On Sunday following the wedding the wedding party took a short cruise on the Miller Clipper.

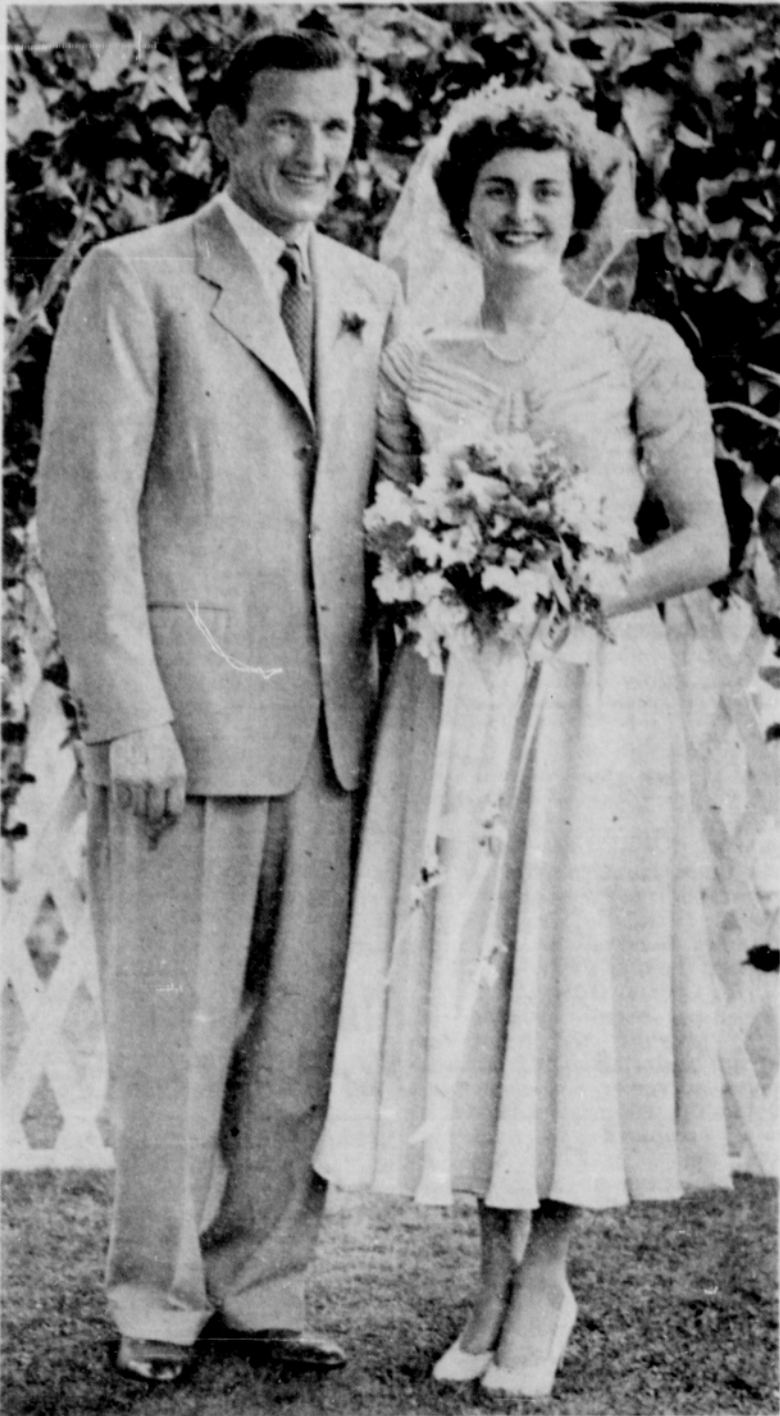
The couple will live at 2728 West Claybourn, Milwaukee. Both the bride and groom are employed in Milwaukee.

Mr. Malcolm gave his daughter in marriage. She wore a street-length dress of beige chiffon with full flared skirt, shirred short sleeves and an off-the-shoulder low-type neckline.
