Draft Boards Are Still Interested In 27 Year Old Men

Oregon State Headquarters, Selective Service System, announced today that the local boards of the state were receiving information in connection with changes of address, marital status, etc., from men who were registered under the 1940 Act but who were too old to register under the 1948 Act.

"It is a rather healthy sign," Colonel Francis W. Mason, Deputy State Director, said today, "as it indicates that the general public is gradually awakening to the fact that registrants under the Selective Service Act must keep their Local Boards advised of all changes."

Colonel Mason continued that the only men in whom Selective Service is now interested are those born after 30 August 1922. "Until such time as the Congress enacts legislation raising the age for registration," he concluded, "the older men have no responsibility under the existing statute."

Lane Republicans Hold Open House

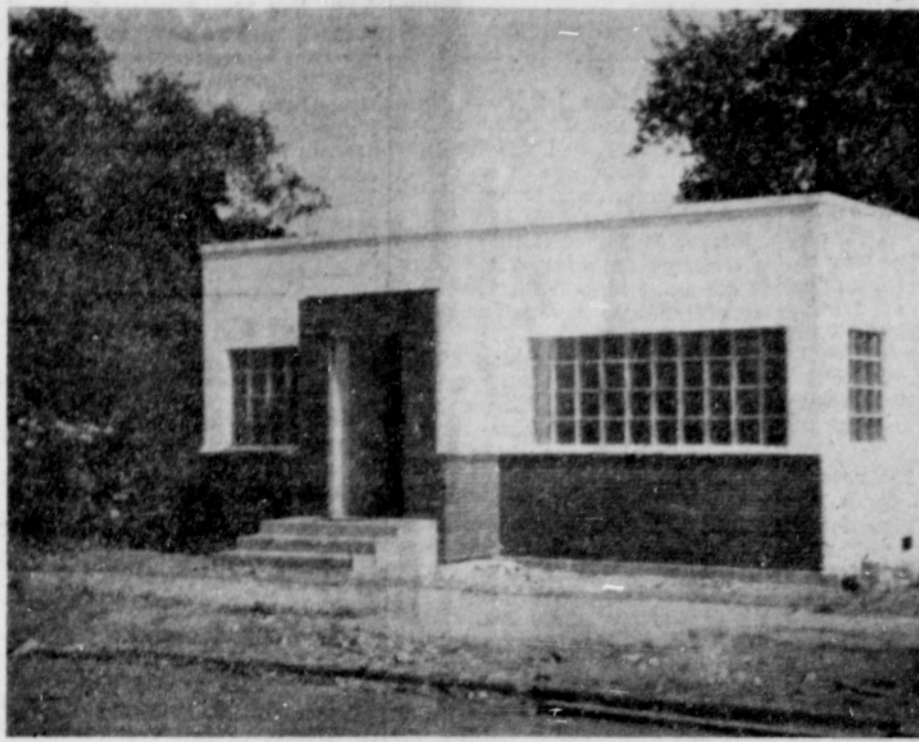
Lane County Republicans will hold open house all day Tuesday, Aug. 15, at party headquarters in the Rodman building, Eugene.

Another new business building for Cottage Grove and a real asset to the community is the Medical-Dental building at 500 Whiteaker ave., now occupied by Dr. David A. Morris, physician and surgeon, and Dr. C. H. Kime, dentist.

The building, 27 feet wide by 53 1/2 feet long, houses two suites of offices with a clinical laboratory room, a furnace room, rest room facilities, a waiting room and an office. The west suite of offices is occupied by Dr. C. H. Kime and the east suite by Dr. Morris with a hallway between.

The building should offer a considerable convenience to those incapacitated since it is only one story. A driveway will also be built down the east side of the building with loading and unloading space in the rear. The rear also affords parking space and recreational facilities may be added to the rear along the bank of the Coast Fork.

The building was constructed by V. J. Carlson & Son Construction Co. The electrical work was completed by the Nelson Electric Co. (Radio Ray), and the plumbing was done by J. P. Walker.

Local Man Finds High Taxation In Norway During Recent Visit

People in the United States should have no complaint about high taxes, is the opinion of a man who has just returned from two and a half months in the Scandinavian countries.

Peter Moen, 1631 E. Main street, Cottage Grove, declared this week that the burden of taxation in Norway is much heavier than it is over here. Old folks get a pension of \$10 a month and they have to pay a tax on it. Even a soldier's salary of 14 cents a day is taxed, Moen said. There also is a tax on sickness benefits.

The average working wage, he reported, is between two and three dollars a day. Skilled workers get three dollars a day. Instead of automobiles, almost everyone has a bicycle and carries a pack-sack

27 Tracts of O&C Lands to Be Sold

67,745,000 board feet of saw timber on O & C lands will be offered for sale by oral and sealed bids during August, according to Daniel L. Goldy, Regional Administrator of the Bureau of Land Management.

