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No Shortage of Auto Supplies, AAA Discovers

The Oregon State Motor Association, Oregon AAA club, today urged motorists to avoid "panic buying" in automotive goods, declaring that a nationwide survey conducted by the AAA has indicated no immediate prospects of serious shortages.

"The rumor factory has been working overtime since the Korean trouble broke," Ralph A. Coan, president of the Oregon AAA club said. "There have been reports from various sections of the country of heavy buying of automotive items—tires, batteries, even cars. 'AAA headquarters in Washington made a close check on the situation and here is the report they gave us:'"

Automobiles: For the present, it is assumed in Washington that the automobile industry will go ahead with its planned schedule of more than 6,000,000 cars and trucks in 1950.

Tires: Lou E. Holland, national AAA president, recently said: "We see nothing in the situation to cause motorists to engage in panic buying. Most of the cars on the highways now are equipped with better than average tires. . . . So our advice to motorists is: Don't buy tires just for storing. . . . remember that our readily expandable synthetic rubber industry is a tremendous bulwark not only for defense purposes but also for the protection of civilian transportation."

Batteries: The Government has reported to the AAA that batteries are in good supply. There is no immediate concern over the availability of lead. Extensive buying, dangerous because batteries deteriorate so fast, also would tend to deplete stocks and cause an artificial shortage.

Convictions For Drunken Driving Increases 22 Pct.

Drunken driving convictions in Oregon during the first six months of 1950 increased 22 per cent over last year at the same time, according to figures released by Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry. Newbry said that for the first six months of this year, 1,103 Oregonians had licenses revoked for driving while intoxicated. Last year during the same period 907 revocations were handed out for drunken driving.

A total of 19,168 traffic violation convictions, resulting in revocation of 1,340 licenses and suspension of 252 other licenses, were recorded for the January through June period.

Reckless driving, violation of the basic rule and other serious traffic offenses resulted in 248 of the suspensions. These suspensions, Newbry said, were issued upon recommendation of the courts.

Over-all convictions resulted in only a six per cent increase over last year's figures when 18,124 convictions were reported by Newbry's office.

NATIONAL FOREST TIMBER FOR SALE

Oral auction bids will be received by the Regional Forester or his authorized representative at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Roseburg, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p.m. Pacific daylight saving time, August 28, 1950, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 223 acres within sections 20, 21, 28 and 29, T. 21 S., R. 1 E., W.M., surveyed, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 9,788,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, 286,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Western redcedar and incense-cedar, 1,756,000 feet B.M., more or less of Western hemlock, and an unestimated amount of other species of sawtimber. Sealed bids accompanied by required payment received by the Forest Supervisor prior to 2:00 p.m., August 28, 1950, will be considered the equivalent of an oral bid and posted for the information of all bidders. No bid of less than \$13.00 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$2.50 per M feet for Western redcedar and incense-cedar, and \$2.75 per M feet for Western hemlock and other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$0.05 per M feet B.M., to be used by the Forest Service for partially paying the cost of slash disposal, and a cooperative deposit of \$0.05 per M feet B.M., to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement will be required. \$20,000.00 to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale, must accompany each sealed bid and must be shown to be in the possession or oral bidders as a qualification for auction bidding. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately make the required payment and confirm the bid by submitting it in writing on a Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, the District Ranger, Disston, Oregon, or the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon. j27-2-aug17

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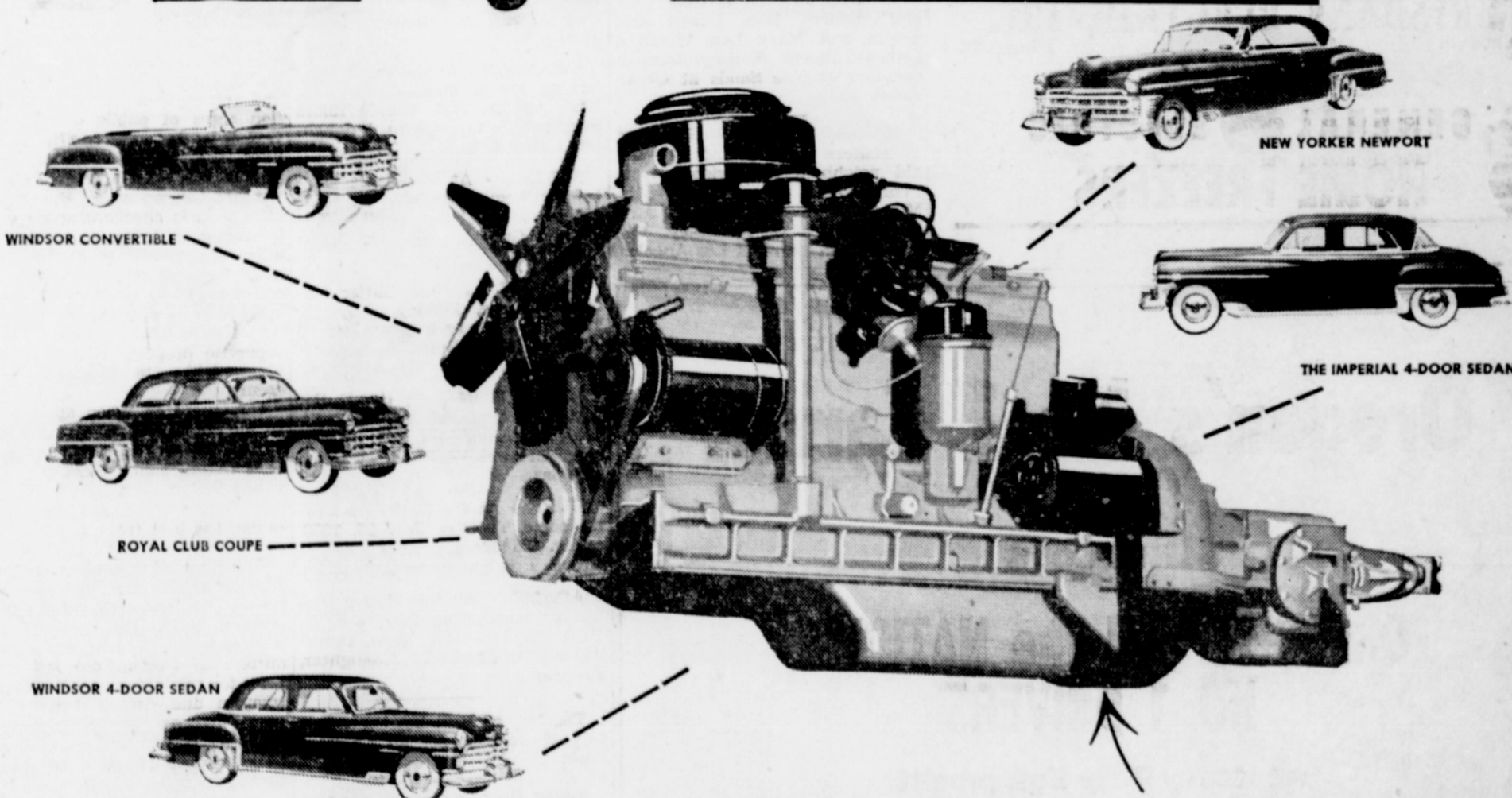
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
