**Shrine All-Star  
Football Players  
To Begin Practice**

PORTLAND (Special) — In order that crippled children may walk, 84 young football stars, the best talent in last year's Oregon high school ranks, will assemble here Sunday, to begin practice for the third annual Shrine's hospital all-star game.

They compose the playing personnel of the Oregon All-Stars and Portland All-Stars, who will part the curtains on the 1950 football season here at Multnomah stadium Saturday night, August 26.

The Oregon All-Stars, selected from schools throughout the state, will be greeted by Coach Don Mabee and Shrine game officials at a luncheon at the Multnomah hotel Sunday at noon. They will be quartered there during the practice period.

The Portland All-Stars, composed of graduated seniors from the city's public and parochial schools, will meet Coach Ted Ogden at a dinner at the Multnomah hotel, where they will have a training table during the practice period.

Monday morning the squads will launch two weeks of intensive practice for the traditional grid-iron classic, proceeds of which go to the Northwest unit of the Shrine's hospital for crippled children.

Tickets for the game are still available by mail at headquarters in Parlor B of the Portland hotel. The ticket sale opens Monday here at J. K. Gill's.

**Soap Box Derby To Be Held Sunday**

Alcon, Ohio—The thirteenth running of the All-American Soap Box Derby, sponsored by many of the nation's leading newspapers and the Chevrolet Motor Division, will be held at Derby Downs here August 13.

It will be a lucky day for the 150 competing champions, all of whom win a prize for being in the race. To the winner is awarded a four-year, \$5,000 college scholarship. A Chevrolet sedan goes to the runner-up.

**60 Will Compete In National Cycle Hill Climb Sunday**

EUGENE—Johnny Martinolich of Portland figures that he's the man the other riders are going to have to beat for National honor this Sunday when the National Class C Hillclimb will be held on Wagner's Butte.

The Butte, 370 feet long on a 72-degree slope, is located 8 miles south of Corvallis and 32 miles north of Eugene on highway 99W. This will mark the first time that any Northwest hill has been used for the national class C climb.

The first rider will take the hill at 12 noon. The Eugene Motorcycle Club, sponsor of this year's event, has parking facilities for 3,000 cars, and seating arrangements and concessions for a crowd of over 10,000.

Riders will take turns on the hill according to the final point standings within their respective class—the man with the most points taking first crack. Right now, Martinolich is second in both the 45 and 80 expert divisions, the top man being Henry Keiman of Kewanee, Illinois.

But because of his familiarity with the Wagner slope (Johnny holds the course record), he is favored over Reiman, Windy Lindstrom of Oakland, Calif., the current 45-champion, and Sam Arena Palo Alto, Calif., the 80 titleholder, in Sunday's run.
