Fire Weather Forecasts Announced Daily Over State Radio Stations

Fire weather forecasts giving latest up-to-the-minute data for loggers of this county are being broadcast seven times daily over a statewide network and two radio stations in a stepped-up effort

to reduce the number of logging fires in Oregon this summer. W. D. Hagenstein, chief forester for the forest conservation committee of Pacific Northwest Forest Industries, has announced.

Radio station KBDY, 3397.5 kilocycles will supply loggers with latest fire weather daily at 8:25 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. (PST) from the U. S. Weather Bureau special fire weather forecasting section. The same data will be re-broadcast approximately ten minutes later, both morning and afternoon, over the Oregon State Board of Forestry station KOA413 at a frequency of 2236 kilocycles.

In addition, a special logger's fire weather forecast is being broadcast daily except Sunday at 5:00 p.m., 7:45 p.m. and 9:45 p.m. (PST) over station KOAC, Cor-

vallis, 550 kilocycles. Loggers may also get a twice daily fire weather forecast over their local radio stations, but broadcast times vary, so times should be checked.

The broadcasts started July 1, and will continue through the regular fire season.

Hagenstein urged every logging operator to assign one man from his crew to be responsible for getting latest fire weather forecasts each day so that each logging operation can be conducted with a minimum of risk when fire conditions are hazardous.

Fire tools should be kept in first class condition, the forester warned. Water barrels and water hoses should be checked regularly and kept full. Trucks, tractors and other equipment should be ready to roll to a fire on a moment's notice. Operators were urged to develop a fire plan for their camps, so that each man will know exactly what to do when and if a fire occurs.

Navy Recalling Certain Reserves In Northwest Area

Immediate recall to active duty of certain Naval Reservists, both officers and men, has been directed under presidential authority it was announced today by the 13th Naval District.

This order does not include submarine reservists or, except in special instances, aviation reservists.

Naval District Commandants have been directed to begin the immediate recall of Organized and Fleet Reservists to meet approved personnel ceilings and district quotas.

Retired officers and enlisted personnel will not be recalled at this time.

No deferments will be granted except in cases involving key billets in industrial activities vital to national defense and in cases wherein community welfare would be seriously affected.

Members of voluntary units will not be recalled except in special instances, but may volunteer for active duty.

Officers will be processed after receipt of Bureau of Naval Personnel orders. Enlisted men will report to their nearest recruiting station.

Waves will not be recalled involuntarily at this time.

Volunteers for active duty in categories other than those being ordered to duty are being accepted on a one-year minimum period basis.

State Accepts Two Top-Notch National 4-H Club Programs

Two highly important national 4-H awards programs—Meat Animal, and Soil and Water Conservation—have been accepted for the current year by the Oregon State Club office.

This will be the 21st consecutive year that Thos. E. Wilson, meat packer and chairman of the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, has provided incentives to help encourage 4-H boys and girls in livestock club work. Awards in the Meat Animal activity include gold-filled medals, gold watches, Chicago 4-H Club Congress trips and \$300 college scholarships, on county, state, sectional and national levels, respectively.

The Soil and Water Conservation program is now set up for two age groups—one for boys and girls 15 to 21 years old, and the other for those 10 to 14, inclusive. The older group is required to complete a more comprehensive project.

Medals for county winners, and gold watches and \$25 Savings Bonds for State champions are provided by Firestone Tire and Rubber Company. Sectional winners get Chicago Club Congress trips. National awards are \$300 college scholarships. This revised program is the result of combined planning by representatives of the Cooperative Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Firestone and the National Committee.

Car Production Sets New Record

The month of June, 1950, set an all-time high for the production of Chrysler cars, it was announced by Joseph A. O'Malley, general sales manager of the Chrysler division, Chrysler Corporation. The figure is slightly over 10 per cent better than that for the previous high month, September, 1949, and approximately 16 per cent over the third highest month, January, 1941.

Another record was set by Chrysler in the week ended July 15, 1950, which brought the largest number of retail deliveries of Chrysler cars ever made in a period of seven days. This new all-time high for retail deliveries tops by 5.4 per cent the previous mark set in the week ended May 17, 1941. Not only was June production a new high for Chrysler cars but it also saw a very large percentage of the more luxurious models come off the assembly line. Saratoga, New Yorker, Imperial, Town and Country and Crown Imperial cars accounted for 26.2 per cent of the total.
