First Ordination Ceremony Held by Presbyterians

The first ordination service since the beginning of the Presbyterian church in Cottage Grove 95 years ago, was held Tuesday night when a large crowd of relatives, members of the church and friends gathered at the church to witness the impressive ceremony for Richard Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe T. Smith of Cottage Grove. This ordination ceremony was unique in that Mr. Smith is a member of the fourth generation of a charter member and elder, his great-grandfather, Harvey Clayburn Veatch, who was a member and elder of the first Cumberland Presbyterian church in Cottage Grove, built in 1855.

Not only was Richard baptized as a baby in the local church where he was ordained, but he received the first 18 years of his Christian training there; his mother and maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Veatch, were also baptized and lifelong members of the local Presbyterian church, either of the Cumberland or the present church which united in 1905. Richard's father has also been a member of the local church since coming here in 1910. The present church was dedicated in 1892.

Mr. Smith graduated from both local schools, Oregon State college and the Divinity School of Yale University. He has accepted a call to the First Presbyterian church at Ephraim, Washington.

Presiding over the ordination service was the Rev. Allan B. Philip, moderator of Presbytery; Mrs. H. A. Hagen was organist for the hymns and accompanied Dr. Harry Irvine of Portland, brother-in-law of Mr. Smith, as he sang "Give Thanks and Sing." The Rev. Chester W. Hamblin, D. D. preached the sermon on "You Can't Change Human Nature—But God Can." The constitutional questions were asked by the moderator and the ordination prayer given by the Rev. Prof. E. W. Warrington, Ph.D. The Rev. D. Hugh Peniston gave the charge to the minister. The service closed with the Rev. Richard K. Smith giving the benediction.
