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## Would-Be Song Leaders Given Know-How Tips

If you're one of the uncounted millions who have a yen to lead songs, yet can't carry a tune in a basket, here's some happy news from a young lady who's a professional song leader. Miss Jessalene Mallalieu of Oregon State college says you don't have to know how to have a sense of rhythm and tone.

Almost anyone can lead songs, declares the extension recreation specialist. Three qualifications for a capable leader include enjoyment of singing, liking for people and willingness to work. It isn't even necessary to know music, to play an instrument, or be in a choir to direct group singing, assures Miss Mallalieu.

A song leader first pitches the song in a key which most people can sing without straining their voices. He practices his songs ahead of time to determine the proper key.

To obtain group attention, the song leader can hold his hands up and say, "Ready?" If the song begins on the first beat in the measure, the leader's first movement is a strong downward one. If the melody begins on the last beat, the first motion is upward.

The first beat of each measure should always be a strong down beat. It isn't important for the song leader to stick to specified rhythm motions as long as he keeps the group singing together at the proper tempo. The group should start and stop together. In between motions may be worked out to the song leader's satisfaction. No two leaders direct alike, notes Miss Mallalieu.

An experienced song leader varies the quality of the singing—sometimes directing the group to sing softly, loudly or to hold a note to give interpretation.

A wise song leader plans his song program ahead, always starting with a song the group knows. New airs are best taught during the middle of the program. A variety of gay, quiet, romantic, or two-part songs gives spice to the program. The closing song needs to be a rousing familiar melody appropriate to the program that follows.
