Demand for Forest Cones Will Be Big Again This Year

Prospects are bright for another good forest tree seed crop and cones will again be in demand by nurseries and seed dealers.

This statement is from Paul N. Goodmonson, farm woodlot products marketing specialist with the Oregon State college extension service, who says the seed cones will be ripe about Sept. 15. Wanted particularly are Douglas fir cones, hemlock and limited quantities of western red cedar, all true fir—white and noble, and spruce.

Cone gatherers who are industrious may make as much as \$12 to \$16 a short working day.

Nurseryman and seed dealers pay for cones on the basis of a cutting test, sampling individual offerings. The more seeds present in the cones, the higher the price, Goodmonson explains.

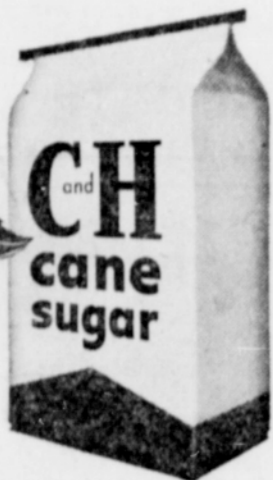
Most likely places to look for seed bearing cones is on land where the trees are fairly open. Stands thinned by logging operations are excellent seed sources, and one open grown tree may yield up to 10 to 12 bushels of cones. Where squirrels are cutting cones out of trees and allowing them to fall is another good seed source.

Cones are normally purchased by the bushel and dealers ask that they be bagged in burlap sacks. In storing cones, Goodmonson advises that they be stored in a shaded, well ventilated spot. Sacks should never be piled one atop the other, and the specialist suggests standing the bags upright to allow more air space between sacks. Where cones will not be delivered to a dealer within a week, it is advisable to dump them onto the dry ground and spread them at a depth not to exceed four inches. Occasional turning will halt mold.

For lists of dealers, Goodmonson suggests that cone pickers contact their local county extension office.

Highway Speeding Raises Death Toll

High-speed accident on open highways are playing a leading role in Oregon's traffic death upsurge, the secretary of State's traffic division reported this week.

The division said fatalities to date are 14 per cent higher than last year at the same time, and that about three out of four death crashes are taking place outside the limits of any city or town.

Collisions with other vehicles or fixed objects, running off the roadway and overturning in the roadway are principal rural accident types in which death results, the records reveal. In most cases, the drivers lost control of their vehicles at high speed.

Studies of last year's traffic records show that one out of every 31 mishaps at 50 to 60-mile-an-hour speeds resulted in death. One in two between 70 and 80 miles an hour proved fatal.

Six New Homes Were Started During July

Permits for the construction of six new residences in Cottage Grove were issued during the month of July, according to D. J. Allen, city recorder. Total estimated cost of the homes was \$26,000.

Other permits issued during the month were for the construction of a new football stadium at Cottage Grove Union high school at a cost of \$44,020, and for a new Trinity Lutheran church estimated at \$12,000. A \$5,000 permit to erect a marquee on the Githens Motor Co. building also was issued.

Repairs and additions to residences amounted to \$1,861.

Children's Hospital Dedication Slated

Dedication of the new children's hospital school will highlight the annual meeting of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults, the Easter Seal agency, Howard Feast, executive director, has announced.

The meeting will be held Sept. 21 and 22 in Eugene, where the agency's new school is located.

"New Horizons for the Handicapped" will be the theme of the two-day meeting, which will attract nationally known specialists in medicine, education, rehabilitation, welfare and community services.

Open house will follow the dedication of the new hospital school building. Staff members will be available for consultations during the open house.

The meetings will be held in the Eugene hotel.

CRESWELL SCHOOLS TO START SEPTEMBER 11

Creswell Union high school, Creswell Grade school, and Creslane school will begin fall classes September 11. Pre-registration will be held at the high school on Sept. 7 and 8 and at Creslane school Sept. 8 only. The grade school bus will run on regular schedule that day. Creslane school houses the first four grades. There will be no pre-registration at the old grade school building and all registration will be done on Sept. 11 and students will remain at school all day.

The floors of the old building have all been resanded and the interior of the building repainted.

Plan Road Repairs In Douglas County

Two road projects in Douglas county have been announced by the Oregon State highway commission. Both will be financed by state funds apportioned for expenditure of city streets.

In Yoncalla it is planned to improve "B" street between Second and Fifth streets by regrading, new rock work and construction of a 20-foot bituminous macadam wearing surface.

In Oakland plans call for a resurfacing of Locust St. with a three inch lift of plant-mixed asphaltic concrete to the width of 64 feet between First and Third streets, and to a 25-foot width between Third St. and Second Ave.

BARTELLS RETIRE FROM HOTEL BUSINESS

Old friends of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. (Bart) Bartell may be interested in the announcement made at Arcata, Calif., the past week that the Bartells have leased the Hotel Arcata to Mr. and Mrs. A. W. They left Arcata for Salem recently and will make their home with Mrs. Olo Miller, sister of Mrs. Bartell.

The Bartells operated a hotel here starting in 1911, later opening up the Corvallis hotel in 1930 and moved to Arcata in 1940 where they have since resided.

CHOCOLATE LIME SWIRL

25 to 30 chocolate cookies
3 tbsp. butter, melted
1 pkg. lime gelatin dessert
1/2 cup hot water

1/2 cup lemon juice
1/2 cup sugar
1 roll con. Carnation Milk chilled
1 tsp. grated lemon rind
4 drops green food coloring

Butter a 10" spring-form pan. Line sides with 12 or more cookies. Crush remaining cookies, mix with butter, and place on bottom of pan, saving some for topping. Dissolve gelatin dessert in hot water. Add lemon juice and sugar. Let stand while whipping Carnation Milk to a stiff froth. Add gelatin dessert to whipped Carnation Milk and continue whipping till stiff peak is formed. Mix in lemon rind and food coloring. Pour the cookie crumbs. Make swirl on top by outlining a large "C" with a spoon. Pour remaining crumbs over the "C". Chill about 4 hours or till firm. Serves 6 to 12.
