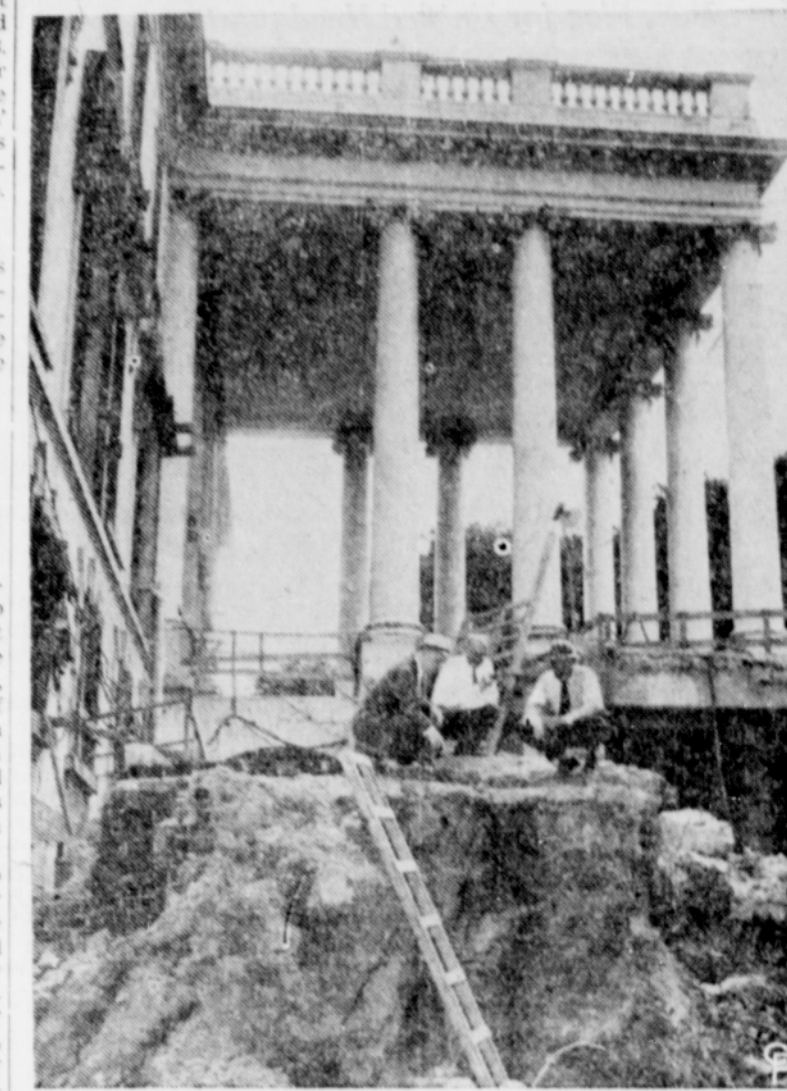

Bureau to Curb Trespassing On Public Lands

Vigorous action is planned to curb widespread misuse of forest and other resources on public lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management, it was announced today by Daniel L. Goldy, Regional Administrator of the Bureau in Portland.

Goldy stated that approximately 300 trespasses on the public lands are reported to his office each year. Since July 1, 1949, 125 new timber trespass cases representing a volume of 7,300,000 board-feet of public timber valued at \$50,466.42 have been reported to the Regional Administrator. During the same period 141 timber trespass cases have been closed, involving 6,285,000 board-feet and \$76,802.95 in damage payments.

At the present time 120 timber trespass cases are being processed by the district forestry offices in the region. As an indication of the growing importance of the trespass problem, Goldy cited the Medford district which has so far during 1950 reported a greater number of timber trespass than regular timber sales.

The Bureau of Land Management is responsible for administration and protection of forest and grazing areas on some 30 million acres of public domain and O & C lands in the Pacific Northwest. The majority of timber trespasses occur on O & C lands in western Oregon where the O & C ownership is checkerboarded with private land. Loggers working on adjacent private lands are the most frequent violators. They often negligently fail to have property lines accurately established by a competent surveyor or to supervise properly timber fallers. More deliberate trespasses also occur.

One operator, when apprehended for cutting public domain timber where the property lines were well blazed said, "Sure, I know where the property line is. We are only following the old custom of taking the best trees as far as we could throw an ax."

In determining timber trespass damage and in settling cases the B.L.M. operates, as do private land owners, under the laws of the state in which the trespass is committed. In Oregon the law provides for triple damages for willful trespass and double damage for casual trespass, the latter defined as being committed by a person who had probable cause to believe that he owned the land.

German Student Arrives in Oregon

Heinrich Rohweder, German farm exchange student, arrived in Salem for one year of farm and high school training recently. Rohweder is one of 166 German boys and girls between the ages of 16 and 19 being brought to the U. S. for placement with American farm families by the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Rohweder's year of farm training will be spent on the Willamette Valley ranch of Marshall Swearingin, vice-president of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation. There he will be given the opportunity to study modern American farming methods and live with a typically American farm family.

German youth of this age have lived through the Nazi regime in Germany but have never had an opportunity to see democracy in action. The Farm Bureau believes it can give the young leaders in Germany an opportunity to work and live in a democracy and that they will, upon their return, assist in guiding and shaping the future of Germany.

Lumber Shipments Set All-Time Mark

Portland - At the end of June, Douglas fir sawmills had piled up their greatest six months of lumber cutting since 1929 as they turned out 4,973,982,000 board feet, H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of West Coast Lumbermen's Association announced today.

During the first half of 1950, lumber shipments of 5,313,385,000 board feet set an all-time record for this region, Simpson said. A freight car shortage in Oregon, starting three months ago and becoming critical during June, hampered mills, cutting down shipments.

Every fir mill west of the Cascades in Oregon, Washington and California, not closed by flood waters or strikes, was reported operating at capacity to supply lumber for the greatest housing boom in the nation's history.

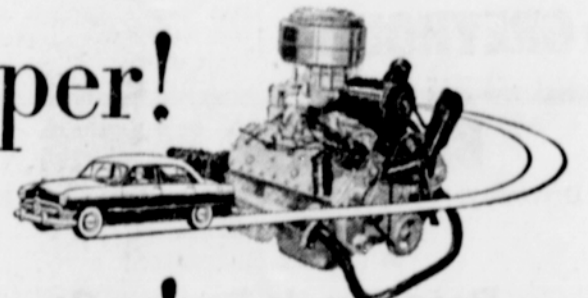