Twenty-seven tracts with an estimated value of \$929,931.00 will be placed on the block as follows: Oral auctions at the Bureau's District Forestry offices, August 14, Salem, 5 tracts with 20,685,000 board feet; August 15, Coos Bay, 1 tract with 4,015,000; August 16, Roseburg, 3 tracts with 9,250,000; August 17, Eugene, 6 tracts with 11,825,000 and on August 15, sealed bids will be opened for 12 tracts with 21,970,000 board feet at the Regional Office of the Bureau at Swan Island.

The sealed bids will cover timber offered in the Medford, Coos Bay, Salem, Roseburg, and Eugene Districts.

City Council Plans For Civilian Defense

What the city council did Monday night:

1. Voted to see about quieting the loudspeaker at softball games after 9 p.m.

2. Ordered a call for bids for the construction of the west side trunk line sewer.

3. Authorized the Public Health committee to work out plans with the local Defense coordinator concerning air raid defense.

4. Agreed to build a small dam on Prather creek in conjunction with the government.

5. Voted to have the city bear part of the cost of re-laying the water supply pipe near Dorena d.a.m.

Mill at Creswell Closed by Strike

Operations at the Pacific Lumber company mill in Creswell have ceased pending settlement of a strike of AF of L lumber and sawmill union members. The strike has affected more than 60 men, including 20 loggers who were made inactive by the mill closure.

Union officials in Eugene report that the dispute is over a management proposal that a 10-cent wage increase be coupled with a provision for later wage cuts if "the market drops off or other conditions" warrant them.

According to N. M. Ohrling, one of the owners of the mill, the wage issue was secondary in the dispute. The question of vacation pay was the real issue, he said.

Masons planning to attend are reminded to bring a blanket or cushion and a top coat. The site is reached from the Salem-Rickreall highway, turning north at Brunk's Corners. All roads in the vicinity will be posted with directions.

The annual picnic sponsored by the Knights of Columbus, Eugene Council 1430, will be held Sunday at Benton Lane Park. Activities are scheduled to begin at 11 a.m.

Athletic events of the day will include the annual softball game between the single and married men, horseshoe tournament, various running races, pie and watermelon eating contests, and diving and swimming races will be staged in the pool. The swimming pool will be reserved for the group from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m.

A gate admission of 50 cents for each car will be charged.

MOTORISTS HURT AT YONCALLA

Two men employed at a Sutherland mill were hurt Sunday when the car they were driving hit a soft shoulder and rolled over at Yoncalla Sunday. The men identified as Glen Radford and Leonard Bell, both formerly of North Carolina were taken to a Eugene hospital. Bell was released after first aid treatment and Bradford was reported Monday to be in fair condition after being knocked unconscious.

Steps to re-form civil defense plans were taken by the Cottage Grove city council Monday night when Mayor F. H. Doleman announced the appointment of Vinal Randall Jr. as Civilian Defense coordinator.

The council authorized the public health committee to work with Randall in setting up an air raid defense organization as well as to discuss other defense problems. Members of the committee are Councilmen Elmer Kent, J. E. Bricher, and Elmer Thwing.

Mayor Doleman pointed out that civilian defense will involve more than merely having air raid spoters. In the event the larger cities, such as Portland, are bombed, he said the neighboring towns must be prepared to receive those who have been left homeless. This and other problems will require a great deal of thought, he stated.

In response to complaints from neighbors of the softball park, the council approved the appointment of Councilmen Kent and Thies to confer with officials of the Softball association concerning the loudspeaker during the games.

Several citizens who have to go to bed early because of the nature of their jobs had complained that the loudspeaker kept them awake for several hours. The council also discussed taking steps to curb loudspeakers on automobiles used for advertising purposes. No action was taken on this matter, however.

Because of a possibility of a slide when the water in Dorena lake is lowered, a section of the road and the city water supply pipe must be re-laid. The council agreed to share with the government the expense of re-laying the pipe.

Construction of a small dam 100 feet above the present dam on Prather creek also was approved. This project will be carried out in conjunction with the government and will provide more water pressure for forest protection. It also will insure a steady water supply for Cottage Grove.

L. W. Coiner, city engineer, announced that the oiling of several streets in the city probably would begin in several weeks. The streets to be coated are First, Second, Third and G streets, as well as the block of Seventh street between Washington and Adams.

DR. DEAN WEBB MOVES TO NEW OFFICES

Dr. Dean Webb, local dentist, Monday was located in his new suite of offices at 223 1/2 South Sixth street in the new Randall building. The lower part of the building is still in the process of construction, but the upper story has been completed with exception of new professional office quarters.

Dr. Webb's office quarters are located in the southeast corner of the upper story and consists of eight rooms, occupying a space approximately 20 by 40 feet. His office was formerly located in the First National Bank building.

Dr. R. B. Merrick, now located in the Stewart building, is also planning to move his offices to the Randall building. The new suite of offices for Dr. Merrick will be ready about September 1st and will occupy the northwest front of the upper story.
