VanSchoiack. He died in 1930. She moved to Portland in 1930.

Surviving are three sons, Otho and Glen, both of Portland and Cleve of Heppner; one daughter, Ida May VanSchoiack of Portland; 11 grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at Mills Mortuary, Cottage Grove, Saturday at 2 p.m. with interment in the IOOF cemetery, Cottage Grove.

Harry K. Metcalf, 47-Year Resident, Rites Held July 19

Harry K. Metcalf, a resident of Cottage Grove for the past 47 years, passed away at his home Monday, July 17. He was the son of John and Mary Elizabeth (Coats) Metcalf, born in Leeds, England, December 27, 1877. The family sailed from Liverpool, England in 1882 for America, landing at Halifax, Nova Scotia, living at Winnipeg, Manitoba and Aurora for a short time.

John Metcalf moved to the Chippewa Indian Reservation on the Roney river, where he took up a homestead, leaving there for Buffalo, New York, where he became engaged in railroad work. Later he moved his family to Kansas, and from there to Oregon, reaching Brownsville where he established a home in 1890.

Mr. Metcalf joined the armed forces in 1898 as a private in Battery "B", Field Artillery, Oregon volunteers, and served for the duration of the war with Spain. He was married to Emma D. Gray in 1900. Three sons, Donald G., Harry D., and Merrick E., were born to this union.

Mr. Metcalf came to Cottage Grove in 1903, where he engaged in the grocery business until 1916. He disposed of this business to take up horticultural work and established the Sunnyside Greenhouses, operating this business until 1930 when he retired from active business.

In 1915 he was united in marriage to Grace Lilly in Salem. Two daughters, Virginia Belle and Joan Alice, were born to this union.

In 1907 he helped organize Company "E" 4th Infantry, Oregon National Guard, and was commissioned second lieutenant on November 8, 1907 and first lieutenant, Coast Artillery Co., O.N.G. on November 9, same year and captain of C.A.C. of O.N.G. on February 13, 1913. He was commissioned major September 22, 1916, and was called to the colors on August 5, 1917, and served as major of U.S.N.G. of World War I until March 7, 1918 when he was discharged from the U. S. Army.

During World War II he set up and was appointed commander of civilian defense for south Lane county. Mr. Metcalf was in charge of registration for the draft and acted as advisor for his home district to the chairman of local draft board No. 3. He was also a member of the Cottage Grove Lodge No. 51, A.F.&A.M. and Calvin Funk Post No. 32, American Legion.

Surviving are his widow; three sons, Donald of Seattle, Harry and Merrick, both of Redwood City, California; two daughters, Mrs. Virginia Stewart of Cottage Grove and Joan Alice, at home; and ten grandchildren. Services were held Wednesday, July 19, at 3 p.m. at Mills mortuary with the Rev. Hugh Peniston officiating. Masonic honors were rendered at the chapel by Percy L. Malcolm, master of Cottage Grove Lodge No. 51, A.F.&A.M. Interment was in the IOOF cemetery where military honors were rendered at the graveside under auspices of Calvin Funk Post No. 32, American Legion.

Martha Cappious Services Held Tues.

Martha Jane Cappious of Cottage Grove died Saturday, July 15, 1950, at the home of her son, who was 80 years of age. She was born in Camas Valley, Oregon, brother in Camas Valley, Feb. 2, 1870. She lived there and was married to W. S. Cappious in 1888. The couple came to Cottage Grove 25 years ago. Mr. Cappious died in January of this year. She was a member of the First Methodist Church in Cottage Grove.

She is survived by one son, Samuel of Helena, Montana; two brothers, Jess Kirkendall of Camas Valley, Allan Kirkendall of Nevada; two sisters, Mrs. Lovana Birch of Coquille and Mrs. Mary K. Cooper of Portland, and many other relatives.

Funeral services were held at the Smith Funeral Home at Cottage Grove at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 18. Interment was in the Walker Cemetery with F. Sherwood Smith officiating.
