DRUGS AID TO REGAIN BOY'S SIGHT

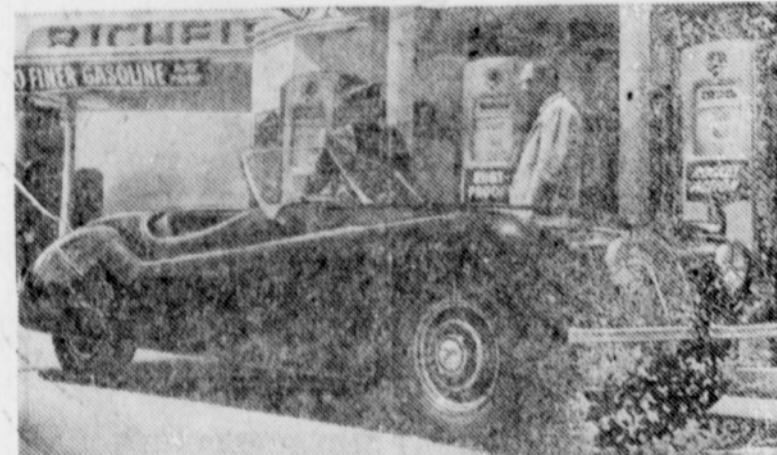

Falls Account for Most Accidents on Nation's Farms

Falls account for most time-loss farm accidents and they require an average \$45 apiece in medical attention, reports W. B. Parker, Lane County extension agent, who points out that this is National Farm Safety week.

The fact that falls account for most farm accidents was revealed by a recent U. S. department of agriculture farm accident survey. Machines ranked second; animals third as contributing accident causes.

Purpose of National Farm Safety week, according to Parker, is to point out the extravagant waste in lives and property, and to urge farm residents to learn and obey farm safety rules. Falls accounting for almost 25 per cent of all the accidents surveyed resulted in an average 24 days of work time in addition to the average medical cost of \$45.

Figures compiled by the State Industrial Accident commission indicate the agency involved in a farm accident is most frequently a vehicle of some type. Tractors come under this category. Vehicles accounted for 50 per cent of the fatal accidents, and 10 per cent of all accidents included in the five-year summary.

As a farm safety precaution, the National Safety council suggests that farmers keep walkways and steps in good repair, unobstructed and well lighted. Other suggestions on their farm safety checklist include keeping ladders in good repair; stopping machines before unclogging, oiling, or adjusting; avoiding sharp corners and soft ground with tractors; keeping bulls in safe pens.

Figures compiled by the State Industrial Accident commission indicated farm accidents are increasing. Fatalities ranging from 7 to 10 annually remain about the same according to the commission which handles about 11,000 agricultural accounts under the workman's compensation act. Altogether, 36 persons lost their lives in farm accidents last year, Parker concludes.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Fruit Icebox Dessert

Broadcast: August 5, 1950

1/2 cup powdered sugar 1/2 cup cold milk
1/2 cup soft butter 4 teaspoons granulated sugar
1/2 cup Pet Milk 2 teaspoons lemon juice
2 cups graham crackers, broken in 1/2 in. pieces 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Mix powdered sugar and butter in a 1 1/2 qt. bowl. Stir in 1/2 cup milk, a tablespoon at a time. Be sure all milk is mixed in before adding more. Fold in half of graham crackers at a time, being careful not to crush the pieces of crackers. Drop in 4 portions on a flat pan. Top with the pineapple. Chill until firm, or about 2 hours. When ready to serve, put ice cold milk and granulated sugar into small, cold bowl. Whip with chilled rotary beater, or electric beater at high speed, until fluffy. Add lemon juice and rind; whip until stiff. Serve on the dessert. Makes 4 servings.

*Fruit cocktail, peaches, or apricot halves also can be used.
