Game Commission Oregon All-Stars Will Play Shrine Game in Portland

Portland — An armful of awards awaits players of the Oregon All-Stars and Portland All-Stars, who will part the curtains on the 1950 football season here at Multnomah stadium Saturday night, August 26, in the third annual Shrine's hospital game.

The number of trophies for meritorious performances has been upped to five this year. The most coveted award is the traditional outstanding player trophy, won in 1948 by Sam Baker of Corvallis and in 1949 by Don Sloan of Washington.

In addition this year there will be trophies for the outstanding lineman, best back, best passer and for the longest run of the game. One player may win more than one award. Trophies will be passed out at a civic banquet immediately following the game. The selections will be made by a committee of officials and sports writers.

All players participating in the game will receive an engraved belt and buckle, similar to those given Olympic Games competitors. They will also keep their colorful warm-up jackets and team pictures.

Each player also will become a member of the permanent Shrine game alumni association, for which he will receive a lifetime metal pass entitling him to two tickets to all future games.

Net proceeds from this annual gridiron battle will go to the Shrine's hospital for crippled children, Northwest unit, located in Portland.

Manager James J. Richardson has urged out-of-town fans once again to secure advance reservations immediately while good seats are still available. They sell for \$3 each and may be obtained by writing game headquarters, Parlor B, Portland hotel.

Antelope season will extend from Aug. 19 to 25 inclusive, and all applications for permits must be in the hands of the commission by 5 p.m. July 28. If more than 1500 applications are received, a drawing will be held. Bag limit will be one adult buck antelope having horns longer than the ears.

General elk season in western Oregon will be from Oct. 25 to Nov. 19 inclusive. Bag limit will be one bull elk having antlers with three points or more, including the brow tine. Open area will include territory west of The Dalles-California highway (U.S. 97) except that part of Douglas county east of U. S. highway 99 and north and east of Oregon highway 227.

Final hunting regulations will be announced at a later date.

The trout are biting, the salmon are biting in fact, we haven't heard a single complaint from a fisherman this week, and conditions should continue good for at least two or three weeks, depending on the weather, of course.

All streams are clear and down to good fishing level. The McKenzie is exceptionally good, and fishermen are having fine luck in Crescent creek, Taylor Burn, and the Umpqua.

And here's how it looks in other parts of the state:

Southern Oregon
 Water conditions on the Upper Umpqua are perfect and many trout and steelhead are reported. The feeding activity is decreasing, but evening fly fishing is good. Catches on Fish Lake continue good.

Trout angling on the Upper Rogue is very good, with a few small steelhead being taken below Grants Pass. Gray and brown hackle flies are producing best. Trout taken in the middle section are small, but some large fish are reported from the Trail-Laurelhurst area. Good catches are coming out of the high lakes.

Central Oregon
 There has been a decrease in angling pressure and results in Central Oregon lakes and streams because of cooler weather. East and Paulina lakes have shown a slump compared to previous weeks. Sparks lake has been a center of attraction for fly fishermen, and excellent fishing has been enjoyed there since it became accessible two weeks ago.

Limit catches have been reported from Irish and Taylor lakes, while Odell lake has yielded many catches of rainbow, mackinaw, and blueback. Crescent and Davis lakes are fair. The Upper Deschutes is reported clear and good fly fishing may be found in the Cow camp and Snow creek areas.

Willamette Valley
 The Willamette river between Harrisburg and Corvallis has produced the best trout fishing with good catches of cutthroat ranging between nine and 16 inches being reported. Spinner and worm and flat fish are the best lures. Catches on the McKenzie and its tributaries range from good to excellent. Trout are averaging ten inches in length. Remember your McKenzie catch cards.

Fly fishing is reaching its peak in the north and middle forks of the Willamette. Standard patterns, especially the bucktail caddis, are best. Marilyn and Rosary lakes on the Willamette pass have been fair. Summit, Opal and Timpanogas lakes roads are now open. All pack lakes in the Willamette pass area are now accessible and should provide excellent fishing in the next few weeks.

Siletz Fishway UNDER CONSTRUCTION
 A fishway is now being drilled and blasted around Valselt falls on the Siletz river by a joint Oregon State Fish commission and Game commission crew. The 30 foot falls, located below the town of Valselt, blocks salmon and steelhead migrations to the upper reaches of this coastal stream. The completed fishway will open up many miles of spawning ground for the siletz fishery.

Summer-run steelhead are known to gang-up under Valselt falls in large numbers, a few passing over in periods of extreme high water. The Fish commission has announced plans to stock the area above the falls with fall chinook and silver salmon from its Siletz hatchery.

Upon completion of the excavation work, a permanent concrete fish ladder will be poured. The fishway will be completed in two to three months.

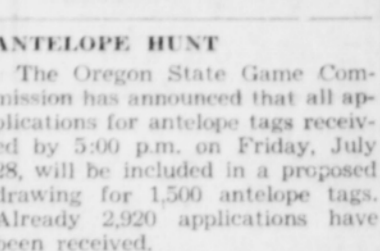

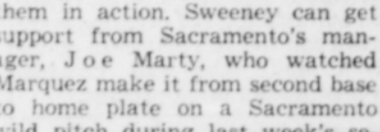

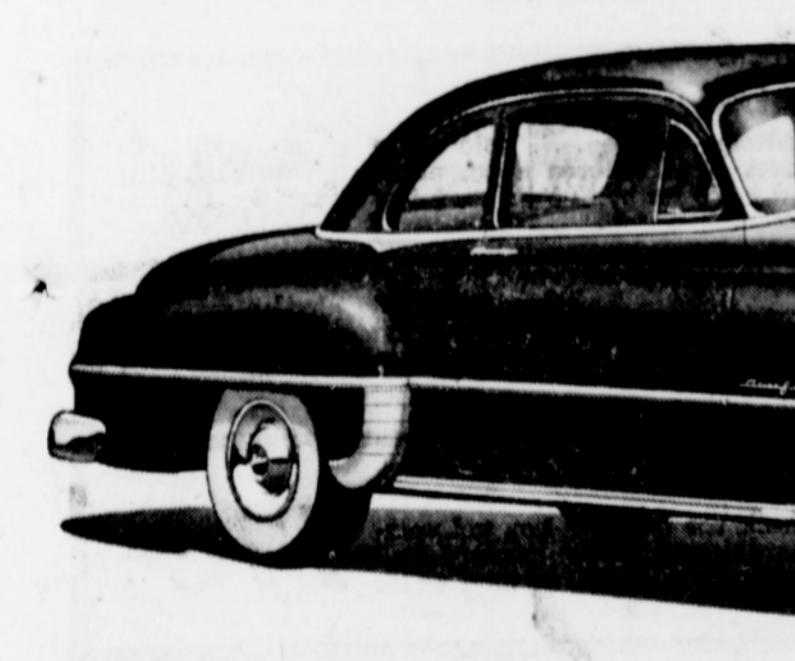
