Walker Union Church Holds Homecoming

For the fifth consecutive year, the "Little White Church on the Hill" was the scene of much activity, when friends, neighbors and members gathered for the annual homecoming on Sunday, Aug. 6.

After the regular morning worship hour, which was conducted by the minister, Lavern Gomez, to a large and appreciative congregation, a basket dinner was spread under the trees. After all had partaken of food, not only for the body but for the spirit and soul through renewal of acquaintances long past and some only newly made, a well planned program of inspirational numbers was presented.

The program opened in the all-time traditional manner, with a reading, "Little White Church," which was written for and dedicated to the Walker Church on that first homecoming in 1916, and which has opened the program each year.

Following the reading, the congregation joined in singing, "The Little White Church on the Hill-side," with the invocation being given by Mr. Andrews, who in years past, was superintendent of the Walker Sunday school. Mrs. Hugh Trunnell's solo, "Oh, Eyes That Are Weary," was followed by a trombone solo given by Mr. Casler, who played, "Going Home."

A reading entitled "Criticizing" preceded the congregation's singing of "Sweet By and By." The beautiful tenor voice of Jerry Foster thrilled the audience with "He Knows the Way" and "Jesus Starts the World A-Singing." Mr. and Mrs. Al Griffith presented a vocal and trumpet duet of "Ivory Palaces" and "I Would Be True." Shirley, Jean Ellen and Ellen Sherrill gave a trio number, "Where Jesus Leads."

The program was interspersed with short talks by some of the old-timers, who told of their early experiences at Walker. Mrs. Brickford formerly Clarissa Huff, who left Lynx Hollow in 1906 and who happened to be in the vicinity, stopped in to renew old friendships. She is now a resident of Portland and this was the first time she had been in the Walker church since leaving the community.

Aunt Cad Wallace, whose father was the first minister at Walker, told of many happy incidents during her childhood there. The program was concluded by the congregation singing "God Be With You" and benediction was led by James Hemenway. The guest book was in charge of Jean Ellen Sherrill following the close of the meeting.

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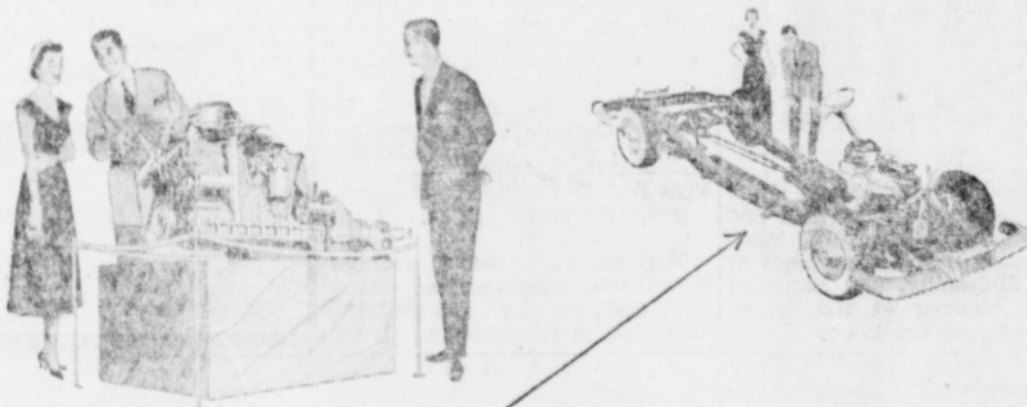


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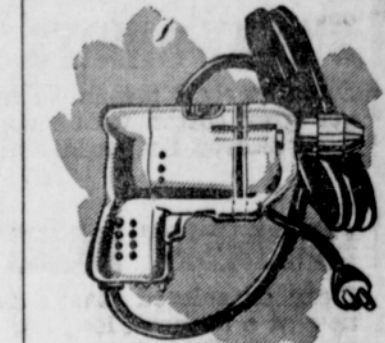


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
